

SPEARS WORKS U. OF O. TEAM TO GOOD FORM

Four Conference Games Scheduled Gives Team Poor Chance

EUGENE, Ore., Sept. 23. (AP)—Except for a weak schedule, Coach Dr. Clarence W. Spears would have an excellent chance of giving the University of Oregon the Pacific Coast conference football championship this fall in his first year as the head grid mentor of the Webfoots.

But with only four conference games on the Oregon schedule, the Webfoots will hardly be recognized as coast champions even if they win them all, provided of course that some other school cleans up its schedule. Oregon's only conference games will be with Washington, Idaho, University of California at Los Angeles and Oregon State college.

Hard work has been the program since the opening of training camp. The Webfoots have an exceptional game scheduled with Drake university, Oct. 3. The tilt will be contested at Chicago in the city's first night game.

Six veterans returned to school for their third year on the Oregon varsity. They are: Austin Colbert and Jerry Little, guards; George Christensen and Marion Hall, tackles; John Kitzmiller, captain and halfback; and John Donabue, quarterback. With the exception of Hall who played as a reserve, all these men were regulars.

Colbert teamed with Christensen to form the Webfoots' famous "quarter ton tackle" combination, but this year the pair have been parted and Colbert moved into guard.

Other lettermen on the varsity squad are Eric Forsta and Bill Anater, centers; Henry Heyden, Norman Jesse and Ralph Bates, tackles; Irvin Schulz, guards; Jack Erdley, end; Al Browne, John Londahl, Wally Shearer and Ed Moeller, backs. Two shifts are seen in the backfield. Moeller will likely be moved from fullback to quarter and Al Browne who alternated with Hal Hutton last season, had a position under former Coach Captain John McEwan that called for a constant handling of the ball. Since his fingers have been stiffened from discus throwing he fumbled often. At quarter, however, he will carry the ball less and run more interference.

The two halfbacks will probably be Kitzmiller, the "flying Dutchman," and Don Watts, a sophomore. Kitzmiller was the leading scorer of the conference two years ago, and was gaining additional fame as a griddle last season until he injured his right ankle. Watts is being counted on heavily for first team work. He is a fellow citizen of Kitzmiller, both hailing from Harrisburg, Penn., and is reported to perform equally well with the "flying Dutchman."

Other outstanding backfield men are Cliff Garnett, Wally Laurence, Dan Sheehy, Londahl, Howard Dirks, Jack Rushlow and Donabue.

One of Oregon's most important games this season will be with University of Washington at Portland, Oct. 18. It will be a battle of coaches with Jimmy Phelan, former Purdue university mentor, leading the Washington huskies, and Spears heading the Webfoots. Washington officials decided on Phelan over Spears to succeed Enoch W. Bagshaw as Husky coach and victory means much in the eyes of the students.

Alma Plans for A New Divorce

TOO HIGH A BACK SWING CAUSES LOSS OF BALANCE

A high back swing in delivering a ball is not a necessity and more often, a fault. Carrying the arm back too high has a tendency to throw the bowler off his stride, causing his shoulders to plunge downward too far as he is raising his arm.

The ball should be brought back only far and high enough on the back swing, so that without throwing your body out of line, you need not exert much effort to throw the ball forward. In other words, let the ball do the work as much as possible and use your body in guiding it through the arc just before you release it.

BILL AND JOE GOOD FRIENDS THROUGH IT ALL

"Just Making Change in Managers," Is Wrigley's Statement.

CHICAGO, Sept. 23. (AP)—The Tribune, in a copyrighted story said today that William Wrigley, Jr., club owner, had announced that Rogers Hornsby would be appointed to manage the Chicago Cubs, National league champions, for the season of 1931 and possibly longer.

"There has been no misunderstanding with Joe McCarthy, the present manager," Wrigley was quoted as saying. "We simply decided to make a change, and as proof of my friendship and respect for Joe I will do all I can to assist him in getting another major league position."

"It may be true we will be worse off if the change is made. The move may not be popular with the fans. McCarthy was given free rein in the buying of players, and I believe we have a great team. McCarthy has had five years to prove this, so I don't think there is anything unusual about not engaging him after a stretch such as that."

"We planned," he added, "to offer Hornsby a contract a few days after the season closes. We didn't want to embarrass McCarthy. Now that all sorts of rumors are flying around the matter probably will be taken up immediately."

