We have been accorded a fine reception by leading stations, and will open Saturday with an exceptionally good initial distribution."

Recover Bodies Of Portland Men Killed Week Ago

EUREKA, Calif., Oct. 21. (AP)—Killed when their automobile plunged over a 500-foot embankment, the bodies of A. B. Knous and W. H. Knous, brothers, were found near Orleans, Humboldt county, late yesterday. The accident must have happened a week or so ago. Papers carried by the men indicated they were contractors, doing business in Portland under the name of Knous Brothers. Their automobile lodged in a tree.

Germans See New Plane Chasing Tail Through Clouds

BERLIN, Oct. 21. (AP)—German and foreign press representatives and a crowd of aviation fans flocked to Tempelhof airport today and watched a new "backward flying" monoplane apparently chasing its tail through the clouds.

Actually, it was not flying backward. It was the latest Focke-Wulf "Ente" which carries its tail where an ordinary monoplane carries its engine while its forward stabilizer portrudes 21 feet in front.

Flying near an ordinary monoplane, the new ship looked almost like its companion except that it seemed to be flying backward. Only when taxiing along the field at some distance did

the reason for its name "Ente" meaning duck, become apparent. With the forward stabilizer scooping the grass the plane looked for all the world like a big duck with outspread wings and outstretched neck running along.

The advantages claimed for the design are (1) that it is impossible to nose over when landing because the front wheel beneath the forward stabilizer is well in front of the center of gravity. (2) that it is proof against tail spins and (3) that its brakes can be applied after landing with the same abruptness as on an automobile, thus making landings on smaller fields possible.

Chinese Slay Two Priests; Others Held

SHANGHAI, Oct. 21. (AP)—Two Chinese Catholic priests were reported murdered by communists at Kian, in Kiangsi province, in reports reaching local headquarters of the missions here today. The reports also said Bishop Mignani of the Italian Catholic Lazarist mission, had been captured with six priests and ten sisters, the reports reaching here said, comprised Italians, French and Chinese Catholics.

It was reported the bishop and one priest had been released to arrange ransom, while the others were held by the reds as hostages.

Kian is approximately 100 miles south of Nanchang, which is being held by a small force of provincial troops.

Another almost who came home the closing day with a deer was Mr. Knoder, truck driver, who brought down one near Hildebrand. The deer weighed 262 pounds, dressed, and was one of the largest taken this season.

tended, has a normal unemployed total of approximately 1,000,000, consisting mostly of those who are not seeking work, or else are shifting from one job to another and are not without some income. The census also shows an average of 14 breadwinners per family, so that the total families without any source of income is placed by the government below the actual unemployed total.

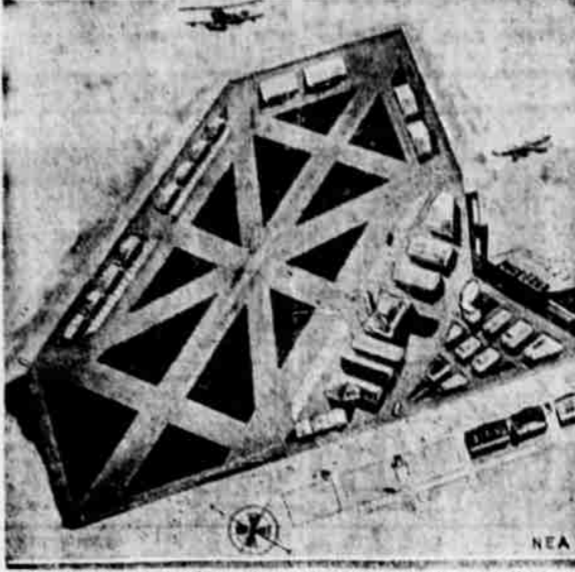
To Ask More Money
The government has extended virtually all of its appropriations for public works, amounting to approximately \$55,000,000, and is planning to ask congress to permit greatly increased expenditures so as to give increased employment.

State Board Is Allotted \$14,668 To Assist Work

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 21. (AP)—The state board for vocational education has received a certificate of allotment of federal funds in the amount of \$13,668.52 to be used in cooperative vocational education. This is the first quarterly payment of the total to be received for the fiscal year under the Smith-Hughes act for the promotion of agriculture, home economics and trade and industrial education in Oregon.

Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt Given Award

NEW YORK, Oct. 21. (AP)—Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, now in her 72nd year was announced today as winner of the 1930 Pictorial Review achievement award of \$5,000, given annually to the American woman who has contributed most of the national life, in letters, art, science, philanthropy, or social welfare.

Percy Waxman, editor of Pictorial Review, said the judges, in bestowing the award upon her were moved by her recent efforts in the interests of international peace and her activities in securing for women a greater share in public life.

The judges included Bruce Barton, Senator Arthur Capper, Mrs. Louise Homer, Otto H. Kahn, Mary Roberts Rhinehart and Carl Sandburg.

When asked if she felt that women had accomplished as much since getting the vote as they should have accomplished, Mrs. Catt replied: "Well, I never expected too much."

Bend Sheriff Finds Hacksaw Blades in Jail

BEND, Oct. 21. (AP)—For the second time in the past two weeks, Sheriff McCauley yesterday reported that hacksaw blades had been discovered in the Deschutes county jail. Four were found hidden behind pictures and in crevasses in the walls. Six prisoners are held awaiting the meeting of the grand jury in November.

Supply Turkeys Will Be Normal

CORVALLIS, Oct. 21. (AP)—Reports from the department of agriculture in Washington, D. C., received by the Oregon State college market service give assurance of an average supply of turkeys for Thanksgiving.

Government estimates place the 1930 crop at 3 per cent below that of last year, but greater than that of the two previous seasons.

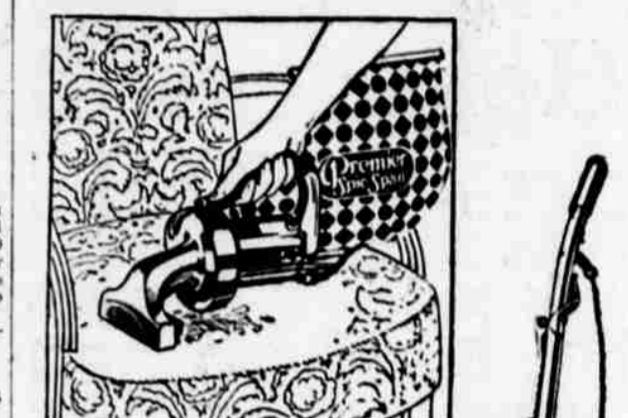
Court Sustains Jury Verdict In Oregon City Case
