George Moran, Gangster, Is Under Arrest

WAUKEGAN, Ill., Oct. 21. (A. P.)—George (Rags) Moran, former north side gangland ruler and rival of Al Capone, was arrested early today at Cassidy's roadhouse, 15 miles west of here. Moran, alone when a constable and five private detectives surprised him, offered no resistance. Immediately after his apprehension, Moran was hustled to Waukegan where he was held in \$50,000 bonds on a vagrancy charge.

Col. A. V. Smith, state's attorney for Lake county, said that a charge of carrying concealed weapons would also be lodged against Moran, who disputed with Capone forces for control of Chicago's gangland enterprises until his mob was weakened by the St. Valentine's day massacre and later by numerous defections to his opponent.

Col. Smith said that the Lake county authorities had sought Moran and Leo Mongovan, his bodyguard, for months. Mongovan, according to some stories, was supposed to have been slain and his body secretly disposed of by gang enemies, but the Lake county prosecutor said that his information indicated that Mongovan was still living and had been with Moran only recently at Beudji, Minn.

Both Moran and Mongovan were among the 25 men listed some time ago by the Chicago crime commission as "public enemies."