Hornsby, regarded as one of the greatest infielders ever developed has been out of the game most of this year with injuries. His play last season was held by many to have been a vital factor in the winning of the league championship.

PAR WOULD BE HARDER TO GET

CHICAGO, Sept. 23. (AP)—"Light" Harry Cooper, winner of the recent \$10,000 St. Paul open golf tournament, and the \$5,000 Medinah Athletic club open yesterday, has provided another argument for those who favor making par more difficult.

Cooper yesterday blazed over the number 3 course at Medinah in 33 strokes, seven under par, and three under the previous course record, to win the tournament. He scored 73 on the par 73 number one course, for a 36-hole total of 136—considerable golf on any layout.

His card on the record-smashing 18 holes contained 6 birdies, 1 eagle and only one hole over par. Leo Diegel, former P. G. A. champion, was second with 140, and Horton Smith finished third a stroke behind Diegel.

DOLPH AND MOE NOT SO GOOD

MERION CRICKET CLUB, Ardmore Pa., Sept. 23. (AP)—Harrison R. (Jimmy) Johnson of St. Paul, the defending title-holder, pulled himself back from the brink of disaster today to score a brilliant 73, three over par, and clinch his qualifying place with a 36-hole total of 136 in the National Amateur Golf championship.

The champion was on the fourteenth with a spoon 70 feet from the cup and then holed the putt for a birdie 3, leaving him only one over par. It was his fifth birdie.

Frank Dolph of Portland, Ore., former Western Amateur champion, took a disastrous nine at the 370-yard fifteenth, and finished with 88, which, despite his good start of 74 yesterday, put him out of the running with a grand total of 164.

Johnson was out in 37 and back in 36, shooting five birdies to offset the few mistakes he made. His putting, which came close to knocking him out of the tournament yesterday, was much improved today. Just when he needed to save strokes Jimmy sank a five-footer for a birdie two on the thirteenth and then a whale of a putt, from nearly 70 feet, for a birdie three on the fourteenth.

These two sensational holes acted like a tonic to the sturdy champion, and he never was in danger thereafter.

Bobby Jones was among the first to congratulate the title-holder on his courageous comeback.

Jones, who had a 69 for his first round, and leg the field, was to start his second round an hour later.

Dr. O. J. Willing, the Portland (Ore.) dentist, who equalled par with his opening round, 70, continued this fast pace as he reached the turn in 45. The veteran bagged birdies at the long fourth and sixth to make up for mistakes on the second and third holes.

MERION CRICKET CLUB, Ardmore, Pa., Sept. 23. (AP)—Staging a great comeback, Harrison R. (Jimmy) Johnson of St. Paul, the defending champion, was out in 37 strokes for the first nine holes of his second round in the national amateur golf tournament qualifying test.

Despite his 52 yesterday, he was back in the running and sure of qualifying. It he kept up the same pace.

Don Moe, the big Oregon youngster and one of the "seeded" entries got away to a bad start, taking an eight on the first hole, where he visited three of the nine available traps, and wound up with a 45, one over par, at the turn. He had a 74 yesterday but his qualifying prospects were at least threatened.

Frank Dolph, of Portland, Ore., who had 76 to work on, shared the general tendency to make balloon acecessions by going out in 42, six over par.

Dolph out: 555 654 444—42.

With most of the scores mounting fast and so prominent a star as Roland MacKenzie, Walker cup player, withdrawing from the tournament, George T. Dunlap, Jr., Princeton's holder of the national intercollegiate championship, shot himself into an early lead over the field with a 36-hole total of 147.

Dunlap added a 76 to his 71 of the first day, finishing his round before the favorite and leader, Bobby Jones, who had 69 yesterday went to the first tee. Despite a wretched 83 for his second round, young Don Moe of Portland, Ore., one of the "seeded" favorites, posted a total of 157 for the 36 holes and was virtually certain of his qualifying place. His opening round of 74 saved him.

Moe, alternating good and bad, started back 5-2-6-2, interspersing two birdies on the 11th and 13th with a brace of buzzards on the 10th and 12th.

