

CANDIDATES APPEAR BEFORE PUBLIC MEET

A group of candidates for various city and county offices appeared Tuesday night before a well attended public gathering at the Eagles hall, Ninth and Walnut streets, where they presented their qualifications and platforms.

Mrs. J. L. Seitz presided as chairman at the meeting, introducing the various speakers.

stressed the fact that it was not his intention to meddle, but to fulfill the duties within the scope of the police judge to the best of his ability should he be elected.

Is Co-Candidate
Howard Larsen, another candidate for police judge, and who prefers to be known as a co-candidate rather than an opponent, at the beginning of his talk corrected the idea which many have that his occupation is that of a plumber, saying that he is only a painter.

Larsen stated frankly that he desires the office, first, for the salary, and second, for the small amount of prestige connected with it, and said it is his intention to do what he can for organized labor. Larsen is a former student of Western university at Cleveland, Ohio, where he studied sociology, and is deeply interested in social work.

Mrs. Irma Dixon, candidate for the city treasurer's office, laid down the four necessary qualifications for this office as follows: Knowledge of handling large sums of money accurately and quickly; a good working know-

edge of bookkeeping; ability to make proper and safe investments for the city, and how to serve the public. As a point to be taken into consideration, Mrs. Dixon pointed out that the city treasurer last year handled three million dollars. She has already served one term in this office.

William Ferguson was the only candidate present who is in the majority race, stating that if he is elected the people will know at all times what the city administration is doing, and why. In his talk he spoke of the great amounts being expended under the heads of progress and improvements, giving as examples the cost of land for a municipal airport and land for a disposal plant which was purchased from the Great Northern Railroad company.

Charge "Juggling"
Ferguson also brought up the matter of transferring money from one city fund to another, which he charged has been practiced by city officials, and expressed the opinion that such "juggling" is not legal.

Harry Bolvin, democratic candidate for the office of district attorney, informed those present that he would not go into office with the idea of hanging up a criminal record, but wishes to operate the office on a co-operative basis. Bolvin is a graduate in law from the University of California and Santa Clara college.

Mr. Bolvin pointed out the fact that he was raised in Klamath county and attended public schools here. He has already been in the office for three years and has made an enviable record for honesty and conscientious enforcement of the law.

T. R. Gillenwaters, republican candidate for the office of district attorney, who attended University of Oregon school of law, explained to the voters the identification bureau which he was influential in putting into operation in Klamath county, and which has saved much over-lapping of cases and provided easier cooperation with law enforcement officers of other cities.

Roy Nelson, candidate for county assessor, and rancher in the Keno district, said he would make no promises but that he declared

himself a candidate for office because he is not satisfied with the present tax situation in Klamath county. Nelson declared he would not promise to change the situation because it is not in the power of the assessor, but he would make an effort to adjust the assessments to place all taxpayers on an equal basis. Nelson is now president of the county library board.

Speaks for Measure
Mr. Bagley and Louis Porter, candidates for councilman of the fourth ward, were both introduced and in a short talk Bagley declared that he is "for the taxpayers and the betterment of Klamath Falls."

Stanley Jones talked for several minutes on the soldiers' loan measure which will be on the November ballot, and which extends the present loan feature for the building of homes or acquiring businesses to ex-service men who have been citizens of Oregon for the past 10 years. Jones declared that passage of this measure would not raise the taxes as many people seem to think, and urged

the voters to cast their ballots favorably for it.

To Discuss Bill
C. D. Long, president of organized labor's Political league, and of the Central Labor council, recommended passage of the state textbook measure, which is backed by organized labor, saying that it would tend toward universal education.

It was announced that a discussion of the grange power bill will be held at the Eagles hall, Saturday evening, November 1, when Homer T. Bone and Kenneth Harlan will speak on the measure.

Jesse W. Carman Enters Army Tour
