Lindbergh's Saving Ability



This picture shows Miss Edna Freeman standing by the "Spirit of St. Louis," the now historic plane used by Lindy to make the first non-stop flight across the Atlantic ocean. Colonel Lindbergh's ability to save money was one of the controlling factors that made the great achievement possible of flying from New York to Paris. Lindbergh had courage, skill, foresight, persistence and the spirit of high adventure. But in addition, he had \$2,000 which he had saved from his wages as a mail pilot. It was that \$2,000 which made possible the \$15,000 underwritings by which the flight was financed. Once again the controlling factor in a conspicuous success was a savings account.
