

SOUP RECIPES ARE OFFERED BY ECONOMIST

Suggestions for Important Part of Menu Presented

Suggestions for important part of menu given. Double purpose of ushering in of main course and health builder filled. Soup, that ever prominent item on the dinner or luncheon menu is to be treated at some length at the cooking school being held this week, under the direction of Miss Goodwin at the high school. And soups deserve the important place they hold on the daily menu, according to Miss Goodwin for they serve the double purpose of ushering the main course and as an important health-builder, too. Soups suitable for various dinner plans are to be discussed. A few suggestions are given.

Soup
Two No. 1 cans any vegetable soup or puree; one cup water; salt, pepper; one six ounce can evaporated milk. Combine soup and water and heat to boiling point; then add evaporated milk and reheat. Add pepper and salt if necessary.

Cream of Tomato Soup
Three and one-half cups tomatoes; three sprigs parsley; one-half teaspoon thyme; two slices onion; two and one-quarter teaspoons sugar; three quarters teaspoon salt; two and one-half cups thin white sauce. Roll tomatoes with all the seasonings five minutes, then rub through a sieve. There should be two cups of liquid and pulp. If not, add water. Four tomato mixture slowly in to hot white sauce when ready to serve, stirring to blend well.

Cream of Asparagus Soup
Two cups asparagus stalks; 1/4 cup diced celery; two cups boiling water; 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons butter; 1 tablespoon flour; one cup evaporated milk; one cup chicken broth; grated cheese. Cook asparagus stalks and celery gently in boiling salted water, 25 minutes. Prepare a white sauce of the butter, flour and evaporated milk and chicken broth. Force asparagus and celery through a strainer. Add to white sauce. Re-heat, season and serve with bit of grated cheese in the center of each cup. The cooked tips may be added to the soup just before serving.

London Opposes Russian Dumping Of All Products

LONDON, Oct. 7. (AP)—The London Times editorially today said Russian dumping of grain on European markets was "clearly due first and foremost to desperate need of the soviet government for funds to finance their five year coalition plan."
"While there is no wish to interfere with development of legitimate Russian trade it is intolerable that British markets should be devaluated to the detriment of British producers, both in the Dominion and in Britain by dumping of the kind to which the Soviet is resorting to save its five year plan."

Young Football Player Is Killed

DELTA, Utah, Oct. 7. (AP)—Joseph M. Howell, Jr., Delta high school football player, died here yesterday of complications resulting from injuries received in football practice last week.
The boy was a grandson of the late congressman Joseph Howell of Logan. He was born in Washington, D. C. The fatality was the second among Utah high school gridirons this season. Orville Henrie, 18, Ferron, died Saturday of a fractured skull received in a game Friday.

OAKRIDGE, Ore., Oct. 7. (AP)—J. B. Hills, 70, Lane county pioneer, today was lost in the Dome Rock section, while 15 men sought him after he became lost from a hunting party. Hills was hunting with Charles Neet, who spread the alarm.

HOTEL OPENING IS ANNOUNCED

Arrangements Completed For Gala Affair When Hotel Elks Opens

Arrangements are being completed for the grand opening of the new Hotel Elks on Saturday. It was announced last night by William Duvall, proprietor.

A gala opening to which the public is invited is being planned when the opening ceremonies will be held and the guests will be shown through the city's newest and most modern hostelry.

Built in "L" Shape
Finishing touches are now being put on the Hotel Elks building in which the hotel is located. The building runs from Main to Pine street just east of Eleventh street, and is built in an "L" shape, allowing the maximum amount of light and ventilation. The building is strictly fire-proof and is of the latest type in construction. It is artistically decorated with ornamental brick and tile in front, and a color scheme is carried out in the interior decorations.

Details Being Planned
Mr. Duvall is placing the best of furniture and equipment in the hotel, and each room is furnished and decorated in a color scheme.

The hotel contains nearly 100 modern rooms on the two floors and is serviced with an elevator. Details of the opening have not been completely arranged by Mr. Hirvi and Mr. Duvall but will be announced within a few days. Mr. Duvall stated last night.

COOPERATION IS NEEDED FACTOR

Cooperation with fire departments by individual citizens is a most important factor in the successful prevention of fire losses, states the insurance department of the United States chamber of commerce, which also finds that more firemen lose their lives on the way to fires than at the fires themselves.

It would seem enough for firemen to jeopardize their existence while actually working to preserve lives and property. Rules have been laid down often for the guidance of motorists, as well as smokers, which are honored mainly in the breach—especially those requiring motorists to draw up to the curb, parking beside fire hydrants and in the immediate vicinity of fire stations. These are prohibited by law, but it might also be remembered that such acts are violations of the rights of fellow citizens whose property is endangered. Crowding too close to firemen fighting a blaze often seriously impairs their activities.

In the course of their duty firemen must make frequent inspections of property. It is their business to assist the property owner in preventing fire for his sake as well as the sake of his neighbors. Consequently, they should be treated with the greatest courtesy and given assistance wherever possible. If, as is frequently the case, it is necessary for them to issue an order requesting that a dangerous hazard be corrected, cooperation should be offered readily and cheerfully. Such orders are never issued indiscriminately.

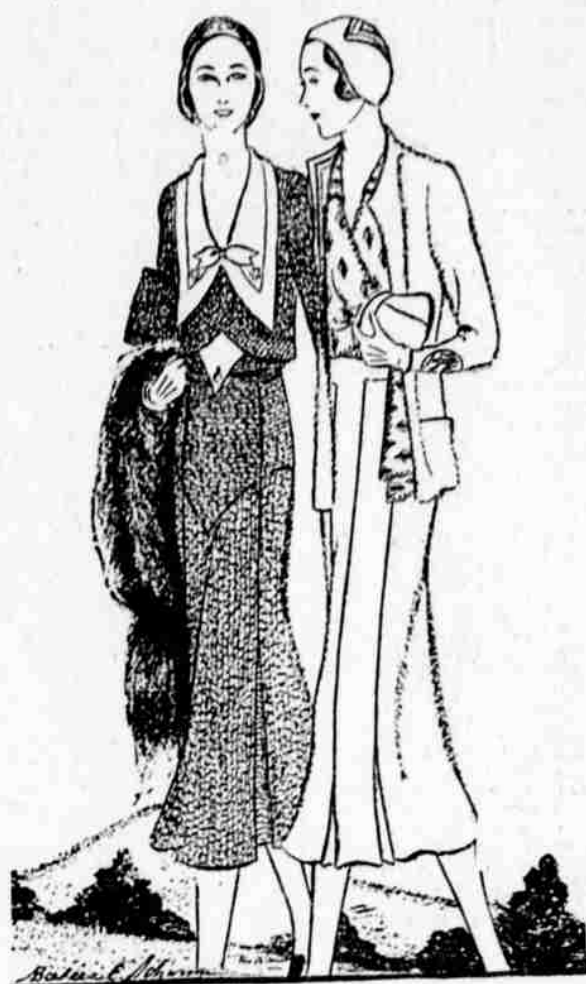
SALEM WILL VOTE

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 7. (AP)—At the November election the people of Salem will vote on the question whether they want the city to acquire water power rights on North Santiam river and Marion Lake. This will be done to show the good faith of the city when city officials go before the Federal Power commission and the state reclamation commission to ask for the permits, filings for which have already been made. An ordinance bill to place a charter amendment on the ballot authorizing a \$5,000,000 bond issue to acquire municipal light and power was defeated.
