

FLEASH MURDER IS REVEALED

Girl Fed Ground Glass,
Hit With Iron Bar;
Thrown into Lake

FATHER OF VICTIM
ESCAPES LIKE FATE

Step Mother of Girl Held
And Explanation Is
Contradictory

DENVER, Colo., Oct. 20. (AP)—A child-murder so brutal as to tax the ingenuity of a fiend bent on blood-letting today had given police a few tangible clues, but the identity of the slayer remained as obscure as the hour, last Friday, that Leona O'Loughlin's body was dragged from the shallow waters of a city park lake.

The child had been fed ground glass, had been knocked unconscious with a blunt instrument and then—on the element of physicians—had been tossed into the lake to drown.

Father Escapes
More than two days of work by the detective force, of which her father is a member, have turned up the following evidence: the child, 10 years old, ate at least a teaspoonful of the powdered glass; her father, Leo O'Loughlin, was also fed the glass, but is expected to recover; a blood-stained automobile tire bearing finger prints and wisps of the child's hair and a bloody towel were found in the family automobile.

Physicians said the child suffered stomach convulsions and apparently had been struck with the heavy instrument to quiet her while the slayer was en route to the lake to complete his job.

Stepmother Held
Her stepmother, Mrs. Pearl O'Loughlin, arrested yesterday afternoon and closed with A. T. Clark, captain of detectives, several hours, repeatedly denied that she knew anything about the slaying or the presence of glass in the child's stomach.

Here the official investigation and the woman's story became contradictory: Mrs. O'Loughlin said she had been sick for two days prior to Leona's disappearance last Tuesday, or early Wednesday, and believe it was from eating glass; doctors said they found no foreign substance she had eaten and that she showed no serious symptoms other than weakness from a 48-hour fast.

Bloody Towel A Clue
The woman said she believed a son by her first husband had eaten some of the glass, but doctors said the boy, Douglas Milligan, 8, was not ill and displayed none of the symptoms evidenced in his stepmother.

Police counted among one of their most potentially valuable clues a bloody towel, found wedged between the cushions of the O'Loughlin automobile, but Mrs. O'Loughlin asserted the blood resulted from her son's having used it to quench a nose bleed.

AUTO ACCIDENT ENDS FATALITY

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 20. (AP)—One person is dead and two injured, the result of week-end highway accidents involving Lane county people.

Charles Crocker, 14, of Junction City, died today at the Corvallis General hospital from injuries received when he was struck by an automobile four miles north of Monroe last night. He suffered a fractured skull.

A. Erickson, University student, was injured in a collision at Lone Pine, north of Eugene, while returning from the Oregon-Washington football game.

Mrs. W. C. Underwood of Eugene, president of the Business and Professional Women's club, received bruises when her car overturned on the Pacific highway near Roseburg while she was on her way to a district meeting.

Football Teams Have Dates Mixed

It was all mixed up. That is, the football schedule for three Southern Oregon teams, Lakeview, Klamath Falls and Medford, was not quite plain for Sunday.

Medford's third team came to Klamath Falls, all set for victory, to play Klamath Falls' third team, and found no one to play with. The Pelicans' third team had gone to Lakeview to play the Lake county team. So Medford turned around and went back home.

The confusion was evidently the result of a mix-up in the inter-city schedules. Medford's team will come down here again November 15 to play the delayed game.

The Klamath-Lakeview game ended with a 6-6 tie score.

Representative Butler Coming

According to a telegram received by Postmaster John McCall at a late hour this afternoon, Congressman Robert R. Butler will be present at the laying of the cornerstone of the federal building Tuesday afternoon. Congressman Butler will make an address at the ceremonies.

VIKING KING OF AIR IS MARRIED

HASBROUCK HEIGHTS, N. J., Oct. 20. (AP)—Bernie Balchen, blonde viking of the air, who accompanied Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd on his Atlantic flight and his South Polar expeditions, has married his portland sweetheart.

