

FELDMAN GETS DECISION OVER GENE O'GRADY

According to Report Main Event at Yreka Went To Klamath Boy

YREKA, Calif., Sept. 29, (Special)—Willie Feldman punched his way to a decision over Gene O'Grady in the ten-round main event at the fair grounds pavilion Saturday night, before one of the largest crowds to ever attend a boxing contest here.

Forced throughout most of the fight to do the leading, Feldman, who hails originally from Eastside New York, showed himself complete master of the situation.

Protecting himself in a masterly manner from the periodic onslaughts of O'Grady, who is admittedly a dangerous hitter, Feldman landed blow after blow while they did not stop the big Oregonian, were most annoying. For his part, O'Grady landed but few blows, always coming in contact with the perfect defense of his opponent.

The start of the fight was rather slow, but warmed up as it went into the final rounds, but it was a keen disappointment to those of the fans who were waiting for the much-touted O'Grady knockout.

Steamboat Jackson of Klamath Falls and Joe Blackwell of Eugene, Ore., kept the crowd on its toes throughout a special six-round event, which ended in a draw.

The first three rounds of this fight were fairly even, Blackwell having a slight advantage in the fourth. Steamboat came back strong in the fifth, however, to even the score, and the last round was even.

CARDS FLASH A NEW TWIRLER

Only one place in the lineup of the two big leagues was in doubt as the fans went out for their final games yesterday, and the New York Giants decided that by defeating the Phillies, 7 to 6, in a ten-inning struggle to hold third place in the National league by a one-game margin over the erstwhile league leaders from Brooklyn. The Robins did their best to gain a tie, defeating the Boston Braves, 6 to 3.

The Champion St. Louis Cardinals flashed a new pitching star to take their final game from the Pittsburgh Pirates, 3 to 1. Jerome "Dixie" Dean, recently of the Western and Texas leagues, held the Pirates to three hits, and shut them out after his first major league inning.

The New York Yankees brought forth an old-timer of the hurling ranks, none other than Babe Ruth himself, and won a 9 to 3 decision from the Boston Red Sox. The Babe had not pitched a full game in nine years, but he did it in his old time form yesterday, giving only two hits in the first five innings.

The Chicago Cubs came back to beat Cincinnati, 13 to 11, after the Reds had scored nine runs in the second inning. Washington's second place team scored six times in the fifth to defeat Philadelphia's American league champions, 9 to 4, as four toes of the Mack hurling staff worked briefly. St. Louis and Cleveland divided a wild hitting double header, the Browns collecting 17 hits as they won the first game, 11 to 5, and the Indians unleashing a 20-hit attack to capture the second, 15 to 4. Chicago's White Sox did likewise, hitting safely 15 times as they defeated Detroit, 19 to 7, through a strong finish.

Merle Hufford, fleet-footed triple threat star of the University of Washington football team, will hold down a halfback position again this year. Hufford, all-Pacific coast halfback last season, is one of the greatest grid players ever developed in the Pacific Northwest. He packs a ball with the best in the country, and under the tutelage of Jimmy Phelan, new Washington coach, Hufford should make it interesting for any team in the Pacific coast conference.

The sun-tanned lad from Milton, Ore., is exceptionally fast, runs in a dodging, twisting style that makes it almost impossible to tackle, once he gets in the open. Hufford was virtually the whole Husky team last season.

Enoch W. Bagshaw, former Washington coach, termed Hufford the best backfield man he ever coached, and he took into consideration the two all-American Huskies, George Wilson and "Chuck" Carroll when he made the statement.

WISHBONE WON CARDS HONORS OF THE LEAGUE

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 29, (AP)—It was a wishbone of a chicken that brought the 1930 National League pennant to St. Louis.

Some followers of the old National pastime probably thought right along it was Gabby Street's master-minding or the excellence of the pitching staff or the high explosives contained in Cardinal bats that put the St. Louis entry "in," but such reasoning was a mistake.

The story of why and how the Cardinals won the pennant is this:

Before the team started its last eastern trip which boosted it from fourth to first place, Ray Blades, coach and utility outfielder, invited a number of players to have chicken dinner with him at the home of a farmer friend in Illinois.

Now, it so happened that "Doc" Weaver, club trainer, was given a generous helping of chicken breast in which was embedded a wishbone. After eating the meat he made a statement.

"Boys," he said, "I have the wishbone of a chicken which, according to tradition, brings good luck. Something tells me it is going to be our lucky piece on our eastern trip. Something tells me it is going to bring us a pennant."

No doubt he thought his remarks would be received with jest because at the time—about Sept. 7—the Cards had a fight on their hands to stay in the first division. But the players listened to him gravely. They instructed Weaver to take the wishbone on the trip and see what wonders it would perform.

