

BRAZIL IS TO HAVE A NEW RULE

Junta Moves To Set Up New Regime And To Restore Peace

ONLY NATIVE BORN WILL HOLD OFFICE

More Trouble Is Brewing In North; U. S. Gives Policy

RIO DE JANEIRO, Oct. 25. (AP)—The revolutionaries, junta which yesterday overthrew the government of President Washington Luis set about today to reorganize the political structure and restore peace throughout Brazil.

The junta, composed principally of General Menes Barreto, General Leite Castro, General Tasso Fragoso and Admiral Rauls Noronha, planned a meeting as soon as possible to form a cabinet. It is understood that Octavio Manabira, foreign minister of the late government, will be a member of the new ministry.

Natives Favored

Also on the junta's program are the dissolution of congress, the calling of a special congress to revise the constitution, new regulations for military service, the establishment of a secret ballot, obligatory education and uniformity in taxes. Plans also call for the eventual convocation of a new congress, composed of twelve representatives from each state.

It also is planned that in the future only native-born Brazilians shall occupy public office.

Captain Jaurer Is Thrown

Telegrams exchanged between heads of the junta and those in charge of the states which backed the revolution of three weeks ago are wholly congratulatory in character, and stir the belief here that the revolutionaries in the field will join with those in the capital in working out some form of new government.

Dispatches from the north indicate, however, that Captain Jaurer Tavora may have ideas of his own as to constitution of a new regime. This officer, who began the revolt in the northern state of Pernambuco and accumulated a large army as he pushed through the states of Parahyba, Alagoas, Sergipe and down into Bahia, is expected here by airplane.

Luna Held Prisoner

The deposed president, Washington Luis, was still held a prisoner in Fort Copacabana.

In Rio de Janeiro business went on as usual this morning.

POLICY OF UNITED STATES ANNOUNCED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25. (AP)—American recognition of the new regime in Brazil will be guided by the same policy which the state department followed recently in recognizing the new governments in Argentina, Peru and Bolivia.

Secretary Stimson, in making this announcement today, outlined three points upon which the extension of American recognition would depend.

These are whether the new government is in control of the situation, and is in a position to protect life, liberty and property, whether it is backed by public sentiment, and whether it can fulfill the obligations of a government.

the highest royal figures of Europe, were not afforded even this protection and many were drenched. By the time Boris arrived at the church the rain had turned to hail and he and his suite were badly battered.

Inside the church the bridal party had difficulty in forming for the march down the center aisle of the historic edifice to the altar, but after some delay this was done and while the vestal choir of 120 voices sang the stirring Latin invocation "O Lord Make Safe Our Kings" they circled about the altar for the ceremony.

3,000 People Wait Outside

Father Rizzo, custodian of the basilica, read the marriage ceremony, which was brief, in keeping with a union in matrimony of a Roman Catholic and non-Roman Catholic.

A crowd of 3,000 or so had remained not far from the church despite the rain as they cheered loudly as the party appeared. Princess Giovanna, who while she was inside the church had become Queen Giovanna, smiled graciously. Boris seemed preoccupied. During the wedding and visits to the lower church and crypt of St. Francis, Princess Giovanna was frequently in tears. She did not recover her composure until she left the church when the sight of 200 Assisi children, straining white roses in her path brought back her dimpled smile.

Giovanna wore a white gown with a high neck and long sleeves. Its very short train was borne by two officers of the court. Boris wore a dark blue full uniform of a Bulgarian general with red facings, red sash, and multi-colored decorations.

"To do this we are giving all the men who are able to work a chance to earn a little money and shelter by working in our wood yard, cutting wood to sell. The wood is then sold to the public for the regular price," he stated.

The money derived from the sale of wood is turned back into the relief fund.

Men who have been unable to work on account of illness have been helped by the staff of Salvation Army doctors in the city, who give their time free. The medicine is purchased by the Army officers.

\$150,000 Heating Plant Is Nearing Completion Here

Plant Under Construction Here To Be Most Modern on Pacific Coast.

Construction work on the first unit of the new plant being installed for the Klamath Heating company is going forward rapidly and according to those in charge will be ready for operation November 10.

Involving an expenditure of \$150,000 and providing a capacity ten times that of the present plant, the new unit will, according to the engineer in charge, not only supply heat to meet the maximum demands of the city at this time, but the requirements which will come with the increased growth of the next few years. Engineers and those experienced in the planning and construction of heating plants say that the new plant will be the most modern on the Pacific coast, combining every possible feature designed to afford efficiency.

Giant Boilers Installed.

Two new gigantic boilers, as different from the old type now in operation in the present plant as day is from night, are included in this unit. They are known as the Sterling type and each is equipped with 250 34-inch tubes which are 18 feet long. Measured in horsepower, each is capable of generating a volume of steam equaling 450 horsepower. Fireboxes of the most modern type are being installed with the boilers, each having four feeds through which hot fuel from local sawmills will be automatically fed from electric-driven conveyors connecting with the fuel storage house, which was recently completed as a part of the general improvement.

One of the giant boilers is now in position and all but bricked in. This will be placed in operation November 10 and the other will be installed by December 1.

Prepare for Emergencies.

Speaking of the capacity of the two boilers included in the present unit, H. J. Wenderoth, manager of the company, says that one of them will supply steam sufficient to meet heating requirements at this time of year.

