STATE BUILDING CODE URGED BY OREGON CITIES

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 25 (AP).—Whether a proposed state building code will be considered by the next legislature will depend on the outcome of a referendum vote by the cities of Oregon. This decision was reached at the annual meeting here yesterday of the Oregon league of cities.

A standard code prepared by the league's legislative committee met an unexpected number of objections, and in somewhat tempered form it will be submitted to the cities for their votes. If the less drastic measure is approved it will be returned to the committee and introduced in the legislature. The league adopted a recommendation of Chris Schuebel of Oregon City, president of the organization, and instructed the legislative committee to prepare a bill whereby cities could create sinking funds outside of the 6 per cent constitutional limitation for the financing of garbage and sewerage disposal plants.

State aid for cities in the maintenance of streets that are parts of state highways is the purpose of another measure that the league decided to sponsor.

Another proposed measure would simplify annexation of new territory to cities. At present, in order to get the matter before the voters of the district proposed for annexation, it is necessary that they and also the people of the city file petitions. Under the proposed measure only the petition from the people in the outside district would be required.

Only persons having property abutting on a street or alley proposed for vacation or condemnation for the vacation or removal of a street or alley proposed amendment. The Portland ordinance was favored.

ROYAL RUSSIAN CHOIR TO GIVE CONCERT HERE

Klamath Falls music lovers will be exceedingly interested in the announcement that Laurence Lambert, the Hollywood impresario, is now managing the Agnena-Slaviansky Royal Russian chorus for the entire United States and Canada, and that they will give a concert in the Christian church, October 30, at 8:15 o'clock.

The Royal Russian choir is coming to the western territory direct from New York where they were engaged as a special feature for the Morris Gass production of the famous Passion play and Miracle play. They also gave 50 capacity concerts in Carnegie hall, New York, and over 100 successful concerts throughout the west.

Is Century Old

To those who have never heard of this choir, it might be mentioned that it is one of the oldest choral organizations in the world. It was formed almost a century ago and has visited practically every country in the world. In 1848, the czar of Russia commissioned Prince Dimitro Agnena-Slaviansky to draft from the Imperial conservatory and the Imperial Grand Opera company, a choir to be composed of the nation's best vocalists. It was known as the "Royal Choir," and was commissioned to supply the singing at the Imperial palace and the choir music for the royal church services. Occasionally they were heard outside the palace, and as its fame spread throughout the land, in 1848 the czar was induced to allow them to make a brief tour of the principal cities of Russia. Their success was phenomenal and the tour became an annual event. In 1848, they made a good-will tour of the capital cities of Europe and returned with more than 25 medals that were bestowed upon them by the rulers and musical societies of every country they visited.

Tickets On Sale

Its foreign success so enamored the czar, that he created an endowment for the perpetuation of the choir and they have been singing interruptedly ever since. In 1880 they made a "good will" tour of the world, including the United States. They opened up in New York City and played as far west as Chicago; they sang at the White House, in Washington and received a medal from President Garfield, only six weeks before his untimely death.

The present leader of the choir, Mrs. Margaret Agnena-Slaviansky, is the daughter of Prince Dimitro, the founder of the choir, and her daughter, Marie, one of the soprano soloists, and pianist, is ready to pick up the mantle of directorship when ever her mother retires. There are 24 members in the present choir and some of them are direct descendants of original members of the 1840 choir. Local concert lovers will be delighted to hear this remarkable choral group at the Christian church on October 30. Tickets are on sale at the Wirtz Music store.
