Voting For Meier

NO republican need feel any pang of being disloyal to his party by voting for Julius L. Meier for governor this year.

Meier is and always has been a republican—voted the ticket and supported republican principles.

The action of the Coos Bay republican county central committee when it voted to support Mr. Meier is in line with republican voters all over the state.

This is a situation when the republican party is not functioning. The death of George Joseph, regular nominee, turned selection of a candidate over to a committee, the law for creation of which had been juggled and revamped to suit the whims of a few.

Committee nominations never go very big with American people anyway. There is something about them that challenges the mind of the voter. And in the nomination of Mr. Metschan by the committee a most unheard of thing was done. For Metschan was the committee's state chairman and under the law he built up committee machinery in counties that had failed to select committeemen at the primary election. Thus he was able to enter the race with a number of men of practically his own choosing. That was not good "sportsmanship" which State Chairman Cook dwells on so heavily. When Cook was secretary of the state central committee and wanted to support Harry Corbett for governor in the primaries, Chairman Metschan forced the resignation of Cook on the ground that no official of the state committee could lend aid to any individual candidate. Yet, the state chairman instead of resigning his post as chairman when he desired to run for governor, held on and saw that several committeemen were named who were favorable to himself.

We review this condition to show that this is not a regular party situation in Oregon this year and that every republican has a perfect right to vote for Julius Meier for governor without feeling in the least that he has left the republican party.

Coos county republicans pointed the way in their resolution to support Meier.

EDITORIALS FROM OVER THE NATION

The Chinese Way.

The Pathfinder: A Shanghai court decided that it is an offense for a barber to cut the hair of a Chinese woman without the consent of her husband. A woman of Shanghai begged her husband for permission to have her tresses bobbed in keeping with the latest style. The husband would not listen to the appeals of his wife. Accordingly, one day when she was out shopping, she slipped into a barber shop and had her hair bobbed. Later in the day police were attracted to the husband's house by the cries of a woman. The husband pleaded guilty to wife-beating and was fined \$1. But the court held that while cutting a woman's hair was not an illegal act in itself, it became an offense when it tended to interfere with domestic peace. The barber was fined \$2.

Breakfast Food

Detroit Free Press: Prohibition officials are becoming inclined to admit that some good may result from the manufacture of whiskey. Don't be startled, those persons have not gone mad and are not wet. They have merely received from experts at the American chemical laboratories a report that breakfast food can be made from the whiskey mash left over after the 2,000,000 gallons of medicinal booze permitted by the government has been manufactured each year. Indeed some of the by-pro-

duct has already been shown to the prohibition overlords who say the stuff is like any other breakfast food, but has a "distinctive flavor." Since, according to description the food is "prepared by the stills after making whiskey," we cannot help wondering just what the expression "distinctive flavor" may mean. Is it designed as a selling slogan? Certainly something like this would be effective: "Government whiskey breakfast food. Has a flavor all its own."

Statuary Improved

New York World: The movement in Paris to tear down half the statues there, on the ground that they are ugly, serves as a reminder that in this field we have made some progress in the last few years. Until recently the statuary that adorned most of our American cities was quite as ugly as that which adorns Paris, and for exactly the same reason: most of it commemorated the generals who fought the wars, and generals are anything but pretty. But of late a great change has come about. Statues are still erected as a result of war; probably that is a condition that will endure forever. But communities seem to have lost interest in the generals. Instead, they are disposed to honor the common foot soldier; the boy who enlisted from some par-

ticular town, went over the top in the Argonne, and died when a machine gun bullet cut him down. Or, more accurately, the boys who acquitted themselves thus valiantly, for there were few American towns which did not have quite a roster.

Big Experiment.

Detroit News: Prof. Georges Claude, French scientist, after many failures, finally has succeeded in putting into operation off the coast of Cuba a huge tube 5,000 feet long and six feet in diameter by means of which he hopes to generate power from the warm water of the gulf stream. The principle involves vaporizing ocean water through the warmth of the ocean current and using this low-pressure steam in vacuum to operate turbines.

The ambitious scheme may come to nothing and it may revolutionize the entire industrial trend. When men learned to boil water with fuel and make the steam work for them, they vastly enlarged all the possibilities of human life. But mankind always can use more power. It has formed a taste for it, learned how to use it and will continue to seek it wherever it is to be obtained.

Prof. Georges Claude is but one of many planners who explore the regions of undeveloped resources. For the present, coal and oil are abundant and relatively cheap, but they are not inexhaustible. It is reassuring to know that everywhere about us in the tides, the ocean streams, in the waterfalls and the winds are sources of power that will endure so long as the sun shines.

