Jack Oakie, star of "The Social Lion," and wise-cracking performer of its title role at the Pelican theatre, began making smart remarks when he was but a lad in one figure, and happily he has carried that sparkling propensity as part of his personal resources until today, when he is in two figures—his early twenties.

It all started when folks tried to tease the 6-year-old Oakie about his freckles. He still has the freckles, but there are no more tears, for Jack has taught all would-be taunters that he is one of the world's quickest-tongued retort men.

Paramount picked Oakie from the vodvil stage a little more than a year ago, and placed him in "The Fleet's In." He did a bit part very well and, a short time later, he naturally rated parts in the talkies. Thus it was that the public rocked with glee at his wise cracks in "The Dummy," "Sweetie," "Fast Company," and others.

When movie fans everywhere began referring to Oakie as "The Wizard of Wise-Cracking," Paramount was deciding that the boy who made good by the snappy-answer route was deserving of stardom. He is seen as a garage mechanic, former enlisted cavalryman, who can play polo so well that he gets a place on the team at an exclusive country club. He tries to make good with the ritzy girls at the club, and they turn out to be his near-Waterloo. But never mind the plot—the important thing is that here's Jack Oakie cracking wise in his own inimitable fashion in a laugh-provoking play that will keep you mirthful until long after you go home and put out the cat.

AT THE PINE TREE
The law lost a good actor when Edward G. Robinson decided to

go on the stage. And now he has progressed to the motion picture screen and will be seen and heard in a featured role with the ravishing Mary Nolan in "Outside the Law" at the Pine Tree theatre now.

Arriving in New York from his native Roumania while still a young lad, Robinson attended the public schools and later entered Columbia university for the study of law. Amateur theatricals altered his plans, however, and the stage forthwith became the center of his attention. Training in the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, followed by several seasons in stock, prepared him for in-

stant popularity when he first appeared on Broadway.

Appearing in New York in the leading role of "The Racket" at the height of his stage career, Robinson went on tour at the head of the company, which eventually played an engagement in Los Angeles. So favorably did he impress the producers of motion pictures that he was persuaded to abandon the stage for the screen and was immediately placed under contract by Universal.

"Outside the Law," directed by Tod Browning, is an unusually thrilling story of the underworld, tracing the careers of two sweethearts, both crooks, who fare bravely forth together in their final encounter with the law. Owen Moore plays the leading male role opposite Miss Nolan.
