

MISS DANA WILL BECOME A BRIDE FOR THIRD TIME

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 10, (AP)—Braving the jinx that has pursued the married life of herself and two sisters, Viola Dana, once a leading film star, will leave here Monday for Colorado Springs, Colo., where she has announced she will marry Jimmy Thomson, golf professional of the Broadmoor Country club.

Miss Dana, who once said any one who fell in love with her was unlucky, said she would marry Thomson next Wednesday. "I am going to try to be happy," the diminutive actress said last night. "I have had so many bad breaks I think my luck ought to change."

Miss Dana, whose real name is Flanagan, has been married twice before. Her first husband, John Collins, a film director, died in 1913 during the influenza epidemic, and her second husband Maurice "Lefty" Flynn,

former Yale football player, was divorced February 15, 1929.

Tragedy also ended the marriages of Miss Dana's two sisters. Shirley Mason's husband died and another sister, Edna, lost her husband in an automobile accident.

MARKET QUOTATIONS

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 10, (A. P.)—New walnut prices just announced by the North Pacific Nut Growers Cooperative, Dundee, Ore., which controls a large percentage of the Oregon 1929 crop, average 1 1/2 cents above a year ago and walnut meats are 5 cents a pound higher. These prices are:

Franquettes: Fancy 23c; large 27c; standard 19c.

Soft shell: Fancy 23c; large 25c; standard 19c.

Mayettes: Fancy 23c; large 27c delivered in 5-pound bags.

Meats: Light amber halves 50c; halves and pieces 45c.

Crop prospects are reported short in most districts. Sales have been heavy with an early sell-out expected.

Extreme firmness of the Portland egg market brought about a rise of 2 cents in quotations on wholesale grades today. New prices are: Extras 35c; standards 31c; mediums 28c, and pullets 19c.

Butter prices were unchanged with demand limited.

Movements in fruit and vegetable trade were reported by the

government news service as follows:

First carlot shipment of cauliflower from the Portland district is being loaded by Japanese growers. Quality is good, \$1.20 per crate f.o.b. Portland is being realized for first loadings.

Cheap Jonathan apples continue in good demand. Trading in fancy and extra fancy sorts has declined, following initial purchases.

Potatoes are firmer at Idaho shipping points, with a 5-10c price-increase yesterday. Yakima

continues dull. Portland's track market on potatoes has shown little variation during the past week.
