HITLER'S PAPER THREATENS

MUNICH, Bavaria, Oct. 1. (AP)—Adolf Hitler's newspaper, "Völkischer Beobachter," today published a warning to the government if Chancellor Brüning resorts to extra-parliamentary means to force his program of financial reform "this government will become illegal thereby by summon the people to similar illegality." The newspaper statement was taken in government circles to mean Hitler was ready for another push in spite of his promise of peace, if the government leaders should sufficiently irritate him.

BIG BLOCK OF INSURANCE

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 1. (AP)—The state's automobile insurance, covering from \$10,000 to \$20,000 liability and \$5000 property damage on each state-owned car has been awarded by the state board of control to the industrial insurance company through its agents, Jelders & Smith of Salem and the City Insurance agency of Portland. Premiums on this insurance amount to \$9512 which is a saving of \$2743 compared with premiums paid last year, and is said to be considerably less than one-half of the rates that would be charged without contract or to private individuals.

PENNEY TALKS ON CHAIN STORE

CHICAGO, Oct. 1. (AP)—The "community-mindedness of chain stores" was a point J. C. Penney, founder of the J. C. Penney company, sought to emphasize to the national chain store convention delegates today.

Chain stores, he declared, succeed in proportion to the extent to which they identify themselves with community interests. "No business can reach its highest development in any locality unless it is community-minded," he said.

"American people are keenly sensitive to local activities. We are a race of joiners. The combination of joiner spirit with good common sense has brought increased sales volume to chain stores."

Penney said the chain store fulfills one definite obligation in citizenship when it "places the stamp of business approval on a community by selecting it for a location."

MARKET QUOTATIONS

PORTLAND, Oct. 1. (AP)—Even though some price shading was resorted to, wholesale butter sales moved slowly on the Portland market early today. Heavy offerings of storage stock slowed demand. Produce exchange quotations were unchanged.

Egg receipts were moderate and both fresh and storage stock were getting fair demand at steady quotations.

In the wholesale fruit and vegetable trade prices were unchanged on most lines but red peppers at about 25 cents a crate and artichokes at \$1.50 a dozen were slightly cheaper.

Grange dealers were not inclined to raise orange prices for local distribution although California advances have been announced due to the closing of the Valencia season with the naval season opening not due for six weeks yet.

Government market news service reported: With initial movement of naval oranges six weeks distant, and growers' stocks of Valencia rapidly diminishing, all California orange prices were substantially advanced this week, small sizes as much as \$1.00 per case.

First highly-colored fancy and extra-fancy Jonathans and Delicious apples from Yakima are obtaining good distribution in Portland this week. Continued liberal offerings of local apples will probably prevent any long-continued activity with this fruit however.

Local Bartlett pears are practically cleaned up, and the present Bartlett movement in on storage stock. Western storages will probably dispose of their entire Bartlett holdings within the next two weeks.

Local lettuce and cauliflower is improving in quality, and are now supplying the Portland market entirely, without aid from outside points.

Portland is now forwarding several truckloads of tomatoes daily to Puget Sound points.

HARD TIMES IN GERMANY—BERLIN, Oct. 1. (AP)—Drastic slashing of government expenditures, involving salary cuts for public officials and employees, beginning with President Von Hindenburg himself, a halt to the upward march of taxes weighing on industry, and a clear cut determination to restore German and foreign confidence in the nation's financial future were the outstanding features of Chancellor Brüning's new financial program announced publicly today. Unemployment insurance, which lately has been a tremendous drain on the treasury, will be made sternly self-supporting.

FATHER OF JAS. GRIEVE DIES—MEDFORD, Ore., Oct. 1. (AP)—John Grieve, Prospect, Ore., Southern Oregon pioneer, died Tuesday at the age of 89. He was an early day assessor in Jackson county.

Bears Like Hand Painted Trail Signs

PORTLAND, Oct. 1. (AP)—Major John D. Guthrie, assistant regional forester, said today so appetizing are the hand-painted trail signs erected by the United States forest service that more than 400 worth of them have been eaten by bears in the Pacific northwest during the year.

Whether the bears are particularly fond of government paint or the succulent straight grain pine boards has not been determined.

Forestry officials said the signs probably would be "dosed" hereafter or made of wood known to timbermen as "atinkwood."

PENDLETON, Ore., Oct. 1. (AP)—A drizzling rain yesterday made wheat belt farmers smile. Conditions for fall wheat seeding improved. Moisture was fast eliminating the fire hazard in national forest areas.

SEATTLE, Oct. 1. (AP)—Patrolman W. G. Cottle died here last night of gun wounds inflicted by a man he accused and attempted to question in a residential district Saturday night. He was the second policeman slain here in less than three weeks by unapprehended assailants.

Patrolman Gene W. Perry died recently from wounds received when shot September 12 in an attempted holdup of a payroll messenger he was escorting. Robert J. Sutcliffe, 31, arrested in connection with the shooting of Cottle, admitted he had criminal records in Portland, Los Angeles and Phoenix. Detectives said they were inclined to believe him innocent, although he is still being held.
