

STATE TO OPEN BIDS 50 MILES OF NEW ROADS

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 16, (AP)—Bids for the construction of over 50 miles of highway and five bridge and building contracts will be opened by the state highway commission at its next meeting, in Portland, Thursday, October 30. The projects are:

Coos county: Lakeside—North Bend section of Roosevelt highway, construction of 13.6 miles of crushed gravel surfacing.

Deschutes and Crook counties: Middle unit of Bear Creek—Mills section of Prineville—Mills highway, construction of 3.11 miles of roadbed.

Jackson county: Eagle Point—Trail section of Crater Lake highway, 9.65 miles of re-grading and eight miles of re-surfacing. Also furnishing of 14,300 yards of broken stone or crushed gravel in stock piles.

Lane county: Lincoln county line—China Creek section of Roosevelt highway, 3.3 miles of grading in two units. Hendricks Bridge—Dyle Hill section of McKenzie highway, 9.3 miles of broken stone and crushed gravel surfacing and furnishing of broken stone in stock piles.

Umatilla county: Pendleton—Emigrant Hill section of Old Oregon trail, furnishing of about 21,000 yards of broken stone in stock piles. Adams—Milton section of Oregon—Washington highway, furnishing of about 22,700 yards of broken stone in stock piles.

Wasco and Clackamas counties: Mt. Hood—Bear Springs section of Mt. Hood highway, furnishing about 14,000 yards of broken stone in stock piles.

Clackamas and Marion counties: Bridge over Pudding river at county line about three miles east of Hubbard, payments to be made by counties.

Deschutes county: Construction of frame storage building on McKenzie highway at Redmond.

Grant county: Frame storage building on John Day highway at John Day.

Marion county: Frame shop building.

Tillamook county: Frame storage building on Roosevelt highway at Hebo.

Louis K. Porter Is a Candidate For City Council

Louis K. Porter, candidate for councilman in the Fourth ward, today announced his platform on which he is running for office. Mr. Porter came to Klamath Falls 11 years ago, directly from the army, and since that time has been in business in Klamath Falls. His statement follows:

"If elected councilman from the Fourth ward, I will do everything in my power to keep the taxpayers' money from being exploited. I believe in an efficient and economical fire department. The engineering department and the street department should be directly under the supervision of the city engineer. I believe, also, that all employees of the city should be taxpayers, and must be qualified for their work."

"I also believe that local people should be employed on all city work when possible, and to encourage new industries to further the employment of labor. "Keep our money in Klamath Falls."

Time Limit Set For Argument In Cahill's Motion

Circuit Judge William M. Duncan has allowed five days to counsel for the defense of Winfield H. Cahill, and to the district attorney, for the briefing of arguments on the motion of the defense. This motion asks for the appointment of a sanity commission to enquire into the sanity or insanity of the defendant, and a stay of sentence until the findings of the commission are reported to the court. Cahill is under sentence of life imprisonment for the killing of "Billie" Huff in Chiloquin on March 25.

It is the desire of the defense to prove the insanity of the defendant at the present time, not his condition at the time of the commission of the crime.

Girl Scout Work Kiwanis Theme

The theme of the Kiwanis weekly luncheon, held at the Willard hotel this noon, centered around Girl Scout work which the Kiwanians sponsor. Miss Thelma Mellick, regional trainer of the Big Trees region which comprises Oregon, Washington and California, was present and gave the main address.

Howard Larson, captain of the girl scouts in Klamath Falls and formerly captain in Cleveland, was also in attendance.

Miss Mellick explained the girl scout work, telling of the four main objectives of the organization. She explained these as home-making, health, nature and community service.

Miss Mellick also told the Kiwanians what they could do to further the move in this city. They could help, she stated, first, by being interested; second, by encouraging the local women to be interested; and third, by cooperating in examining the girl scouts for their merit badges.

A scene of the girl scout work was enacted by four girls who depicted work in the woods, first aid, etc. The girls selected for this presentation were Jeanette Larson, Virginia Larson, Audrey O'Neill and Dorothy Ackerman.
