

# PERCY WELLS IS SPEAKER OF DAY

With Cliff Dunn, head of Rotary at Salem with the Klamath delegation appearing before the State Reclamation Board, Andy Collier took the president's chair in Rotary Friday noon at the Pelican Grille.

It was "Columbus Day" and P. O. Landry, while not having a speaking acquaintance with Christopher Columbus, acted as emcee and introduced Percy Wells, who talked on the great explorer.

Mr. Wells insisted that history actually began for this continent 428 years ago, or 1492, when Christopher Columbus, son of a wool comber in Genoa, had a vision of learning of his attained height with a knowledge of several languages and also astronomy, he appeared before the court of Spain asking for three ships with which he might cruise the seas in an endeavor to find a new route to rich Asiatic country. This country attracted many people because of the riches obtainable but the route to reach these treasures was difficult.

It was the mission of Columbus to find a sea route to Asia, and after matching with the king and queen of Spain, Mr. Wells said that Isabella fell for the talk of Columbus and pledged her jewels to equip his expedition. For seventy days the little ships cruised the seas and finally sighted land on the island of Cuba.

The speaker reviewed many phases of that eventful journey, but he stoutly insisted that old Christopher had his eye on the business end of the trip, for he drove a bargain with the court of Spain which gave him one-tenth of all the wealth he might find and obtain on the journey as well as a title for himself and family if he found a new country.

"He found the new country and that is why we are here today," said Professor Wells. "But Columbus did not find the expected wealth, neither did he find the short route to the Asiatic country for which he was looking. He died a poor, discontented man."

Fire Prevention Talked.

George P. Donahue, who can read a fire insurance policy upside down, gave a very interesting talk on fire prevention in the nation and quoted statistics that were alarming. He said every day there are 880 homes and five school houses burn in this land of the brave and home of the free. The toll of fire loss from homes used to light cigars and cigarettes reached a terrific amount each year. He asked that all Rotarians investigate for themselves the fire protection in the schools and public buildings and urged general support of the \$75,000 city measure.

# Mt. Lassen Park Loop Highway Open For Travel

REDDING, Calif., Oct. 10. (AP)—The Lassen National volcanic park loop highway was open today, after it had been tentatively approved yesterday by Superintendent Walker L. Collins, who completed a trip around the new road.

Approval of the United States bureau was expected within a short time.

The road is 27 miles long, entering the park at Mineral Point, and passing east of Lassen Peak, it emerges at Viola Port, and passes approximately 2,000 feet below the summit on the other side. A checking station will be erected at Manzanita Lake.

President H. W. Adams, of the Western Pacific railroad, and a party of officials of the line, were due to tour the park today, entering by Mineral and passing through the east side, thence to the Poison Lake station site from which the Western Pacific will run a bus service to the park.

# Body of Man Is Recovered From The Willamette

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 10. (AP)—The body of a man found in the Willamette river seven miles north of Salem Thursday afternoon was identified today as that of Arthur Boline, patient at the Oregon state hospital for the insane. Identification was made by Deputy Coroner Dale Taylor from an admittance card to the state fair signed by hospital authorities. Boline was given the card on the morning of Sept. 23, as he was considered a trustworthy patient. No evidence of suicidal tendencies had been noted during his confinement at the hospital.

Boline was sent to the state hospital February 11 of this year from Astoria. He formerly worked at the Fisher Logging company there.

# Volstead Law Is Live Issue at Legion Meeting

BOSTON, Oct. 10. (AP)—It appeared today that Charles F. Howard had persuaded his fellow committee members they should recommend to the convention of the American Federation of Labor modification of the Volstead law to permit manufacture and sale of 2.75 per cent beer. He threatened to fight the committee report from the convention floor if repeal of the 18th amendment were recommended. Howard, president of the international typographical union is the only dry on the committee.

# New World Record For Plane Loops Set by L. Voelpel

DALLAS, Texas, Oct. 10. (AP)—Lyman Voelpel claims to have set a world's record for consecutive loops in a glider plane at Love field here today, when he completed 17. He held the former high number, 12, achieved at the Chicago world show. The flyer was towed aloft behind "The Greater St. Louis" endurance plane piloted by Dale Jackson, co-holder of the sustained flight record. The glider diver for its first loop from an altitude of 5000 feet and 25 minutes later landed.

# Wheat Price Unchanged in Chicago Mart

CHICAGO, Oct. 10. (AP)—Fluctuating nervously without any decided trend, and with transactions of only moderate volume, grain values early today kept near to yesterday's finish. Relative firmness of the Liverpool wheat market helped to make wheat price changes here narrow, and so likewise did opinions expressed by trade authorities that holders of most commodities were showing a disposition to resist further downward pressure. Opening 1-3-4 off, Chicago wheat future deliveries showed afterward numerous but only fractional alterations.

# Hull of Old Slave Ship Lies Intact Up On The Beach

ST. CROIX, Virgin Islands, Oct. 11. (AP)—Comparatively sound, despite its great age, the hull of the only remaining slave ship known to have brought "black ivory" to the coast of North America, lies upon the beach. The vessel is the property of Cornelius Penhony, and bears the name of the "Vigilant." She was operated under the Danish flag until slavery was abolished in the Virgin Islands in 1848.

So speedy was the Vigilant that she was never captured. She is American built, and is reputed to be 150 years old.

# PENDLETON AUTHORIZED TO PURCHASE LAND

PENDLETON, Oct. 10. (AP)—The city council today authorized officials to purchase 120 acres land near the government airport from the chamber for construction of a municipal airport with hangar, modern runways and lighting. The purchase price was \$12,000.

# PRICES ON WOOL HAVE BEEN WEAK IN BOSTON MART

BOSTON, Oct. 10. (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin of Boston will say tomorrow:

The wool trade has passed thru another quiet week. Some business is being done at the lower levels noted a week ago, but it is inconsequential. Prices are hardly changed for the week.

"The manufacturing position develops slowly. A somewhat better feeling exists in the woolen end of the trade. On the whole, however, the market seems to be still unsettled, with moderate business in goods being placed from week to week."

"The foreign markets are steadier for the moment on the basis of the new low prices established at London and in the primary markets of the southern hemisphere. The question agitating the minds of the trade is whether this is the final phase of the price decline."

"Fall Texas wools are moving partly to the dealers and partly to the co-operatives at advances of 15 to 20 cents to the latter and around 20-21 cents to dealers, for the best wools."

"Mohair is dull, with a few small sales of original Texas hair to about 35 cents."

The Bulletin will publish the following quotations:

Domestic—Oregon: Fine and FM staple 73-75; fine and FM FR combing, 67-70; fine and FM clothing 65-67; Valley No. 1, 67-68.

Mohair—Oregon 35-40, domestic grading, first combing 50-52, good carding 34-35.

# Undertone Firm

BOSTON, Oct. 10. (AP)—Business in wool is consigned to a few houses and buying is distinctly on a hand to mouth basis. Prices continue soft on some lines, but there are no indications of a general decline. On the contrary, prices are showing a firm undertone, and concessions from asking prices appear limited. Considerable interest is being shown in Australian market. A firmer trend in prices after a decline at the opening of the week in Australia has stimulated a little more courageous view of the price situation in this market.
