

PRESIDENT OF CHINA BAPTIZED

Accepts Rites and Tenants Of Christian Faith At Ceremony Today

IS SECOND CHRISTIAN TO HOLD HIGH PLACE Once Saved Christian Mission Because of Friendship For American

SHANGHAI, Oct. 23, (AP)—General Chiang Kai-shek, youthful nationalist president of China, was baptized a Christian today.

The conversion of Chiang Kai-shek will once more permit the term "Christian General" to be used in Chinese dispatches. Marshal Feng Yu-hsiang, another noted general, once was an adherent of Christianity, but in recent years was reported to have renounced it.

Chiang Kai-shek first gained fame in 1925 and 1926, when he swept over China with a Cantonese army in a revolution that established a republic with himself as the head. He operated with the aid of Russian communists at first, but later shook them off.

Spared Christian Mission

All this summer Chiang's administration has been beset by trouble. On one hand he has been fighting a northern coalition under Yen-Hui-shan and Feng, while armies of Chinese reds have sacked the interior. At present the civil war has let up and nationalist troops are moving against the reds.

An instance is told how Chiang once spared a Christian mission which had done him a favor. This was in 1925, after a dentist at the Yale-in-China mission at Changsha had extracted a painful wisdom tooth for the young general. He was so grateful that when his armies surged through the country he ordered the Yale buildings to be spared.

Accepts Christianity

Chiang and his wife arrived today from Nanking. He went to the home of his mother-in-law, Mrs. Soong, in the international settlement, and there the simple ceremony was performed by the Rev. Z. T. Kuang, Chinese pastor of the Young Allen Memorial church.

The pastor asked the president whether he sincerely desired to become a Christian. Chiang replied that he did. Whereupon the pastor sprinkled water upon the young president and admitted him to the Christian church.

The baptism had been kept secret and the accomplished fact has startled all Shanghai and Nanking. Outside the family circle no one had the slightest idea of the president's intention.

The branch of the Christian church into which Chiang Kai-shek was baptized is Methodist.

The president's baptism was regarded as a blow at the extremists who are hunting down Christians in Kiangsi Province and elsewhere in the Yangtze valley.

Macdoel Woman Dies of Injury

Aura Belle Goode, wife of Rev. Wilmer E. Goode of Macdoel, Calif., who was accidentally killed at his ranch several months ago, passed away at an early hour this morning following a long illness.

Mrs. Goode was born in Nebraska in 1863, and was 67 years of age at the time of her death. She is survived by three sons, Arthur P. Goode of Prospect, Ore., Elsworth and Merl of Macdoel, and four daughters, Mrs. Bertha Kandy of Crater Lake National Park, Mrs. Marie Milligan of Richmond, Calif., Mrs. Eva Young and Mrs. Maude Holmes of Macdoel, Calif.

The remains are in the gold room at the Earl Whitlock funeral home. Announcement of funeral arrangements will be made later.

Helping the rise of wheat prices was word from Chairman Leage of the Federal Farm Board that the price of Russian wheat had been raised 4 to 6c a bushel in Europe during the last few days.

Captain of Detectives Bert Clark announced that he had obtained the admission from Mrs. O'Loughlin after a grilling of six hours. The woman's iron nerve broke, and she was carried to her cell in the matron's quarters of the city jail, on the verge of a complete mental and physical breakdown.

Beyond the bare announcement that Mrs. O'Loughlin "had talked," Captain Clark declined to comment.

Without Details

"Neither Mrs. O'Loughlin nor myself was in condition to go into details when her admission came," Captain Clark declared. "I expect to get a more detailed statement from her later on, when she has had time to collect herself."

Captain Clark, worn out himself by the strain of the protracted questioning, went to his home.

Brother-in-Law Held

Frank O'Loughlin, brother of Detective Leo O'Loughlin, father of the murdered child, was taken into custody for questioning in connection with the slaying today.

Ray Humphries, investigator for district attorney, said that O'Loughlin had been shadowed by officers four days.

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INDUSTRY CALLED TO GIVE AID

Director Woods Launches Plans To Provide Work for Idle

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23, (AP)—A call to American industry to cooperate in the alleviation of suffering among unemployed this winter was sounded today by Col. Arthur Woods, President Hoover's relief director, after a conference at the White House.

Colonel Woods, who arrived here last night to take charge of setting up a relief organization, conferred for an hour with the president, Secretary Lamont, Secretary Hurley, and under-secretary Mills of the treasury.

Will Perfect Organization

After the conference Woods indicated a formal request to industry to cooperate in giving as many jobs as possible would be made soon.

The conferees said the first definite step would be to set up an organization for Woods and then to obtain information on where jobs can be found.

They would draft men qualified for the work from all over the country and if possible would obtain those men who worked with Col. Woods in his unemployment relief work in 1921 under President Harding.

Expects Industry to Aid

Colonel Woods said this far industry was doing its part but he expected more cooperation in the general campaign.

"I do not only expect industry to do its part," he said, "but

to see that it is already doing so."

Headquarters for the administrator of unemployment relief will be set up in the commerce department. Members of the President's cabinet unemployment committee of seven planned to lend every effort to get the organization functioning within the shortest time possible.

Plans State Aid

As soon as possible Colonel Woods plans to designate state committees on unemployment and committees to deal with the subject in the various industries.

Mayor James J. Curley of Boston said, after a conference with the President, that Massachusetts had set up a group of presidents of the state's educational institutions and economic professors to study unemployment and they had recommended a federal economic board be set up to work out a long time program looking to the elimination or mitigation of economic depression.

Mayor Curley said in his opinion the federal government could greatly assist the country by formulating a permanent instead of temporary program to provide unemployment.

Canadians Are Traveling South

C. W. Laird, traveling freight agent for the Canadian Pacific railroad, arrived in Klamath Falls this morning from San Francisco to transact business. Mr. Laird is also representative for the Soo line, the D. S. & A. and the Spokane International railroads.

Mr. Laird stated today that the tourist move from Canada south had started and that hundreds of Canadian people were leaving to spend the winter in California. The movement of the travelers south, over the Southern Pacific's train "Klamath" enables many of the people to obtain a view of the industrial possibilities of the Klamath Basin on their way south, he explained.

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SIXTY MILLION BUSHEL WHEAT HELD BY BOARD

CHICAGO, Oct. 23, (AP)—The grain stabilization corporation's wheat holdings, which Chairman Leage of the Federal Farm Board suggested might be used to feed unemployed, amount to approximately 60,000,000 bushels.

George S. Milnor, president of the corporation, said the grain, which is all of last year's crop, was stored in elevators scattered over the United States and would be immediately available if congress decided to use it for the suggested purpose.

Unless some such action was taken or unless the price advanced above the cost price to the corporation, Milnor said his organization had pledged itself not to sell its holding in competition with American farmers during the marketing of their 1930 crop.
