Detroit Gunman And Woman Are Shot to Death

DETROIT, Oct. 13 (AP)—Louis Salvio, who was with Henry Tappan when the latter was slain by gunmen in July and was shot and killed, and Mrs. Grace Triano was seriously wounded at the Triano home early today. Police are searching for Mrs. Triano's husband, Felix, who was accused of the shooting by his wife.

Mrs. Triano told the police that Triano left the house last night after a quarrel but returned at 5 a. m. and shot first Salvio and then her. Salvio roomed at the Triano home.

Salvio was identified as the man who was in Henry Tappan's automobile when the latter was slain in the outbreak of gang slayings which culminated in the killing of Radio Announcer Jerry Buckley last summer. Jerry Buckley was wounded.
