PENNANT MAY BE WON BY EITHER

Haines and Gilbert Were
Big Shots for National
League

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 6 (AP)—Connie Mack's Philadelphia Athletics and Gabby Street's St. Louis Cardinals today were right back where they started the world's series at Shibe Park, Philadelphia, last Wednesday. With four games behind them, the champions of the American and National league stood all even, with two victories each, the home team winning every contest played.

The two St. Louis victories made a new National League "high" since 1926 when the Cardinals won the series.

After the fifth game today, the battlefield will again be transferred, the players moving in a body back to Philadelphia for at least one, contest, and possibly two.

Good Support Given

The Cardinals levelled the series by giving 37-year-old Jesse Haines, their knuckleball expert, support in keeping with his mastery pitching. The score was 3 to 1 and Lefty Grove, Connie Mack's left-handed ace, was the victim, although the defeat was not entirely the fault of the tall southpaw.

Grove held the Cardinals to five hits, only one more than the total allowed by Big Jesse, but all the safeties were scored in two innings, two in the third and three in the fourth. With perfect support, however, Grove would have escaped with one run scored against him, a bad throw by the usually reliable Jimmy Dykes, permitting the winning run to score.

Haines pitched good enough ball to win most games, world's series or just common ordinary contests during the season. He was picked for three hits and one run in the first inning, but after that he yielded only one isolated single. He was wild, issuing four passes, but had control in the pinches when it counted.

Fine Fielding Helped

Smart fielding by Charley Gelbert, the Cardinals' young shortstop, gave the Ohio pitcher, who is the senior of the St. Louis staff, much satisfaction. Gelbert started a fast double play, after a sensational stop, and converted a near-hit into an assist when a hit would have been painful to the feelings of the St. Louis fans. Ray Blades, who is carried on the Cardinals roster as a coach but plays right field when a left-hander pitches for the opposition, made a brilliant catch at the expense of Mickey Cochrane.

Haines and Gelbert were the National League's "big shots" in the fourth game, both on the defense and offense. Haines, who is a hitting pitcher, drove Gelbert home with the first run of the game for his side, after the youngster had tripled. Haines was simply keeping up his record of hard hitting in the world series. In the 1926 series with the New York Americans, not only did he shut out the Yankees at the Sportsman's Park but he contributed to the Cardinal cause with a home run.

Base on Balls
After scoring the first run of the game, drove in the last one, and finished with a perfect day at bat, "two for two" as he drew Grove's base on balls.

The fifth game of the series was expected to bring two former starting pitchers back into the lineup, Burleigh Grimes, the veteran spitballer, for the Cardinals and George Earnshaw, the Athletics' giant righthander. Grimes pitched the first game for the National League at Philadelphia and was defeated, 5 to 2. Earnshaw won the second game of the series, 4 to 1.

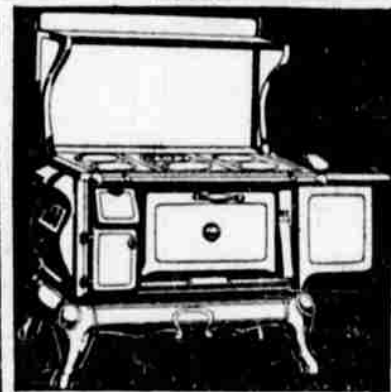
