

COUGARS AT TOP OF PACIFIC COAST FOOTBALL HEAP

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 13. (AP)—Having counted over two of the Giants of Pacific Coast conference on successive Saturdays, Washington State's Cougars will take a breathing spell this week end while other members of the big ten-team circuit gamble for places in the win or lost column.

The Cougars will meet Gonzaga's Bulldogs in a non-conference affair which figures to be more or less of an average workout. But their previous performances, in trouncing California 16-0, and beating Southern California 7-6, has set football fandom on the coast figuratively on its "girder" case.

Position Strategic
When Coach Orin Hollingbery's proteges smashed out the impressive victory over California's Bears two weeks ago, those who find their football west of the Rockies asked "how come?" but when they conquered Howard Jones' great Trojan eleven Saturday, the feat revived fond memories to old grads of earlier years when Washington State teams were powerful in fact and not in theory.

The spectacular victory over Southern California put Washington State in a strategic position so far as the conference championship is concerned. With any kind of "break" at least a tie for the title should be forthcoming. The staters still have four conference games to play, namely with Montana, Oregon State, Idaho and Washington. But on the showing to date, close followers of the "break" believe they should come through with flying colors, the Washington game being the toughest.

Oregon Faces Tough Game
Stanford and Oregon, not on Washington State's schedule this year, will make their first conference appearances next Saturday. The Stanford team returns from its tough nothing-holding contest with Minnesota at Minneapolis for a brief practice before meeting Oregon State at Palo Alto.

Oregon State already has been downed by Southern California and Stanford rooters look forward to a victory. Oregon has the week's hardest assignment—that of attempting to stop Coach Jimmy Phelan's Washington Huskies. Washington has won two conference contests, defeating Montana and Idaho, and has shown quick and favorable improvement.

So much so, in fact, Oregon probably will be a choice when the two meet at Portland. The contest will oppose the gridiron strategy of two coaches transplanted from the big ten conference. Clarence Spears shifted his activities from Minnesota to Oregon this season while Phelan moved westward from Purdue at the same time.

Mr. and Mrs. Jack Horton of Hildebrand visited relatives and friends in Bonanza Tuesday.

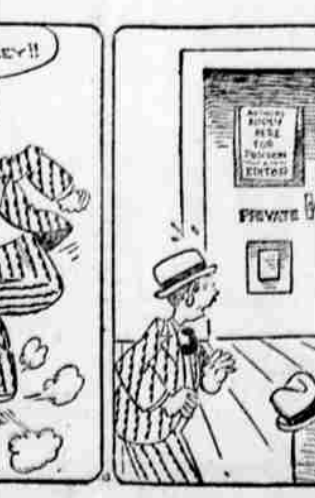
