

LEGISLATURE TO FIGURE OUT DEFICIENCIES

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 18. (AP)—Deficiency appropriations of over \$2,000,000 allowed by the state emergency board yesterday brought the total in deficiencies authorized by the board since the 1929 legislature to \$25,890,644.

All but \$245,000 of this amount must be covered by appropriations of the 1931 legislature. That amount allowed the state penitentiary to pay on flux accounts is to be repaid from proceeds of flux sales.

Strictly speaking the so-called deficiency appropriations are not appropriations, since the emergency board does not have legislative authority. They are authorizations to expend money in excess of legislative appropriations, thereby creating deficiencies that must be covered by the following legislature.

Deficiency allowances so far during this biennium are:

Board of vocational education, for salaries and capital outlay, \$13,165; state penitentiary, for new addition, \$53,000; capitol and supreme court buildings and grounds, for salaries, wages and maintenance, \$35,000; salaries and expenses of circuit judges, \$45,000; salaries of district attorneys and deputies, \$30,000; to pay guaranteed interest on irrigation bonds, \$29,073.82; supreme court, general operation and maintenance, \$25,000; eastern Oregon tuberculosis hospital, salaries and maintenance, \$25,500; orphan and foundling homes, \$49,577.48; Oregon state college, extension, \$14,000; Oregon state college, experiment division, \$11,000; Oregon penitentiary, flux accounts, \$245,000; transportation of convict, \$60,000; penitentiary, operation and maintenance, \$30,000; state engineer's department, maintenance and capital outlay, \$4,954.91; reclamation commission, salaries and maintenance, \$3,241.21; state printer, \$4,506.91; secretary of state, return of fugitives from justice, \$2,000; state forester, salaries and maintenance, \$7,242.52; state board of horticulture, salaries and maintenance, \$1,521.75.

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, California, Oct. 18. (AP)—Under a blazing sun, Stanford university's football squad opened its pacific coast conference season against the Oregon State College eleven here today before 22,000 persons. The Cardinals appeared for the first time this year in bright red and white striped pants and new yellow helmets. Coach Pop Warner of Stanford pinned his hopes for a victory on a makeshift lineup of second and third string players.

Buse ripped off 5 yard through center. Hufford failed to gain at left tackle. Washington was penalized five yards for offside. Marsh punted to Kitzmiller who returned the ball 5 yards to Oregon's 40-yard line.

Londahl reeled off 5 yards around left end. Donohue made three at right guard. Kitzmiller made it a first down on Washington's 47-yard line with a five yard thrust through left tackle. Londahl made three more at right guard. Kitzmiller shot a long pass to Londahl who had his hands on the ball but dropped it. Londahl then dropped back and shot a 25-yard pass to Kitzmiller, who was loose and ran to the Washington goal line for a touchdown. Kitzmiller converted the try for point.

MULTNOMAH STADIUM, Portland, Ore., Oct. 18. (AP)—Close to 35,000 wild football fans overflowed this stadium this afternoon to witness the all-important grid battle between the universities of Washington and Oregon. The weather was perfect, with a warm sun shining. The field was dry and fast.

Governor Al Norblad of Oregon and Governor Roland H. Hartley of Washington were guests at the game.

More than 12,000 persons were announced to be in the stadium from Washington, including about 5,000 from Seattle.

PORTLAND, Oct. 18. (AP)—Eyes of football fans of the Pacific coast and the Middle West were turned toward this grid-mat city today, where the universities of Washington and Oregon played the Washington-Oregon game, the largest football crowd in the history of the Pacific Northwest was expected to attend the fracas. More than 35,000 persons were being counted upon to jam Multnomah stadium, 5,000 more than the biggest gathering in Seattle a few years ago.

Traffic was tied up for hours in the downtown district last night when supporters of both eleven celebrated. Thousands of fans swarmed the streets in cars and on foot, howling and cheering in a mad frenzy.

The game was a do-or-die battle for both teams, as it virtually meant the elimination of one for the coast championship. Both eleven entered the game undefeated, the Washington Huskies having downed Montana and Idaho while it was the first and most important tilt of the season for the Oregon Webfooters.

The Middle West was unusually interested in the contest, as two big ten conference coaches of last year were meeting with coast teams. Jimmy Phelan was lured to Washington from Purdue, where he won the Big Ten championship last year, and Dr. Clarence Spears took over the coaching reins at Oregon after several years at Minnesota.

Spears holds a victory over Phelan—his Minnesota eleven having defeated Purdue, 15 to 0, in 1928, and his Oregon team was a slight favor to this battle.

Kits Triple Threat The game put the two new coaches "on the spot," so to speak, in the eyes of the students of the two schools. Washington was the first to search for a new mentor, and it picked Phelan after considering both the "Little Irishman" and Spears. Oregon then stepped out and signed the "Doc" and would like to give Washington a launch.