Youth.

No, there is no substitute for youth. The writer of the Way of the World would gladly give credit to the lines that follow if the author would make himself known. The lines are entitled "Youth."

"Youth is not a time of life—it is a state of mind. It is not a matter of ripe cheeks, red lips and supple knees; it is a temper of the will, a quality of the imagination, a vigor of the emotions; it is a freshness of the deep springs of life. Youth means a temperamental predominance of courage over timidity, of the appetite of adventure over love of ease. This often exists in a man of 60 more than in a boy of 20. Nobody grows old by merely living a number of years; people grow old only by deserting their ideals. Years wrinkle the skin, but to give up enthusiasm wrinkles the soul. Worry, doubt, self-distrust, fear and despair—these are the long, long years that bow the head and turn the growing spirit back to dust. Whether 70 or 17, there is in every being's heart the love of wonder, the sweet amazement at the stars and the starlike things and thoughts, the undaunted challenge of events, the unfailing child-like appetite for what is next, and the joy and the game of life.

"You are as young as your faith, as old as your doubt; as young as your self-confidence, as old as your despair. In the central place of your heart there is a wireless station; so long as it receives messages of beauty, hope, cheer, courage, grandeur and power from the earth, from men and from the infinite, so long are you young. When the wires are all down and all the central place of your heart is covered with the snows of pessimism and the ice of cynicism, then are you grown old indeed, and may God have mercy on your soul."

The Need to Speed.

Much of the cause of the bad times we have had in business, and which now, happily, appear to be changing, comes because people who have money saved up continue to hoard it instead of spending it to gratify reasonable wants. They have a right to have more of the good things of life. They have a right to live on a higher plane. They are too timid. 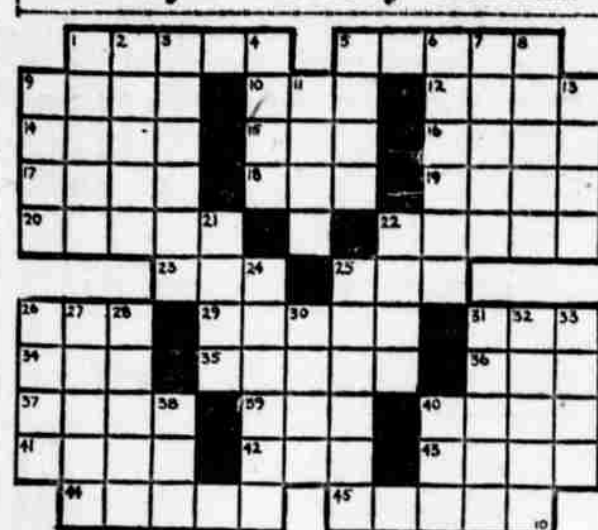

Child Education.
Compulsory Law.
Present Adequate.
Laws Enforced.

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 10, (UP)—Further legislation to provide more strict laws for compulsory education of children of migratory laborers, today was declared by C. A. Howard, state superintendent of public instruction, as unnecessary.

"PROVIDING sufficient education for children of migratory laborers in Oregon has never been a serious problem for us," Howard declared. "Present laws have proved sufficiently strict and adequate. School periods are so set to allow no interference from harvesting periods when children might seek employment."

Laws Adequate. SUFFICIENT proof in Howard's estimation that present laws provide adequate educational opportunities for the fact that legislation of this type has not been suggested during the past seven or eight years by either those in direct charge of such work—the Child Welfare League—or by others interested in this phase of work.

IN SOME states the migratory labor problem is greater because harvest periods conflict with school periods, Howard declared. In Oregon, harvest periods end before the late school term which begins in the fruit and berry producing sections, September 24. LUMBER CAMPS, where most children are to be found without

adequate educational opportunities, are the greatest problem to the northwest states, Howard declared. Oregon companies often have provided facilities for educating children of employees in those sections, oftentimes isolated from educational centers. "OREGON compulsory education laws have been strictly enforced," Howard said. "Occasionally some complaints have come to this office but these few have been settled with little difficulty."

Blockade Removed On Mt. Hood Loop

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 10, (AP)—Mount Hood loop, which has been closed for several days following the piling up of bulldozers and mud at White River, is open again to traffic. Hay Convey of the Oregon State Motor association reported today. Motorists are urged to go carefully at White River where a steam shovel is still at work.
