Registration For Election Has Increased

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 13, (AP)—Marion county's registration for the November election totals 24,437, according to figures released by County Clerk Boyer today. This is an increase of 722 over the registration in April this year when the total was 23,715. Registration in the city of Salem was 11,287 as compared to 10,941 in April, an increase of 346. In the country outside of Salem the October registration was 13,250 as compared to 12,874 in April or an increase of 376.

Woman Slays Man in Hotel at Marshfield

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Oct. 13, (AP)—John Scher, 35, was dead, and Mrs. Ruth Warnock was in the city jail today accused of having shot Scher to death in a hotel room here yesterday.

The woman, according to reports, with whom she had been keeping company, was shot during a struggle between the two for possession of her revolver. Mrs. Warnock's 4-year-old son witnessed the tragedy and his cries brought attendants to the room.

Mrs. Warnock said she tried to "bluff" Scher to aid her in getting a divorce from her husband, Willard Warnock of Aberdeen, Wash. She left him two years ago, charging cruelty.

Mrs. Warnock told officers she asked Scher for money and he refused. He accused her of unfaithfulness, she declared.

Noted British Aviator Is Out To Beat Record

VALLEY STEAM, N. Y., Oct. 13, (AP)—Mrs. Kath Miller, British aviatrix, took off from Curtiss Field at 6:30 a. m. (E. S. T.) today for a flight to Los Angeles in an effort to lower the women's transcontinental record recently established by Miss Laura Ingalls. She planned to make her first stop at Indianapolis and stop overnight at Wichita, Kans.

Mrs. Miller arrived at the field with Captain Lancaster at 6:05 a. m., and rushed preparations for her take-off.

She flew a small low wing monoplane and had less than 100 gallons of fuel in the tanks.

Mrs. Miller is so small she had to have several cushions arranged behind her to enable her to reach the rudder bar and controls. A package of sandwiches was put into the plane for lunch.

Weather reports indicated good flying conditions all the way to Wichita, with high ceiling and good visibility over the Alleghenies, most difficult section for flying on the eastern end of the route.

Mrs. Miller with Captain Lancaster made the first flight from London to Australia in 1927.

Chiloquin Gym To Open On Saturday