Indicative of the care which the company is exercising to be in position to meet any emergency and the increased demand which will come with the rapid growth of the city, two of the largest boilers included in the

old plant will be maintained for reserve purposes.

The entire unit is being housed in a new fireproof building of brick and steel construction. The new building stands on the location of the old structure, which has been dismantled, except that part which houses the two old boilers, and the program provides for its complete removal as soon as the new boilers are placed in operation.

Endless conveyors will convey fuel from the storage house to the new boiler room. These are so constructed that when the plant is not operating to full capacity surplus fuel is returned and dumped into the fuel house.

The conveyors are driven by electric motors equipped with automatic shut-offs.

Provisions will also be made to install tanks for fuel oil, which will be available in emergencies.

Plant Costs \$150,000.

The heating plant proper, and new building in which it is being installed was awarded on contract to the J. R. Johnsons Co. for \$100,000.

An additional \$50,000 is being expended by the Klamath Heating Co. for the installation of new mains, which are of sufficient size to meet the increased production of the modern new plant. Work of installing the larger mains has been under way for some time and will be completed by the date the new plant is finished.

Have Faith in Klamath.

Permanency and maximum efficiency are combined in every detail and part of the new equipment and its installation, and afford splendid evidence of the faith of the officers and directors of the company in the permanency of Klamath Falls and of its rapid growth in the future. It is planned to install a second unit of similar size when requirements demand it.

Oregon men own and control the Klamath Heating Co. Directors of the company are Julius Meier, G. L. Hinsdale and T. P. Reisteigen of Portland. Hinsdale is president, Reisteigen, vice-president, and John C. Veatch of Portland is secretary-treasurer. C. C. McGilchrist of this city, who is a stockholder in the company, is local attorney. H. J. Wenderoth, also a stockholder in the company, is manager.

Pilots to Carry People For Cent A Pound Sunday

One cent a pound day will be observed at the new Klamath municipal airport on the Midland road Sunday, according to today's announcement. This will be the first special rate offered at the new flying field, and will be the last cent a pound rate this year.

Those wishing to take advantage of this opportunity will also be given an exhibition of glider flying, which will be held all day Sunday by members of the Pelican Glider club.

Government licensed ships will be used and transport pilots will be in charge.

High Court Rules Against New Tax

the opinion points the way to an intangibles tax that will stand the test of the courts.

Must Include Corporations.

"The opinion points out," Carling said, "that an intangibles tax can be made valid by including corporations, and explains further that there would be no logical objection to including corporations and then allowing them a deduction to offset their excise taxes."

The court holds that the intangibles act violates the 14th amendment to the federal constitution which guarantees equal protection of the laws. It is held to be discriminatory against the individual as compared to corporations.

Rossman Writes Opinion.

Justice Rossman wrote the opinions which were concurred in by all other members of the court except Justice Kelly who did not participate in the case. Judge L. H. McMahon of the circuit court for Marion county is reversed. The predominant opinion is written in the case of Scott Redfield against the tax commission.

"The individual, unlike the corporation," the opinion says, "cannot be taxed for the mere privilege of existing. The corporation is an artificial entity which owes its existence and charter powers to the state. The individual's right to live and own property are natural rights for the enjoyment of which an excise cannot be imposed. Thus when the corporation pays five per cent of its net income to the state it has not paid an ad valorem tax based upon the value of its intangibles, or calculated upon the return from such possession, but has discharged an entirely different tax imposed for a very different reason."

Corporations Escape.

"Thus, we have a situation where the individual is compelled to pay a tax upon his intangibles while the corporation escapes entirely from this tax. Yet the tax can be levied as well upon the corporation as upon the individual. Double taxation would not result if the corporation were given credit upon its excise tax for any payments made upon its intangibles tax. The legislature cannot grant an exemption from a tax on property by accepting as a substitute an excise tax not based upon the value of the property of the exempted individuals."

INTANGIBLES TAX MEANING EXPLAINED

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 25. (AP)—The state intangibles tax that was held unconstitutional by the supreme court yesterday is a tax of 5 per cent upon the income from "money," bonds, notes, claims and demands, secured or unsecured, and from "all shares of stock in corporations and any and all other evidences of indebtedness." An exemption of \$200, to be deducted from the amount of the income, is allowed.

The excise tax which the opinion upholds is a 5 per cent on the earnings of corporations.

Mrs. W. W. McCredie, in company with her husband, Judge McCredie, went to the office of the West Coast Insurance Company in the Falling building Thursday at noon and was given a \$60,000 check representing insurance held by Charles Y. Wigfall, brilliant young attorney, whose death mystery has been cleared up regardless of the suicide verdict of a coroner's jury.

The check represented an insurance policy which the company was obligated to pay no matter what the circumstances of death, since the suicide clause had run out.

After presenting the check, J. W. Stewart, superintendent of the company, said he still believed Wigfall the victim of a murder.

Asked if Wigfall's will had yet been found, Judge McCredie said: "Why, surely!" The document would not be probated unless it was necessary to do so, he said on further questioning.

If the bequests mentioned in the will, which is not yet a public document, are paid it will be because of the "good will" of Mrs. McCredie, the judge said. Mrs. McCredie would make no statement on that point.

The McCredies expect to take no further step in clearing up Wigfall's estate until they receive notification of the action of the two other insurance companies with which Wigfall carried policies: Commercial Casualty, \$10,000, and Columbia National, \$50,000. Those policies are said to contain suicide clauses yet in effect.
