Athletics in Good Condition
The day of the first game found every member of the Athletics in the best of condition. George (Mule) Haas, out for a part of the season with injuries, was pronounced fit and ready to play every game.

Players on a team today nonchalantly talked of taking the games for the supreme championship in their stride. They said that today's opening contest was "just a ball game," out of the ordinary only because President Hoover had a reservation with a number of his cabinet officers and other high officials of the government.

Before the President
"It's not every day, of course, that we can play before the president," said Manager Street, "and have him toss out the first ball. But even the chief executive will not excite us. We'll do our best, and nobody can do any more."

Manager Mack made it clear that his "boys" were not inclined to hold their National League rivals lightly and expected the hardest kind of a battle.

Great Series Expected
"It should be a great series," said the veteran manager. Tyus Raymond Cobb, who retired undefeated as the "greatest player," was back from his Georgia hills to pick his old team to repeat. Nap Rucker, the Grove of his day when he was a southpaw for Brooklyn, coped his fellow Georgian's bet by suggesting the Cardinals would break through the American League defense as they did in 1925.

Capacity Crowd Expected
Philadelphia, with two world's series in two years, was not so excited this year as last when the Athletics brought home their first championship since 1914. Every indication pointed to a capacity crowd of 33,000 but the claiming of tickets proceeded under orderly conditions and comparatively few hardy souls lined up in chairs, on soap boxes and automobile seats to wait for the opening of the bleacher ticket office and the sale of 3,000 reserved seats.

In watching the progress of legislation affecting taxes, measures before the legislature, and those submitted to the people at elections are analyzed and discussed with citizens and taxpayers all over the state.

Come Into the Kitchen

This is the season of the Quince—butters, jellies, preserves and marmalades. What wonderful possibilities for touching up a meal are found in a basket of quinces.

When you start your "quincing," provide yourself with a good sharp knife and three dishes—one for the fruit, one for the skins and cores, and one for the imperfect pieces—nothing need be wasted.

Quince Preserves
Pare and core 15 good sized quinces and cut them in quarters or eighths. Cook in a small amount of water until rather tender and add to a syrup made of 2 cups sugar and 1 cup water. Cook very gently for about 20 minutes. Put into sterilized jars and seal.

Quince and Pear Preserves
Using half the quantity of quinces add to a syrup along with the partially cooked quinces an equal amount of pears. Cook until fairly thick. Seal. Pineapple may be added to the quinces while cooking in the syrup.

Quince Jelly
To the quince skins add the small and imperfect fruit—cut fine—and water enough to cover. Cook until very soft, press thru cheesecloth bag, then drip thru flannel or some heavy cloth for a clear sparkling jelly.

Boil 5 minutes, skin, add 3 cups sugar to 4 cups juice and continue boiling until it sheets from the spoon. Skim again if necessary and pour into sterilized jars. When cool and set, seal with paraffin.

Quince Marmalade
No need to pare the quinces—just wipe them and cut fine. Cover with water and boil until soft. Press thru sieve. Add 2 1/2 cups sugar to 4 cups of pulp and boil ten minutes or until the syrup sheets from the spoon.

Pickled Quinces
Cook or steam quince quarters until fairly tender. Then
