WARNER-PRICE FEUD GROWING IN INTENSITY

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., Oct. 21. (AP)—Head Football Coach Glenn Warner, replying to an attack made on him by Coach "Nibs" Price of California, accusing Warner of having Nick Bican, California tackle being declared ineligible, denied having had anything to do with Bican's disqualification.

Warner declared one of the men on his squad had played with Bican at Willamette University in 1926 and that this player had brought the matter before Professor William Owen of Stanford, head of the Pacific coast conference.

Coach Warner expressed the opinion that Price was merely trying to whip his players into a fighting mood for the Stanford-California game November 22 with his statement.

Bican was declared ineligible on a transfer rule technicality. It was discovered he played freshman football at Willamette university before transferring to Sacramento Junior college, where he played a year before coming to California.

Price said he was riled, not at the loss of Bican as a player, but rather that Warner's action had brought grief to the youngster.

"A Little Training--Thats All", Declares "Chuck" to Jail Host

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 21. (AP)—Charles (Chuck) Wiggins, local heavyweight boxer whose pugilistic ability has brought him fame and at times misfortune, sat in solitary confinement in the city jail today as the result of a "little training."

He was arrested late last night after he was alleged to have "cleaned out" a restaurant, chasing patrons into the street.

Wiggins said he saved them no trouble although on a previous occasion he snuggly drubbed three officers who attempted to arrest him in a northside hotel lobby.

"Just getting a little training, that's all," Wiggins remarked as he climbed into the patrol wagon. After he had fought three prisoners in the city jail, he was removed to solitary confinement.

New York Bout Has Fatal End For German Lad

NEW YORK, Oct. 21. (AP)—Warren Hogan, New York negro light heavyweight, was under arrest on a technical charge of homicide today in connection with the death of Carl Baldus, German boxer, Baldus collapsed and died in the ring of the New Lenox Sporting club last night.

Baldus and Hogan were matched in one of the four round preliminaries and had put up an even battle for two rounds.

In the third round Hogan landed a hard right to the heart that hurt the German although he was able to raise his gloves in defense. Before another exchange of blows, however, Baldus slumped out by the referee, Mike Hylan.

Unconscious, he was carried to a dressing room and the club physician summoned. After an examination he was pronounced dead. An autopsy will be held to determine the cause of death.

Baldus, who was 25 years old, came to this country three years ago but had never fought professionally until last night.

MILLION TROUT ARE RELEASED IN THIS COUNTY

More than one million trout and streams of Klamath county and adjacent thereto during the 15-month period ending September 30, this year, and more than 1,000,000 remain on hand for planting dates in the future.

Trout remaining at the local hatchery are available for planting at any time, and residents who desire to replenish streams in their districts are asked to communicate with Perry Southwick, superintendent of the hatchery at Klamath Agency, or with Otto Osterborn of Klamath Falls.

It should be remembered that as this work is carried on solely with the money derived from the sale of licenses to the people of the state, no trout will be furnished for "posted" streams or lakes.

Army's veteran line and youthful backfield will invade the Yale bowl in high hopes of avenging the 21-13 beating it took a year ago.

Football fans will have to go back even further to discover the first meeting between Harvard and Dartmouth. They inaugurated their series in 1852 and since then Harvard has won 27 games and Dartmouth seven with two ties.

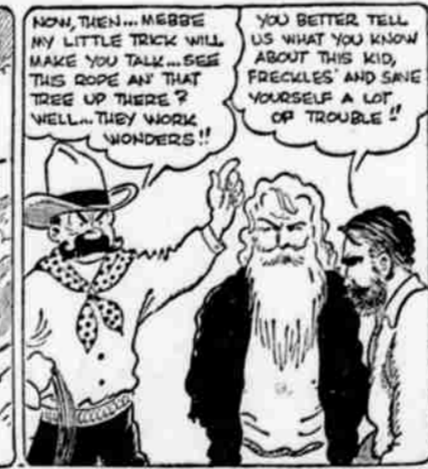
1901's Scrambled Hersewelle Neither here nor there

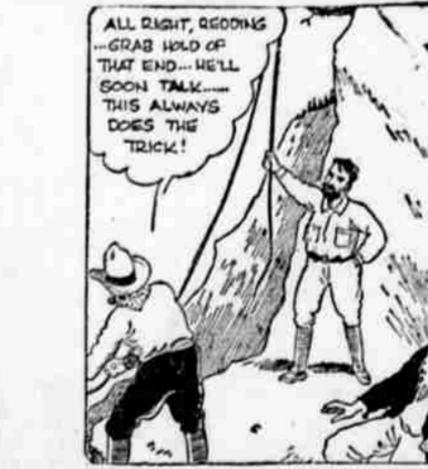
