Uncle Sam's Planting Pointers

When tops on peony plants have died down, cut the dead stalks to the ground level. Remove all dead material from the peony bed and burn it, for plant pests frequently live over winter on dead vegetation. If a manure mulch is to be used over the winter, do not pile it over the crowns of the plants, because it is very likely to cause serious decay in their roots. It is best applied after the ground is frozen hard.

Do not cut the tops from iris plants. Dead foliage may be removed, but many green leaves will survive the winter and will continue their growth next spring. A mulch of straw or manure on iris after the ground has frozen tends to prevent the roots heaving from the soil by action of the frost.

REMOVE DEAD STALKS
All the dead stalks of herbaceous perennials must be removed as soon as they die back. It is best in all cases to burn this refuse. The fertilizing value is slight and burning may check insects and diseases.

Go over your garden labels and replace or reletter any that are likely to be illegible next spring. If labels are attached with wire, make certain it does not fit tight enough to girdle the stem.

STORE AWAY GOOD SOIL
If you will need soil for re-planting plants or for starting early flower or vegetable seed during the winter or early spring, store some in the cellar or a garage where it will be protected from rain and snow. If it is sprinkled a day or two before it is to be used it will be in good condition, while that out of doors is still frozen hard.

Hardy chrysanthemums will flower long after the first frosts if a fabric cover protects them during winter when frosts occur. Erect a wooden frame to hold the fabric so that it does not rest directly on the plants.

Trees Available To Farmers at Small Charge

CORVALLIS, Ore. (UP)—Farmers in any section of Oregon where trees will grow need no longer let their homes or crops suffer from sun or storm.
More than 50,000 conifers and hardwoods of many kinds are now available at the Clatsop-McNary forest nursery at Corvallis, operated in connection with the Oregon State College arboretum, and will be delivered to anyone practically free—\$2.50 a thousand being charged to cover handling costs.

Sulphur Brings Better Crop Of Alfalfa in State

BAKER, Ore. (UP)—Application of sulphur to alfalfa lands is bringing profitable returns to Baker county farmers. W. C. Christensen of North Powder reports that sulphur increased the alfalfa yield on his farm 50 per cent.
Exceptional increases are also reported by Armand Perkins of Haines, and Orvil Grosse and Lowell Gover of Halfway. Orders are now being pooled by P. T. Fortnall, county agent, for a carload of this material to be delivered to farmers of the county this fall.

FEWER DRIED PRUNES
ROSEBURG, Ore. (UP)—Low price prospects and unfavorable weather conditions have greatly reduced the dried prunes in Douglas county this year, reports J. C. Leedy, county agent. Some growers without driers made no attempt to harvest the crop, while others stopped operations before harvest was complete.

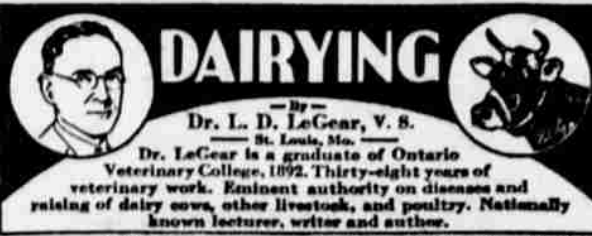

A great general once said that an army travels on its stomach. A modern sage has gone further and declared that a nation is great in proportion to the amount of milk consumed by its citizens.

Whether the United States is the wealthy, powerful country it is because we are a people of milk drinkers might be questioned. But the fact remains that we are a healthy lot, our athletes are among the best in the world, our soldiers, when they have to, can lick any equal body of men in uniform—and we do recognize milk as one of our most valuable foods.

Milk for babies and invalids has always been considered essential. In recent years the reasons for this have been better known. Milk is a complete food in itself. It contains nearly everything the body needs. It is rich in proteins. Milk contains the minerals we require with the exception of iron and iodine. And last but not least, milk contains the four important vitamins needed by growing children and adults who wish to keep fit.

Federal FARM FACTS

The recent drought had its advantages, one of them being its reduction of corn borers. The U. S. Bureau of Entomology reports the heat and dry weather destroyed many eggs and moths, while those moths that were not killed did not lay as many eggs as usual.

Scientists of the U. S. Department of Agriculture have devised a "vacuum cleaner" to extract ox-worms from cows' backs, and so free the cattle from this form of pest.

Science controls the future of dairying, according to O. E. Reed, chief of the U. S. Bureau of Dairy Industry. "Science will show us new and better methods," he says. "No other food commodity is so closely related as milk to health and general welfare. There is need for more research work, not merely to promote the industry, but to protect and promote public health."

PORTLAND, Oct. 16, (AP)—Cattle 75, calves 10, talking about steady.

Hogs 150, talking steady on slaughter classes; feeder pigs 50c higher. Feeder and stocker pigs, 70-120 pounds, good and choice, \$9.50 to \$11.00.

PORTLAND, Oct. 16, (AP)—Tone and prices were unchanged on wholesale butter and egg markets today.

Fruit and vegetable markets were characterized by liberal supplies and easier prices in some lines. The department of agricultural economics reported changes as follows:
Heavy supplies, good quality, slow demand, weaker markets and lower prices characterized this week's movement from the northwest of potatoes, onions, pears and celery. Southern Idaho sold No. 1 russets yesterday at Los Angeles as low as \$1.00 per cwt.—a 50c decline within two weeks.
