Boyle Tells About Copco's Proposed Developments

John C. Boyle, formerly a member of the California Oregon Power company's staff in Klamath Falls, and now an official at the Medford office, is visiting in Portland. Mr. Boyle is interested in the Copco's attempt to have a permit granted for their project on the Klamath river. The following article appeared in Tuesday morning's Oregonian:

"H. C. Boyle, an official of the Oregon California Power company, with headquarters at Medford, is registered at the Hotel Portland. This week Governor Norblad has announced a public hearing to discuss the application of the power company for a power site at Grant canyon on Klamath river. The company officials say they are ready to proceed immediately with construction, and \$4,000,000 has been set aside for the undertaking.

"Several hundred men will be employed in clearing and preliminary work, such as laying a railroad and establishing camps and bringing in equipment, and when the job is under way 1500 men will be on the payroll. The application has been held up because of political agitation for public ownership, although Klamath Falls business men are urging the granting of the application.

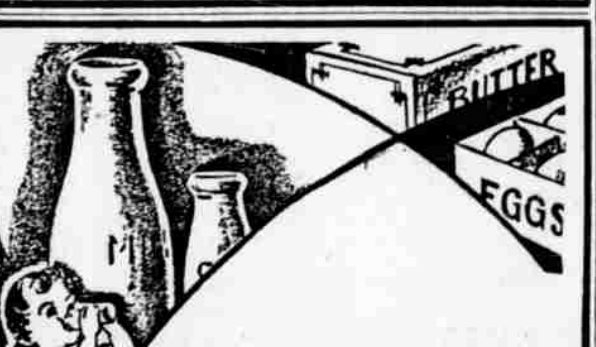

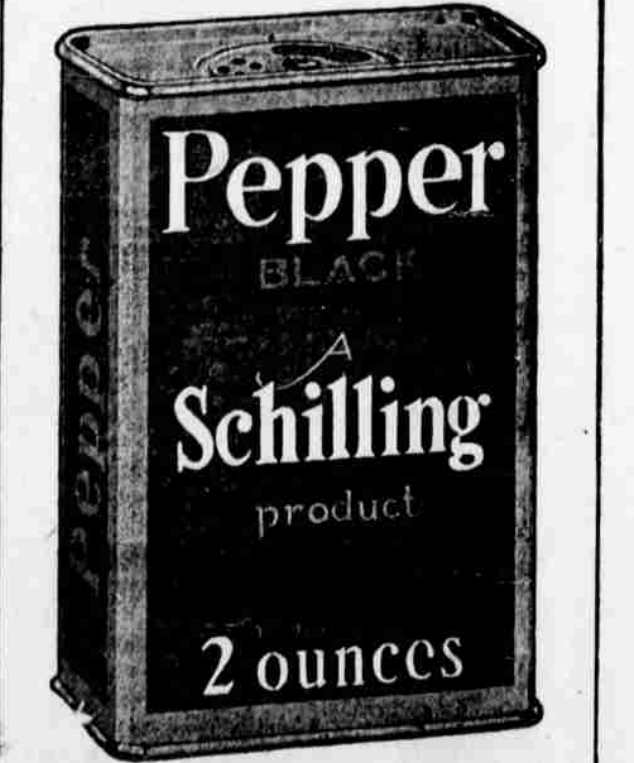