Spears has a veteran lineup, including some of the best linemen on the coast. In Johnny Kitzmiller, the former Minnesota halfback who has been counted upon to do the scoring, if any, against the Huskies.

Huskies Team Young Phelan looked to a young but well-trained combination for victory. He has a few veterans on his line, but his backfield and reserves were chiefly sophomores.

Both coaches suffered heartbreaking losses at the last minute. Spears was forced to enter the game without the services of his brilliant sophomore halfback, Don Watts, and Phelan was without Merle Hufford, all-coast halfback last year. Watts received a broken collar bone a few days ago, and Hufford has been away from practice for two weeks with an infected leg.

The present Oregon lineup has never tasted defeat from the Huskies. The Webfooters downed Washington at Portland in 1928, 27 to 0, an again last season in Seattle, 14 to 0.

The large Washington canvas brought to Portland to cover the Multnomah field was rushed back to Seattle last night to keep the Husky field dry for the California-Washington game next Saturday.

Early indications were for perfect football weather. The probable lineups were:

MILLIONS ARE LOST BECAUSE OF EXPLOSION

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 18. (AP)—In the wake of the blast which yesterday morning virtually wrecked a 12-story downtown building and shattered windows in others for two blocks around, investigators poked today in a thorough going search for the cause.

Meanwhile the 43 injured passersby in the Garment Capitol employed in the Garment Capitol building scene of the blast, were reported recovering.

While sabotage at first was suspected, as the investigation aged with passing hours authorities leaned toward conviction the explosion followed accidental ignition of illuminating gas, known to have been seeping through the building for weeks.

The estimate of damage increasing with completion of survey, amounted to \$1,500,000. Originally it was \$1,000,000. The Capitol building alone was damaged to the extent of \$800,000. Its elevator shafts were twisted, partitions were blown out, and walls weakened.

The fire that followed the blast, confined chiefly to the fifth floor, where the explosion originated, damaged stock and fixtures.

Fire and police officers discovered last night many workers in the building had complained of nausea, believed to have been caused by escaping gas, for several weeks. Managers of the building said they had searched unsuccessfully for a leak in their gas lines.

Employees of the Beverly Hills Frocks, Inc., the owner of the fifth floor, said they had suffered none from gas. They said, however, their windows were open night and day for ventilation prior to Thursday night, when they were sealed for fumigation. Hyman Schumacher, proprietor of the shop, said he set off the blast.

Schumacher pulled a burglar alarm switch and Chavin lit a cigarette as the detonation occurred. They were the most seriously injured.

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and two boys, Orville, 15, and David, 16.

According to the story told by David, who was a witness to the tragedy, Martin asked his wife if she intended to return and live with him. When she replied in the negative he seized the shotgun and fired. The charge entered her left temple. She fell to the floor, and when found was lying on her back with her head under the washing machine in the kitchen, with her brains oozing from the wound.

David and Orville then fled to a nearby telephone and called Officer Gerth.

After shooting his wife Martin went into the front room and reloaded the weapon. He placed the muzzle of the gun in his mouth and pulled the trigger. The resulting explosion virtually tore his face away. Pools of blood on the floor indicated Martin had struggled for several minutes.

When officers arrived he was on his knees with his face against the floor.

Mrs. Christian Porter, a sister of Mrs. Martin, who was in the kitchen when her sister was shot, was wounded in the forehead when several shot penetrated the skin. She was not seriously hurt. She fled to the home of her father, Med. Kitts, who lives two or three blocks from the Martin home.

The Martins have lived in West Salem during the past three years. He has been cutting wood and driving a freight truck.

DALLAS, Ore., Oct. 18. (AP)—Within a few minutes after she was received at the Dallas hospital, where she was rushed from the scene of the tragedy in Salem, Mrs. J. H. Martin died of a gunshot wound in the head inflicted by her husband two hours earlier.

At 2 o'clock Martin, was still alive in the hospital but no hope was held out for his recovery by Dr. L. A. Bollman, who was attending him.

Mr. and Mrs. Martin were received at the hospital at 1:50 o'clock Saturday afternoon.

The campaign will last from now until Thanksgiving, and the membership goal is 1,500. The roster now shows 711 members.

