

MARINE BAND LEADER TALKS AT LUNCHEON

Claiming that Paul T. Jackson was playing the good old army game of "passing the buck," Captain Taylor Bronson, leader of the United States Marine band, gave the main address at the chamber of commerce luncheon at the Willard hotel this noon. Jackson, high school principal, was scheduled to make a talk on Columbus Day, but declined in favor of the Marine band entertainers.

Introduced by Harry D. Bolvin, assistant district attorney, who acted as chairman for the day, Captain Bronson gave an interesting talk on the history of the Marine band since its organization in Washington, D. C., in 1794 to the present day. He told of the many important appearances of the band, including participation in the most outstanding functions of Washington society, the appearance at the marriage of President Wilson's two daughters, appearance before the former and the present Prince of Wales, concerts at most of the historical events in the history of the United States since the time of President Adams to the present day, and numerous other events.

The band has gone on annual tours since 1890, when John Philip Sousa was leader. However, this is their first tour of the Pacific coast since 1912.

"We are proud of our heritage, proud of the work which we have accomplished and intend to carry on," Captain Bronson remarked.

Reference was made in the captain's talk to the unveiling of the historical marker at Denny Creek Thursday, of which Captain O. C. Applegate talked. Captain Bronson stated that the Marine band was the official band of the Daughters of the American Revolution, and had played at all their conventions in Washington.

Since 1890 the band has given continuous concerts in Washington, D. C., and during the slack season made tours over the country.

A special musical treat was given by the members of the chamber today by soloists of the band, all of whom responded to encores.

Winfred Kemp, cornet soloist, played two selections, accompanied by Herbert Erisman, Kenneth Douse, saxophone soloist, also presented two numbers. He was also accompanied by Erisman.

"The forum was the best attended so far this year."

Secretary Of War Is Assaulted

OKLAHOMA CITY, Oct. 15. (AP)—Two men, said by police to be communists, were arrested this afternoon after they were reported to have leaped to the running board of a motor carrying Secretary of War Patrick J. Hurley, shouting insults at him.

The men, J. I. Whitten and R. G. Pierce, were charged with disorderly conduct and disturbing the peace. The former resisted arrest and was led to jail ahead of a crowd of 200 persons, also alleged to be communists, attracted by the disturbance.

The secretary's motor car was leaving the chamber of commerce building here for the airport, from where Hurley later took off for Fort Worth, Texas, to attend inauguration of the Atlanta-Los Angeles air mail line. He had just addressed a chamber of commerce luncheon.

Witnesses said the pair approached the secretary's motor car and shouted insults. Several witnesses declared they leaped to the running board.

Whitten and Pierce were among five men arrested for a communist disturbance here last night.

Murderer Dies;

Fiegle would fear a ruse by officers. Fiegle, rallying briefly early today, told officers in the guard about his hospital bed that he wished they urge his mother to come to see him, saying, "I'm afraid I'm going to die."

To one officer he said, "I don't know who shot me, and it doesn't make no difference, but I wish they had made a good job of it."

Tells Hiding Place

Officers sought to question him about various crimes throughout the night, but due to his condition little information was obtained.

Just before he died Fiegle admitted he had been hiding in the Ozarks for a year, living in an elaborately furnished cabin seven miles south of Hollister, in the lake country near Branson, where he was captured. He leased the place last October.

Three physicians performing a major operation on the bandit found the bullet had struck below the ribs on the right side, rupturing a blood vessel.

Throughout the night officers questioned the rapidly sinking man about scores of bank and train robberies with which his name had been linked in a dozen states.

Fiegle, who was conscious until about five minutes before he died, asked that all the furniture and personal effects in the cabin go to his mother. Asked if he had any money hidden, he declined to answer.

REDUCTION OF WAGES OPPOSED BY RESOLUTION

BOSTON, Oct. 15. (AP)—The American Federation of labor today instructed its president, William Green, to protest personally to President Hoover against alleged reduction of wages in United States navy yards.

This action followed an attack from the convention floor upon Secretary of Navy Charles F. Adams, who was accused of attempting to lower wages through reclassification of employees.

G. M. Bugniet, a vice president of the federation, declared Secretary Adams was carrying out the policies of outsiders whose interests were opposed to labor, instead of the policies of President Hoover, who, he said, had declared for maintenance of a high wage scale.

Vice President James Wilson of the federation charged an effort was being made "to retrench at the expense of already under paid workers."

The convention instructed President Green to call upon President Hoover to protest against the navy yard situation "immediately upon the adjournment of the convention." It also specified President Green be accompanied by a committee representing the trades directly affected by the reclassification.

The convention voted down a request by Thomas F. McMahon of the United Textile Workers of America to substitute a new resolution for a proposal asking a one-cent per capita levy to finance organization work in the south.

McMahon's substitute proposal asked for the creation of a defense fund and would, he said, eliminate the sectional character of the original resolution.

Three resolutions, protesting against alleged unfair labor policies of the Union Pacific and Northwestern bus lines and the Interstate bus lines, the Grigsby-Grinnon company and Majestic Household Appliances company, and six Cleveland, Ohio, hotels, and asking that all be placed upon the unfair list were referred to the executive council. The council was instructed to attempt to settle the existing disputes.

the adoption of strict marriage laws by its neighbor, California. The same reason was given for Arizona's ratio of 17.3 per 1,000, the second highest.