BILLIARD MATCH MADE

The feature of the card was the six-round bout between Albie Davies, Victoria, B. C., and Mickey Dolan, Portland, highweights, in which Davies received the unanimous decision of the judges and referee. Davies was too clever for Mickey, who appeared sluggish and not up to his usual ripping style. After trailing the first four rounds, Dolan caught Davies with a left-hand smash to the face, which flattened the latter's nose and started the blood. But Davies was still strong enough to carry on.

Red Matson took a four-round decision from Ted Bechtel. Johnny Snell scored a knockout over Terry McHugh in the final of another four-rounder. Harry Nathan beat Bus Eaton to the decision in the opening bout.

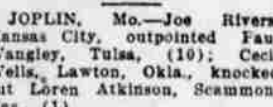
Buster Keaton Out for Cards

Cardinals Know No Bounds as They Go Strong for Pennant

Playing baseball at an .800 clip is championship ball in anybody's league but that is what the St. Louis Cardinals have been doing since August 17 to all but clutch the National League pennant.

On August 16, the Cards had won only six more games than they had lost but on the next day the match was lit that eventually turned the Heydier pennant race into a red hot affair. An even break with the New York Giants in a double header was the start. Since that date the Cards have won 25 of their 35 starts.

The Cardinals moved a little nearer the clinching of the pennant yesterday with a 15 to 7 triumph over the Phillies while the Chicago Cubs were downing the Boston Braves, 6 to 2, in the only games played in the major leagues. The victories of the league leader and the runner-up still left the Cubs trailing by two and one-half games but made their task of winning even more difficult. The Cardinals have five more games on their schedule and need to win only three of them even if the Cub sweep their final four-game series with the Cincinnati Reds. The Cardinals, which were idle yesterday, are four games back of the Cards, and must win all of their remaining five games if the Cardinals lose all of their games.

The result of the two games yesterday left the three contenders looking like this, with games behind leader and game to play:

In defeating the Phillies, the Cardinals hammered a trio of pitchers all over the ball park in the early innings and then coasted to victory behind the steady pitching of Sylvester Johnson and Herman Bell, who was on the mound in the last inning. Mancuso led the attack with four hits in five trips to the plate while Watkins and Bottomley got three each.

Guy Bush pitched the Cubs to their victory over the Braves, holding the losers to six hits while his mates were pounding Seibold, Cunningham and Brandt for 13 safe blows. Included in the Cubs' collection of hits was Mack Wilson's fifty-third home run of the season. Wilson also contributed one of the fielding features, making a sensational running catch of Richbourg's liner.

COUGARS TO BE DARK HORSES

Nine Game Schedule Includes Six Conference Games for Pullman.

PULLMAN, Wash., Sept. 23. (AP)—"I'd give a couple of gas pumps and a lot of gas to beat California and Southern California and hand the University of Washington a box of dynamite," says Babe Hollingbery, who sells gasoline in San Francisco when not coaching football at Washington State college.

"We're out to win," commented the coach. "If we have the luck minus injuries we may have a fair season. We are looking forward to putting some games on our side of the book."

It isn't optimism at the Cougar school, just plain confidence by an ordinarily pessimistic coach.

With a nine game schedule, including six conference contests, it means that Hollingbery is satisfied with his squad. Although facing one of the toughest assignments in years, the Cougars are strong enough to be rated as the dark horse of the Pacific coast conference campaign.

Seven veterans were lost by graduation and filling up the holes, including the quarterback vacancy caused by the departure of Archie Buckley, has caused the veteran coach to lose a lot of sleep.

Elmer Schwartz, leading scorer on the Pacific coast last year, will be back in his old position at full. Porter Lathart, Oscar Jones and Carl Ellingsen are ready for their former halfback jobs. Wilbur Luft and Bill Ton-

kin are arguing over Buckley's signal calling berth with the latter having the edge. Except for one guard berth, Hollingbery has an array of veterans for the line positions, Fred Garrett, 190 pound sophomore, is a likely prospect for the vacant guard post. The veterans include Mel Itein, center; Harold Ahlberg and Glen Edwards, tackles, and George Hurley, guard.

Four lettermen are available for the winning positions, namely, George Hill, John Hurley, Sam Hansen and Lyle Maskal. The first two are the favorites for the starting berths.

Washington State opens the conference season October 4 with the University of California at Berkeley, then romps back to Pullman for a game with Southern California October 11. The Cougars meet Oregon State at Portland November 1.