At a quiet ceremony on Saturday he was married to Miss Jimmy Scudie, of Oslo, Norway, to whom he had been engaged four years, and who came to this country after Balchen returned last year from Antarctica.

Balchen was back at work today at his job as test pilot for the Fokker Aircraft corporation, turning airplanes inside out in the air to find out how good they were. But when news of his marriage leaked out he pulled off his flying suit and fled to seclusion, after merely confirming the fact he was married.

Balchen, who will be 31 years old next Thursday, began his flying career as a lieutenant in the Norwegian navy. He first came into wide notice in 1925, when he flew over the Arctic wastes in search of the missing expedition headed by the late Roald Amundsen.

The following year he was a member of the Amundsen North Pole expedition in the dirigible Norge, being stationed at Spitzbergen.

The location of the fort had long been debated and it has now been definitely established that it stood above Exchange street between 14th and 15th. The stockade posts were well preserved and were buried twenty feet.

VATICAN CITY, Oct. 20. (AP)—The pope gave a private audience today to the Indian Chief Two Moon Meridas of Waterbury, Conn. The chief was accompanied by his wife and wore the customary full dress attire required by papal regulation for such occasions.

ATTY. GENERAL GIVES RULING

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 20. (AP)—An opinion by Attorney General Van Winkle, as understood by Secretary of State Moss today, relieves the state military department and the state board for vocational education from paying rent for office space in the new state office building. Also it nullifies an action of the state emergency board last Friday in allowing a deficiency appropriation of \$1847.44 to the state engineering department for rental purposes.

The opinion holds that neither money appropriated by the legislature, and raised by taxation, nor money received from the federal government are available for rent payments. For this reason the military and the vocational education departments are relieved.

The opinion will not cause a shortage in rent receipts that are to be used to pay off the debt on the state office building, since this fund is already ahead \$180,000. The office building act provided that the money to pay for the building should be borrowed from the State Industrial Accident Commission, and that the commission be reimbursed from office rentals. Under the act fee-receiving departments pay rent whether quartered in the new building or some other state building.

Development Is Palestine Need

LONDON, Oct. 20. (AP)—A statement on Palestine immigration, land settlement and development, issued by Sir John Hope Simpson today simultaneously with the government declaration of policy, said that the sole way in which the Palestine mandate could be carried out was by intensive development of rural Palestine.

"Without development there is not room for a single additional settler," said the statement. "With thorough development there will be room not only for all the present agricultural population on a higher standard of life than it now enjoys, but for not less than 20,000 families of settlers from the outside."

Candidates And Battery Boys At Langell Valley

At a meeting Saturday night at the Langell Valley Community club, presided over by Mr. Prince, a number of candidates for county offices gave addresses. Several talks were also given in behalf of state candidates.

Outstanding on the program was the part taken by the Klamath Battery D members who appeared in uniform to solicit assistance in having the armory measure taken favorably by the voters at the November election.

D. E. Van Vactor, Klamath Falls attorney spoke in behalf of the proposed armory bond issue in the county. He told them of the wonderful record which the local battery had made. At the present time it leads the state National Guard organizations.

Roy Nelson and W. T. "Bill" Lee spoke briefly of their platforms on which they are running for county assessor. Mr. Lee is the incumbent while Mr. Nelson, a resident of Keno, received the Republican nomination for the office.

U. E. Reeder, one of the prominent farmers of the Klamath basin, spoke in behalf of the candidacy of Julius L. Meier for governor. Mr. Reeder told the Langell Valley people of Mr. Meier's constructive platform, the same on which George Joseph received the Republican nomination in the primaries.

Assistant district attorney Harry D. Bolvin, who is a candidate for district attorney, Mr. Bolvin addressed the group. Mr. Bolvin stated that he was born and raised in Klamath county and previous to that time was assistant city attorney of San Jose, Calif. His opponent, T. R. Gillenwaters, also spoke on his platform and invited the public to inspect his and Mr. Bolvin's records at the court house. Both Mr. Bolvin and Mr. Gillenwaters are present deputy district attorneys.
