

ATTORNEYS ASK TRIAL DATE TO BE POSTPONED

Motion for the continuance of the trial of Donald Necker, accused of first degree murder was filed yesterday by Manning, McCulloch and Driscoll and Ralph W. Moran, attorneys for the defense. The trial was set for next Tuesday.

The motion, which was filed yesterday afternoon asks that the trial be postponed because of the fact that Horace Manning, chief of the defense staff, has been called out of the city on business and will be unable to be here. Mr. Manning made the other arrangements some time ago, it is stated.

Witness Needed
One witness which the defense needs is also out of the state and it would be impossible to have the witness here in such a short time, the motion states. An affidavit is attached to the motion stating that it is made in good faith and not for the purpose of delaying the trial.

Judge Duncan had not set the time for argument last night but arguments may be heard Monday morning on the motion.

Gillenwaters for State
T. R. Gillenwaters, deputy district attorney, in charge of prosecution for the state, will argue the motion for the state.

Necker is accused of murder in the first degree as a result of the shooting of Fred B. Dunbar, local insurance agent, on September 1 at Summit Lake. Miss Doris Bacon, companion of Dunbar on the swimming party was an eye-witness to the shooting and was herself beaten over the head, tied, and forced to remain in the woods by the lake shore all night.

PHIL METSCHAN GIVES ADDRESS

Phil Metschan, of Portland, last night addressed a group of voters at the Pine Tree theatre on the issues of the present gubernatorial campaign as he sees them. Mr. Metschan, republican nominee elected by the state republican committee following the death of the late Senator George W. Joseph attacked the issues of the Joseph platform.

Mr. Metschan spoke of the "royal welcome" accorded him in Portland and the "royal welcome" accorded him in the state capital. He then launched into an attack on the strange power district bill, sponsored by the state senate, which is supporting the Joseph platform; the newspapers of the state who are not favorable to him; and condemned the various irrigation districts of the state, which he said have ruined the farms and been ruined by the laws.

Lauds Republicans
The candidate spoke of the work of the republican congressional delegation from Oregon in congress and pleaded for republicans to "stay by the party." Mr. Metschan praised the administration of President Hoover and his work regarding the unemployment situation.

Mr. Metschan said that he had been working in the republican party since he was 14 years of age and had never sought public office before. "It is too much the custom to abuse those who take an interest in politics," he said.

Praises Hoover
Metschan said that Hoover's conferences of labor and industrial leaders had been successful in reducing unemployment.

The candidate said that he was favorable to a lumber tariff and believed that the state legislature of states where timber is produced should pay lobbyists to go to the nation's capital to fight for a higher tariff on lumber. He also said that he favored an old age pension bill as a duty of a state to its workers.

Urges Vote
Metschan said that he purchased the Imperial hotel in Portland after it was built by non-

union labor was not his fault. "If I accomplish nothing more than to arouse public interest and help to get every citizen to go to the polls, my work will have been a success," he said.

Wilson S. Wiley acted as chairman and introduced the speakers at the evening. Arthur Schaupp, candidate for state representative, told of the formation of a Metschan for Governor club in this county.

Speaks for Armory
Captain Walter W. Abbey, of Battery D, 249th Coast Artillery, spoke in the interests of the armory bond issues which will be on the county and city ballots at the coming election. He stated that the battery brings \$34,000 annually to Klamath county.

The armory could not only be used as a home for the battery, but would serve as a public meeting place, for meetings of Boy Scouts, Campfire Girls, a civic center, a gymnasium, and said that a swimming pool and indoor target range would be built in the basement.

State Pays Half
The captain said that he had talked with the adjutant general's office and that it was possible that the city would get another battery or perhaps two if the armory is built and regimental headquarters could be transferred here.

Captain Abbey spoke of the present quarters which handicap the battery, which leads the state despite the handicap. Present quarters are in an upstairs room in one of the oldest buildings in the city, near Link river.

The armory would serve as a meeting place for citizens and large shows, such as the potato show, and the auto show could be held there. It would be let by open bidding contract and local union labor would be used in its construction. The state would furnish half the cost of construction and the government pays for its maintenance.

Wiley Tells Life
Mr. Wiley, chairman, thanked the battery's captain for his address and asked that the citizens support the armory. He then introduced Mr. Metschan as a friend for the past 15 years, and gave a resume of Mr. Metschan's life, and activities.

Metschan will spend today in the county in the interests of his campaign.

William Powell is one of the few Hollywood actors who has had a chance to become thoroughly acquainted with a character he portrays. In "The Benson Murder Case," S. S. Van Dine's popular detective story, which will show at the Pine Tree theatre, starting Sunday for two days, Powell plays the role of Philo Vance, famous fiction detective, for the third time in as many pictures.

Stage players, appearing day after day in the same role, have an opportunity to profit as they go and to improve their performance as experience suggests. This opportunity for close study of a role is one of the chief claims to advantage advanced by repertory groups. Eva Le Gallienne's New York players being an example. But rarely has this opportunity been extended to film players. Generally the screen actor must give the absolute best that is in him at the time the picture is made, and then "forget about it." The chance to repeat the role seldom ever comes.

Powell's case, however, is a notable exception. He interpreted Philo Vance for the first time in "The Canary Murder Case," repeated and improved his characterization in "The Greene Murder Case," and, with the production of the third of the S. S. Van Dine stories, "The Benson Murder Case," Powell believes he has perfected his understanding of the man he portrays.

"Philo Vance was a bit hard to get acquainted with," Powell says. "When we started 'The Canary Murder Case,' I felt that I scarcely knew him. Philo is a difficult person. You must resent him, must almost hate him, but still you must like him. He is a gentleman, and also a boor. At times he is overbearing and pompous. He offered me the most difficult characterization I have ever been called upon to portray."

"I began to get fairly close to Philo in 'The Canary Murder Case,' and, in my latter scenes in the picture, I felt much better able to portray him than I did in the early sequences. Perhaps the difference was not noticeable to the audience but I felt the difference. When 'The Greene Murder Case' was presented to me, however, I found that I knew Vance with an intimacy I had never felt before. And, in 'The Benson Murder Case,' I felt easy in the part, right at home."

Stokes Gallagher, Oakie's pal in "Fast Company" and "The Social Lion," has a strong comedy role with Stuart Erwin. Both these young men are candidates for the hand of Clara Bow and their intense rivalry provides a running fire of comedy.
