

MEIER PRAISED AT LABOR MEET

G. A. Von Schriltz, member of Electric Worker's Lineman union No. 125, of Portland, and past president of the Central Labor council of Portland, in a stirring address before the Central Labor council here Wednesday night, called upon union labor members to vote for Julius L. Meier for governor.

Von Schriltz said "Julius Meier is friendly to union labor, especially the building crafts." He then told of the buildings erected by Mr. Meier with union labor and the candidate's fine attitude at all times toward the members of organized labor.

A. J. Schaefferstein, delegate to the State Federation of Labor meeting in Medford, gave a report of the convention, outlining the work accomplished at the state convention.

A. M. Thomas gave a report of the hearing recently held in Salem on the Grant power site application of the California Oregon Power company on the Klamath river.

Protests on several laundries and on the gas company contractors were filed and referred for investigation. The only complaint with the gas company contractors was the 10-hour day basis, it was stated. Union labor favors an eight-hour day, or if workers are paid by the hour as the gas company contractors are doing, an hourly wage with 11 hours pay for 10 hours work.

Last spring the club donated \$50 to the Boy Scouts of the city, distributed free flower seeds in the city schools, and offered a grand prize for the best garden in any school as well as individual prizes for the best gardens of each school. One of the outstanding achievements of the club was the securing of a two months extension of the irrigation season over any season of the past.

The club has announced a \$10 reward for the apprehension and conviction of fruit and flower thieves.

The Garden club holds its meetings on the second Monday of every month.

The livestock team had some valuable coaching in the judging of sheep and hogs last Sunday at the John McCully ranch. The poultry judging team consists of Richard Anderson and Donald Frazier of Merrill.

Mr. Weston and Elmer H. Halsiger will leave for Portland on Sunday, October 26, with the teams. Every year Mr. Halsiger donates a car or more, if necessary, from his garage, and goes with the judging teams to the Pacific International.

Judge Allows Five Days to Attorneys

Circuit Judge William M. Duncan has allowed five days to counsel for the defense of Winfield H. Cahill, and to the district attorney for the motion of arguments on the motion of the defense. This motion asks for the appointment of a sanity commission to enquire into the sanity of the defendant, and a stay of sentence until the findings of the commission are reported to the court.

Cahill is under sentence of life imprisonment for the killing of "Billie" Huff in Chiloquin on March 23.

It is the desire of the defense to prove the insanity of the defendant at the present time, not his condition at the time of the commission of the crime.

List Prospective Settlers Mailed

MEDFORD, Oct. 17.—Lists containing approximately fifteen hundred names have been sent to chambers of commerce throughout northern California and southern Oregon and to the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce by the Northern California Southern Oregon Development Association today.

The names are of those who registered at the information booth in the exhibit maintained by the Development Association at the California State Fair in Sacramento last month. The lists were prepared from a large number of registrants and while each person may not be a prospective settler for southern Oregon and northern California a large number requested literature, and it is hoped that many of them will soon make a visit to the Mid-Pacific Empire and give it thorough appraisal.

DALLAS, Ore., Oct. 17. The youth pleaded guilty to a second degree murder charge.

Lawson employed on the Dickinson farm, when arrested, told a story of being kidnapped by two men the day Mrs. Dickinson was shot. Then he changed his

story, saying he shot Mrs. Dickinson accidentally while he was unloading a gun. When officers found powder marks on the door casing leading to the room where the woman's body was found, Lawson confessed the crime. His mother lives in Spokane.

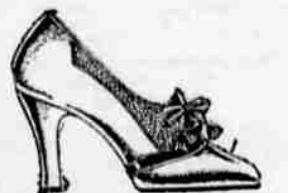
