Chas. Hogue, Well Known Former Man Of Klamath, Dies

Word has just been received in Klamath Falls of the death of Charles C. Hogue, for many years a resident of this city. Mr. Hogue was fiscal agent for the Klamath project of the United States reclamation bureau from 1905 until 1919, when he retired, and moved with his family to Berkeley, Calif.

Mr. Hogue was 50 years of age at the time of his death, which was caused by a paralytic stroke on the 14th of October. Mr. Hogue is survived by his wife, Mary C. Hogue, to whom he would have been married 56 years on the 22nd day of October; two sons, Harry and Ed, and two daughters, Miss Faye Hogue and Mrs. Anton Poliva.

Mr. Hogue was at one time a teacher in Oregon State college. While connected with the government service in this city, he was active in every movement for the advancement of the community. He was a careful student, and a leader in the intellectual life of the town.

Silver Cup Will Be Given Winner Of Girls Teams

Girls of the city schools have never before been offered a trophy for volleyball, although all other athletic teams have played for cups, but Mr. and Mrs. H. E. Wattenburg of this city today announced that they will offer a cup to the winning girls' volleyball team of the city schools. The cup will be known as the Wattenburg cup, and the team winning it three years in succession will be allowed to keep it permanently.

Mr. and Mrs. Wattenburg have been prominent in civic activities of Klamath Falls, since their arrival here in 1906, shortly after their marriage in Pendleton, Ore. For several years Mrs. Wattenburg was a member of the school board, but at the beginning of the world war, she resigned from the board and taught the Riverside school. Mrs. Wattenburg is a graduate of Oregon State college.

Mr. Wattenburg is a building contractor in this city. Both Mr. and Mrs. Wattenburg have always been interested in school work, and Mrs. Wattenburg stated today, "for an earnest teacher, no better work could be selected than school work."