Cards Believe in Luck

The records show that date the Cardinals made one of the most sensational comebacks in baseball history. Whether the chickenbone had anything to do with it is a matter of conjecture—not conjecture, they firmly believe the lucky piece brought them good fortune. Thus it has come about that "Doc" Weaver has in his possession a relic of chicken anatomy that is revered with almost religious fervor by the players. He keeps it in a velvet-lined box under lock and key.

Every day during the rush down the stretch for the pennant a strange rite has been observed in the Cardinals' dressing room. A ceremonial was held in "Doc" Weaver's office. "Doc" opened the box containing the wishbone, filed by and placed hands upon the wishbone. This done, they fared forth to battle.

And the good office of the bones will be invoked daily as the Cardinals do battle with the Athletics.

LONDON LAUDS WINNER BOBBY

LONDON, Sept. 29, (AP)—Bobby Jones today ranked with the coming imperial conference, and the world economic depression and the German and Spanish political situations as a subject of editorial comment in the British press.

The Yorkshire Post said: "Bobby Jones has set a record which may well stand so long as golf is played." The Daily Telegraph, agreeing, said: "Who knows but that this year may prove to have witnessed the most considerable feat since the royal and ancient game first cast its spell over us."

The usually restrained Manchester Guardian says Jones is a "world wonder." The Daily Mail hails the American as the "complete embodiment of the grand old golfing spirit, the decline of which is often deplored. He is so staunch a conservative that he has scarcely even tried steel shafts. Hickory is good enough for him."

Little Left in Elgin, Oregon, After Big Fire

ELGIN, Ore., Sept. 29, (AP)—Fire causing \$50,000 damage, destroyed a block of buildings here Saturday. Six residences, the Methodist church and the Masonic hall were burned. A brush fire in the middle of the block spread on a high wind to the church, and from there to other buildings. Awnings in other parts of the town were set afire by cinders. A cinder falling on the roof of the Masonic Building, fired it.

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Football Warms up The Fans for Fast Season of the Game

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 29, (AP)—Preliminary skirmishes were a thing of the past today as the big far western eleven settled down to the important business of preparing for next Saturday's football battles.

In three games next week end, Pacific Coast conference standings will be involved. Southern California's Trojans got off to a flying start with a 52-0 win over the University of California at Los Angeles Bruins last Saturday but the easy victory brought no let-down in the preparations of the Trojans. They will entertain Oregon State, a tough foe, next weekend. The Northerners already have demonstrated their capabilities with two non-conference wins, 48-0 over Willamette and 16-6 over Gonzaga.

Victors in opening contests, California and Washington State will meet at Berkeley in a game of conference bearing. California's contribution to the 1930 football operated with a shift Saturday to defeat Santa Clara, 19-7. It was the first time a Bear eleven used this style of play and some 40,000 persons were satisfied Coach "Nibs" Price's warriors will fill the bill this season. Washington State menawhile crushed College of Idaho, 47-12, but showed a decided weakness against passing attacks, so weak in fact, Coach Orin Hollingbery sent them through a hard workout after the game.

The third conference encounter will bring together Washington and Montana at Seattle. Washington overwhelmed Whitman 48-0. Saturday although the sizeable score failed to impress its new coach, Jimmy Phelan, late of Purdue and exponent of the Notre Dame system of play. Coach Phelan made several pointed remarks to the effect his crew was lacking in the basic principles of the game and that hard practice would be in order this week. Montana showed considerable power in beating Mount St. Charles 52-0 and the victory buoyed the hopes of Grizzly followers for the forthcoming game. Last year Montana held Washington to a 6-6 tie.

Oregon to Play Drake

Coach Clarence Spears, who transferred his activities from Minnesota to Oregon this year, was enroute with his Webfooters squad to Chicago where a night game will be played with Drake, next Friday. In two practice contests, Oregon defeated Pacific 20-0, and Willamette, 51-0.

Other games next week end will pit Stanford against Santa Clara and Idaho against College of Idaho, both non-conference affairs. Stanford has bowled over two opponents to date, Army and the San Francisco Olympic club, by scores of 32-0 and 18-0, respectively. Idaho's first start proved disastrous as it lost to Montana State, 7-6, last week end.

Drake Team Unknown

ing, and the Beavers winning the second, 6 to 0. The Seals tied the first, 6 to 6, in the ninth, and hammered three off Joe Cascarilla in the tenth. Fred Ortman allowed six hits in the night-cap, while the Beavers hammered Davis for 15.

Oakland took the series, 4 to 7, away from the Missions last week. The Reds, in a heavy bombardment, won, 9 to 3, in the first game, but the Oaks, with Howard Craghead pitching, came back to take the final, 3 to 1. The Missions took only two hits off Craghead. Buzz Arlett was ordered from the first game when he threw a bat at Leiber, who was pitching for the Reds.

Los Angeles and Seattle will stage a double-header today, as will San Francisco and Portland, to make up for games lost on account of the weather.
