

## ANOTHER BIG LUMBER KING AMONG DEAD

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Oct. 3. (AP)—M. J. Scanlon, pioneer lumberman, who aided in establishing a model village for his workmen in the Powell River section in British Columbia, died yesterday at his home here. He was 63 years old.

The village was built in connection with Mr. Scanlon's \$50,000,000 plant there, devoted to manufacturing newsprint, and it has homes for several thousand persons.

Mr. Scanlon was president of the Brooks-Scanlon Lumber company here; the Brooks-Scanlon corporation in Florida; the Bahama-Cuban company, and the Powell River company, British Columbia.

A widow and a daughter survive.

**Great Record Made**  
PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 3. (AP)—Baseball record books today revealed that the world's series contenders shared an extraordinary fielding feat in the second game, the St. Louis Cardinals, by making only four assists, broke the world's series record in a single game, and the Philadelphia Athletics, with only five, tied the previous mark.

The Cardinals actually should have gone through the game with only three assists, for one of the four was due to a dropped third strike that forced Mancuso to make a throw to first base for a putout. Adams, Frisch and Geubert had the other assists. The record in this feature of defensive play was set in 1921 by the New York Yankees and equaled by the same club in 1927, the Pittsburgh Pirates in 1927 and the Athletics in one game last year. The low total of nine assists for the two clubs yesterday bettered the two club mark of 10 established by the Yankees and Pirates on October 6, 1927.

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said, "should form the basis of even more amplified plans in the future. But in the long view the equally important thing is prevention. We would need have less concern about what to do in bad times if we discovered and erected in good times further safeguards against the excesses which lead to these depressions."

**May Revise Laws**  
Although he did not believe the American form of government could solve economic problems by "direct action," the president indicated he might favor a reduction in the capital gains tax and revision of certain sections of the transportation act as safeguards against future business ills.

He said an "inquiry might develop that our system of taxes upon capital gains directly encourages inflation by strangling the free movement of land and securities."

**Expand Public Works**  
As for the transportation act, he asserted: "During a period of depression the soundest and most available method of relief to unemployment is expansion of public works and construction in these private industries is about four or five times that in public works."

"During the present depression these industries have done their

part, but especially the railways have been handicapped by some provisions of the transportation act of 1920. With wider public vision the railways could be strengthened into a great balance wheel of stability. We have need to consider all of our economic legislation, whether banking, utilities, or agriculture, or anything else, from the point of view of its effect upon business stability."

duct in cold storage plants. Take the pear crop in Medford. It comes on within two months. A dumping of that crop would ruin the orchard business. With ice and cold storage there is permitted an orderly marketing into Liverpool and London as well as points in America.

"One Medford cold storage plant cares for 600 cars at a time. Since the Modoc Northern railroad, which is a part of the Southern Pacific system, has been completed, we get the Medford pears in trainloads at the Klamath Ice and Cold Storage plant. They come around by Black Butte. We handle fifty-five cars at a time, and re-ice them for the east. The railroad allows us from one to two hours to ice a long train of cars, and we do it. From here the cars go east and are not iced

again for thirty-six hours, or a distance of 500 miles. We have now handled exactly 3,000 cars of pears from Rogue River valley this season.

"I want to add that we make two kinds of ice—one is the white ice for the railroads, and one is the clear ice for the homes. Our plant is an added industry to Klamath Falls, for we use labor, water and power. We ship out no product of the country, except water. Our pay roll is large, and is of value to the community.

Mr. Collier does not worry about the "dry ice" so much talked of just now, for he says it can not be controlled as to temperature. He does not think what is known as the "rapid freezing" process is important, and intends to make an investigation of it with the idea of installing it in the plant here.