Divorces Few in Georgia

Georgia had the lowest proportion of divorces to marriages, one being granted only to each 13.3 new unions. In Nevada there was one divorce to each 2.3 marriages.

Numerically Texas led in divorces with 18,386. Illinois next with 15,760. Ohio had 13,213, and California 15,929. The only other state having more than 10,000 divorces was Michigan with 11,981.

New York reported the most marriages, with 121,535. Illinois had 84,092. Pennsylvania 70,507. Ohio 65,679. Texas 63,173, and California completed the more than 50,000 class with 51,566.

OREGON REPORT

PORTLAND, Oct. 15. (AP)—Old Man Di Vorce and his band of little complaints ground out 3179 separation suits in Oregon during 1929, the department of commerce revealed today.

Wedding bells rang for 8245 the same year.

The net increase in the number of marriages performed in the country as a whole was 4.3 per cent, Oregon's figure being 8.1 per cent over the preceding year.

Early Minister Comes Back to Lake Home to Complete Life's Span

Rev. Henry C. Collins, one of the first Episcopal ministers in Klamath Falls and pastor of the church here in 1911 and 1912, has returned to the Oregon country to retire on his old homestead near Crescent Lake.

He has selected the one place where he had always wanted to make his home, where he once camped overnight with a sheepherder and 2000 head of sheep and later made the six-day trip three times with a small "jag" of lumber to build a rough log cabin in which to make his home.

The story of Rev. Collins' home at Crescent Lake is well known to many of the old timers in Klamath Falls.

While he was preaching in the church here, which was then located in the west room of the Odd Fellows building and later moved to the basement of the old city library at Third and Main, he made a business trip to Portland, via The Dalles, going on horseback.

On his return he came through the Willamette valley, down to Roseburg and across to Crescent Lake where he was so impressed by the beauty of the country that he decided to make his home there.

He constructed the modest log cabin up there, and year after year during summer vacations he added to it until it is now a commodious and attractive home. He was then transferred to Nevada, but returned to his Crescent Lake home during the summer. Six years ago he was transferred to Maryland and has worked there since that time.

Last week Rev. Collins, his wife, and daughter, Leah, and son, John, who was born in Klamath Falls, returned to the lake home and plan to remain there.

Leah is an accomplished writer, having written several feature articles for national services. John is a student at the University of Oregon.

**FEDERALS HAVE
UPPER HAND IN
REVOLUTION**

BUENOS AIRES, Oct. 15. (AP)—Brazilian revolutionary headquarters here announced today rebel troops had captured the city of Itaperuna, which lies in the northernmost part of the state of Rio de Janeiro, about 400 miles from the federal capital.

The Brazilian Revolution has gone into its eleventh day, with available reports indicating the Federalists thus far have the edge in military operations.

Federal sources claim victories in all sectors and particularly on the 200-mile Sao Paulo-Parana front, in the large state of Minas Geraes and in eastern Rio de Janeiro.

Government troops are credited with two victories in upper Rio de Janeiro which remove a menace from the Federal capital, while troops of President Washington Luis continue to march through Minas Geraes, one of the first three states organizing the revolution.

Victories in the Sao Paulo-Parana sector are claimed in more than a dozen towns, with the rebels gradually being forced southward in Parana. This removes immediate danger to the large city of Sao Paulo, the first goal of the southern revolution.

Insurgent quarters continue to make general statements, saying advances of the southern revolutionaries have the federalists badly worried. The rebels predict a decisive battle in the Sao Paulo-Parana region will be fought today or tomorrow.

**INCREASE IN
BUILDING BIG
OVER YEAR AGO**

PORTLAND, Oct. 15. (AP)—A monthly building survey issued by S. W. Straus and Company today indicated building activity in Oregon during September was more than double that of the preceding month.

Oregon's September permits amounted to \$2,866,606, compared with \$1,219,132. The total for September, 1929 was \$1,976,112 so Oregon construction last month exceeded not only that of the previous month but also that of the corresponding month a year ago.

Building activity in Portland took a jump in September with permits totaling \$751,410.

Due to the gain in Oregon the Pacific northwest showed increased total volume permits for September over preceding months and also over corresponding months last year.

motor car, while her mother was not.

After the car had become mired in the mud, the abductor and Mrs. McKinley walked along a road for several hours, during which time he instructed her to write a note saying she would be released upon payment of \$30,000. Apparently fearful of capture, the abductor finally agreed to tear up the note if she would agree not to reveal where she was released.

She kept her word, and today had supplied little information that would aid officials in their search.

After being released, Mrs. McKinley walked to a farm house near Stockton, about 20 miles from Greenfield, and telephoned home. Her husband, Harold, and her father went after her.

Although unharmed, Mrs. McKinley was near exhaustion when she reached home. She said she had been without sleep or food since the abduction.

The note left at the Wilson home warned relatives Mrs. McKinley would be "bumped off" if its contents were revealed to officials or newspapers.

Returning home late yesterday, Mrs. McKinley urged that she be permitted to keep her promise. Instead, her father, husband and other relatives decided to send a posse after the kidnaper.

"I'll give \$500 to the man who kills that fellow," Wilson told a crowd of Greenfield citizens who gathered to join in the hunt. "I'll give \$1000 to the man who brings the fellow here for me to kill."
