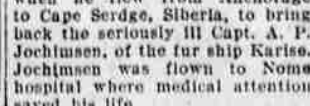

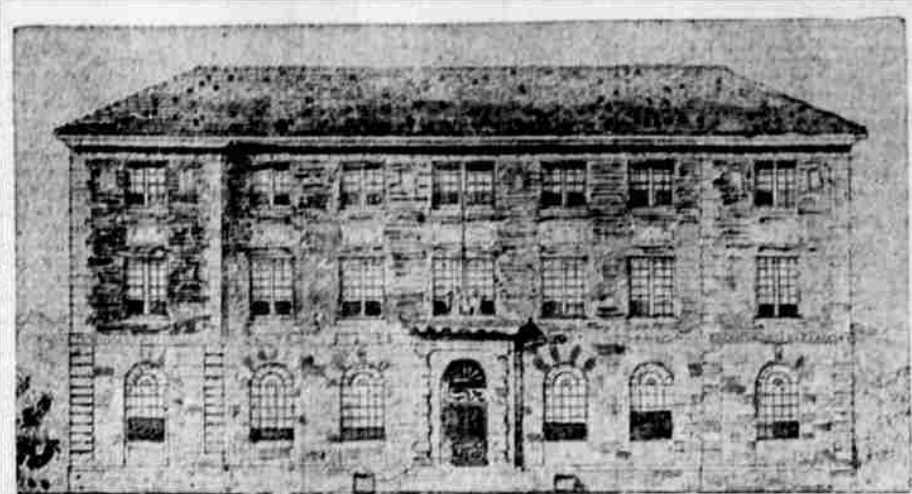

The New Federal Building

CORNERSTONE CEREMONIES ARE COMPLETE

Tuesday, October 21, at 2:30 p. m., the corner stone of the new Federal building will be laid with appropriate ceremonies. The dedication of this building will take place some time during 1931 and will mark 20 years of activity on the part of the local chamber of commerce. Nineteen years ago a committee was appointed to endeavor to secure a federal building for Klamath Falls and since that time constant effort has been put forth to bring this dream to end. Tomorrow's ceremony will be a gala event for all who are interested in the building progress of the city.

For half an hour before the ceremonies the high school band, in full uniform, will parade Main street and will meet at the Federal building at 2:30 to participate in the program. Wilson Wiley, district attorney, will give the main address.

The original building committee consisting of Lem L. Gaghan, chairman; Elmer H. Baisger, director in charge; John McCall, postmaster; Roy Durbin and Bert C. Thomas, will be in attendance. The other member of the committee, Herbert D. Newell, will not be here.

Representatives of the county and city have been invited to attend the event. Service clubs of the city will also have representatives attending. E. M. Bubb, president, will represent the chamber of commerce.

The Federal building which is being erected on a plot 229x156 feet on Seventh street between Walnut and Oak, is to be 105 feet by 88 feet in size. The contract was let on May 29, 1929, to George Isakson, 1015 East Irving street, Portland, Ore.; work was commenced July 8, 1929, and due to be completed October 11, 1931, at a cost of \$167,139, which price does not include equipment. The building is being constructed under the supervision of A. Earl Patterson, construction engineer for the treasury department.

The building is to be three stories in front and two stories in the rear, with partial basement which will be used as storage space by the post office and other branches occupying the building.

At the present time the building is 20 per cent complete. The exterior is to be native Oregon granite, Indiana limestone and red mat face brick in wide range of color laid English

bond in cream colored mortar. Trimmings to be terra cotta, in color to match the limestone.

The interior finish will be varied. The public lobby on first floor is to have red fire flash tile floor, marble border, base, trim and wainscot; plaster walls, ceiling and cornice. The public corridors on second and third floors are to have six feet by six feet red fire flash tile flooring; marble border and base; wood trim and plaster walls and ceiling.

The postmaster's office is to have oak flooring, base, trim and picture mould; plaster walls, ceiling and cornice.

The postoffice work room will have wood block flooring of either redwood or pine (at the option of the contractor); pine base and trim; T. & G. with V-joint pine wainscot and plaster walls and ceiling.

Other offices throughout the building are to be finished with either pine, Douglas fir or maple flooring (at the option of the contractor); base and trim of soft pine or white cedar for paint and plaster walls and ceiling.

The north end of the public lobby will be provided with a passenger elevator to be furnished and installed complete by the Otis Elevator company at the contract price of \$6,567.

The roof of the three-story portion of the building is to be of Mission tile with a range of color including dark, medium and light reds and purples. All deck roofing will be built up of five layers of 76-pound saturated felt, mopped in with hot coal tar pitch or asphalt and a final coat of hot pitch or asphalt of at least 70 pounds per square, in which will be embedded 400 pounds of gravel or 300 pounds of slag per square.

The main floor which will be occupied by the postoffice will provide more spacious quarters and up-to-date equipment for the handling of mail, with a large lobby having 19 windows for the transaction of postal business, and 800 post office boxes for patrons who cannot have their mail delivered. In addition to the main floor the post office will also occupy about one-eighth of the second floor which will have direct entrance from the work room on the main floor. The balance of the second floor will be occupied by the U. S. forest service, department of agriculture, recruiting office, post office inspector and other government bureaus.

The third floor will be occupied by the department of the interior, bureau of reclamation, by removal of offices now located at Eleventh and High streets.

The lawn will be about 12 feet wide in front of the building and 45 feet wide on each side of the building. The sidewalk on Seventh street will be 12 feet, 8 inches in width, 15 feet wide

Paul T. Jackson, principal of the Klamath Union high school, returned last evening from Salem where he attended a meeting of the Oregon High School Principals' association, of which he is president. On the same day there was a meeting of the State High School Athletic board, of which Mr. Jackson is vice president.

Several committee reports were given at the meeting of the principals. The discussions focused on high school activities and a uniform record system for the high schools throughout the state. The vocational guidance committee gave an excellent report of their work for the past year and their outline of work for the coming year. Mr. Jackson stated that their report was exceptionally good. Lewis Clark, civics teacher of the local school, is a member of the vocational committee.

At the meeting of the athletic board the dates for the state basketball tournament were set for March 18, 19, 20 and 21. The selection of a committee of ten, representing each district, was made to choose the winners of each district to participate in the contest, which will be held in Salem.