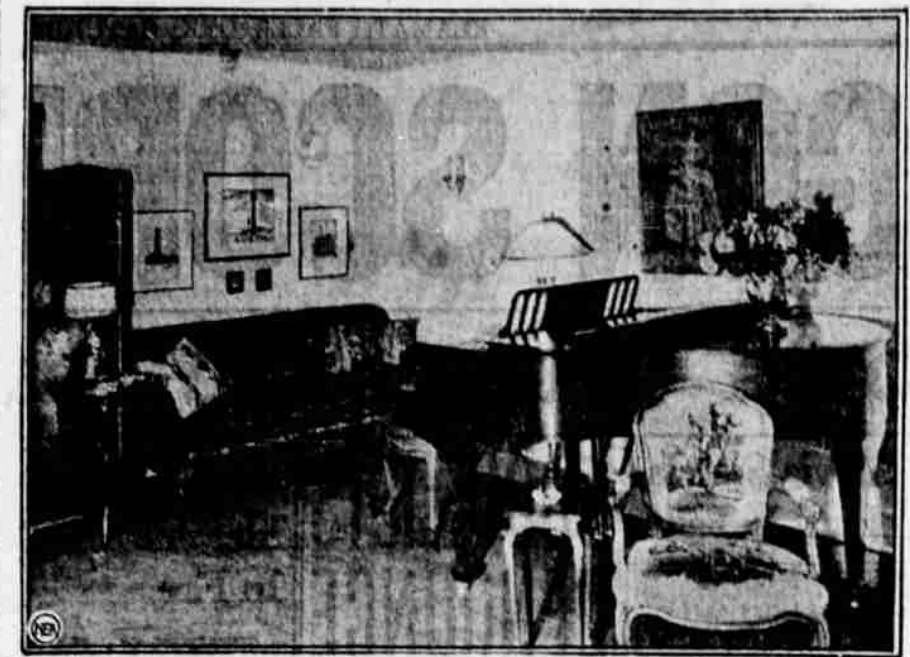

When Arranging the Furniture in a Room, Let the piano Strike a Note of Harmony

FINDING PLACE FOR PIANO IS PROBLEM TO TAX EVEN EXPERIENCED DECORATORS



An excellent arrangement of a piano in a room with modified modernistic wallpaper in beige and tan and plain rug in soft rose tone is to make a cozy corner unit of a davenport in satin brocade, used in conjunction with the mahogany drum table and bookstand against a painted screen and a Louis Quatorze chair in needlepoint, with low table, in front of the piano. A painting over the piano, a group of etchings over the davenport and lamps all add their soft charm.

NEW YORK, Oct. 17.—Arranging a room so that the piano is located in the psychologically perfect spot is a matter well calculated to tax a professional interior decorator and strike fear into the heart of any ordinary home-maker.

It must be right, both for beauty's sake and health's sake. Reversing the order of these, there are certain places which no piano should be put, because they are likely to hurt the piano itself. Pianos should never be put against radiators or pipes that are not because the temperature is very bad for the casing and various and sundry of the mechanical parts. They should never be put near open windows, so they get draughts or dampness on them. They should never, because of possible cold and dampness, be backed against an outside wall, but should be put either away from the wall slightly or else against inside walls.

Piano Is Conspicuous

This taken into consideration,

the matter of the beauty of the room is of primary importance.

No room is successful when the piano hits you in the eye the minute you enter. Since pianos have a way of looking over-sized for modern homes, the best way to counteract this is to arrange your other furniture in such groups that they approximate the importance and size of the piano.

The shape and size of your room and the other pieces of furniture you have in the room determine the attitude you have in solving your piano-placing problem. Certain plans, however, might prove suggestive.

An oblong room that has windows on both ends, a door onto the porch off one side and doors to both the hall and dining room off the side, across from the porch doors, has its grand piano placed a little distance out from the wall at one end. Directly in front of the side of the piano, and practically as long as the piano, a handsome hand-carved library table is placed, with lamps, magazines, flowers and a row of books. One big arm chair is placed at the end of the table.

at the keyboard end of the piano. This makes a kind of music room nook for the piano and, since the room is long enough, proves most successful.

A second arrangement, this one for an upright piano, is to place the piano along one wall, nearer the entrance door than the middle of the wall. Beyond the piano, the corner of the room contains a large armchair, upholstered in a merry print, a table and lamp by it and a gay rug with the armchair's colors in it, in front of the fireplace which faces you when you come in. Your eye skips beyond the piano on your right and lights on the cozy corner just beyond.

Without a fireplace, however, other arrangements are tremendously successful. If your room has enough length along one side to place the piano mid-way, with a davenport group beyond where listeners may rest in peace and enjoy the music, then that arrangement has a way of flattering the piano's presence and seemingly bestowing a certain graciousness upon the whole room.

The davenport unit, however, must be well-balanced, in good taste and dignified and formal enough to be a fit mate for the piano with which it must live. In addition to furniture grouping there are other matters of interior decoration that a piano governs. It is a mistake, first of all, to crowd much onto a piano or to hang many pictures by it. Knick-knacks should have no place atop a piano. A few flowers might, or a handsome single piece of pottery or crystal. Enormous rooms with rich furnishings sometimes use shawls or tapestries to throw over a piano decoratively. The average home should try none of this. It looks cheap and gaudy usually.
