

GRAIN DEALERS ASK FOR REFUND OF LARGE SUM

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 24. (AP)—Strauss & Co. of Portland and Henry N. Collins of Pendleton will be the main contenders for refund payments from Oregon railroads when the grain rate reparations hearing is called by the state public service commission. Records filed with the commission show that out of a total of \$300,000 or more in demanded reparations Strauss & Co. will claim over \$100,000 and Collins in excess of \$50,000.

The date for beginning the hearing will not be later than December 8, members of the service commission believe. The hearing will be in Portland. The total number of claimants is 35, and practically every railroad in Oregon is a defendant. While the bulk of the claims pertains to grain shipments that have been made from eastern Oregon, some of the smaller ones are from the Willamette Valley and other western Oregon districts.

Whether grain and grain products transportation from an Oregon point to Portland and its later export to Portland, is interstate or intrastate shipment is the vital question in the case. The railroads contend that when the product is exported from Portland the shipment is interstate, and that intrastate grain rate reductions made by the service commission in 1924 do not apply. The claimants assert that these are intrastate shipments. If the commission holds that the shipments are interstate there appears to be no doubt that reparations will be collected.

Reduced intrastate rates made by the service commission six years ago have been in effect since, but the shippers alleged that the railroads have charged them interstate rates on intrastate shipments.

OAKLAND, Calif., Oct. 24. (AP)—Feeling somewhat psychic and hankering for a message from his Aunt Minnie, Patrolman C. E. Brown donned his plain clothes and visited the "Spiritualistic Church of the Revelation."

Brown met James J. Dickson, the spiritualist in charge, and set forth his yearnings. Dickson gave Brown some preliminary instruction, and then retired to an adjoining room. The lights faded to a mere glimmer. A pair of portieres parted, and a shadowy figure in white confronted Brown.

"Me Chief Elk Heart," grunted the figure in white. "I tell you all you want to know."

"I don't want to bother any Indian spirits," said Brown. "Where is my Aunt Minnie?"

Chief Elk Heart hesitated a moment, and then vanished behind the portieres. A moment later the curtains parted again, and a shadowy figure in white, suspiciously resembling Chief Elk Heart, appeared.

BRAZIL FALLS IN REVOLUTION

In Rio De Janeiro itself. A provisional headquarters being set up and a proclamation being issued to all Brazilians to end the civil warfare now in progress and to establish peace again.

The coup came with dramatic swiftness shortly after midnight. Military police and some troops taking their positions around the presidential residence and cutting off traffic.

Junta Takes Charge

General Menan Barreto, head of the Rio De Janeiro Garrison, acting in the name of a civil and military committee, went to the president and demanded his resignation, but for many hours the latter refused.

During the early hours of the day the city was quiet, but latter days of hoodlums made their way through the main streets and attacked the offices of two newspapers which had been supporters of the government. Furniture was thrown out of upper floors and was burned.

Peace Call Issued

News of the coup was sent out by radio through the military committee and the strict censorship was lifted in order that the latest developments might be sent out of the country.

Later the provisional headquarters of the military committee issued a proclamation denouncing the civil warfare of the past three weeks and calling for peace.

Coup Comes Quickly

The coup which overthrew the Washington Luis government had not been expected in political circles for at least another week with the possibility that the president might have been given opportunity to finish his term which ends Nov. 15.

However, shortly after midnight the military police and some troops were rushed to Guanabara Palace, the presidential residence, and diverted all traffic to Copacabana and other suburbs in that direction.

Revolution Is Short

The administration fell before a revolution which began Friday, Oct. 3, just three weeks ago, spread rapidly over the entire republic until but three of the major eastern seaboard states, Rio De Janeiro, Sao Paulo and Bahia, remained loyal to the government.

President Washington Luis, whose full name was Dr. Washington Luis Pereira De Souza, assumed office Nov. 15, 1926, and was to have served until Nov. 15 of this year when he could be succeeded by president-elect Julio Prestes who recently completed a visit to the United States.

MARRIAGE OF ROYAL COUPLE ATTRACTS MANY

ASSISI, Italy, Oct. 24. (AP)—Kings and commoners, statesmen and hawkers, soldiers and priests converged on this little city today in anticipation of the marriage tomorrow of Princess Giovanna, third daughter of the Italian king, to Czar Boris III of Bulgaria.

Prior to the ceremony a royal train bearing the bride and groom, King Victor Emmanuel, Queen Elena, and others attending them, will arrive from Turin and San Remo. After the ceremony it will carry the royal figures back to old haunts, while Boris and Giovanna leave for a short Adriatic honeymoon prior to a second ceremony at Sofia.

The Roman Catholic ceremony here is by special dispensation of the pope, who is permitting Giovanna to marry Boris, of the Greek orthodox faith, with the proviso that their children be brought up as Roman Catholics, and that there be no succeeding Greek Orthodox marriage ceremony which might be construed as having been recognized by the Vatican. Because of these stipulations it is regarded as probable that the Sofia ceremony will be little more than a ceremonial registration of the marriage.

Princess Giovanna is a tall, pretty, black-haired, brown-eyed girl, who will be 23 years old November 17. She has known Boris for several years, their romance having been thwarted for a long time because of the religious complications involved.

Boris is 36 years old, and has sat on the throne of his country since abdication of his father, on October 3, 1919. He also is tall, and is known as one of the handsomest monarchs of Europe. He is very popular in his own kingdom.

Eighteen counts are alleged in the indictment, returned secretly by a federal grand jury a month ago.

Invention May Be Driller's Boon



Untold millions in "black gold" beneath the mile levels accessible to "suction-rod" type of pumps may soon be brought to the surface through the invention of Dr. E. C. Eckstromer, Redwood City, Cal., engineer and inventor. Eckstromer's invention harnesses the great forces of electricity, and the whole working model measures but 43 feet in length. POLLUTION OF STREAMS TOPIC AT SALEM MEET

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 24. (AP)—There is at present no need for state legislation to prevent pollution in Oregon, "and certainly no need for drastic legislation compelling cities to spend money in sewage disposal work in the opinion of Prof. H. B. Rogers of Oregon State college, who addressed the league of Oregon cities here today. Correction of hazards resulting from stream pollution, he said, are matters for the attention of the cities, rather than the state.

Rogers believes there is a pressing need, however, for a scientific study of stream life which furnishes a basis for determining the sanitary condition of streams.

Chris Schuebel of Oregon City, president of the league, recommended the creation of sinking funds by the cities to finance sewage disposal plants. He declared that the present practice of issuing bonds with too little restraint is proving to be "a millstone about the necks of our cities." Seven cities in the state, he said, have defaulted in interest payments on bonds during the last year because of lack of foresight in providing for payment.

Schuebel advocated state maintenance within incorporated cities of streets that are parts of state highways.

Sponsor Tickets Sufficient Says Paul T. Jackson

Paul T. Jackson, principal of the Klamath high school, announced today that student body sponsor tickets would admit anyone to the fairgrounds tomorrow. "There will be students on the street selling tickets tomorrow, and we don't want people who have already purchased sponsor tickets to feel that they must purchase an additional ticket for the game," he commented.

Liberia Faces Domestic Slaves

GENEVA, Oct. 23. (UP)—The domestic slaves of Liberia, negro republic on the west coast of Africa, have been freed by presidential decree, Antoine Rottlie, permanent Liberian delegate to the League of Nations, announced today.

The system of "pawning" members of native families as security was also abolished by the decree, Rottlie announced, together with enforced emigration of natives in connection with labor contracts.
