KLAMATH FALLS IS SECOND IN CONSTRUCTION

A comparison of building permits issued in the principal cities of Oregon for this year, up to October 1, shows Klamath Falls holding second place in the list exceeded only by Portland, the state metropolis.

However, although building in Klamath Falls up to the first of this month totalled \$1,239,835, this city has not escaped the unemployment situation now prevalent throughout the nation, and people seeking work are urged by the Klamath county chamber of commerce not to come here with the idea that conditions would be better.

The report shows that for the first six months of 1930, building permits amounted to \$778,600. In July the figures totalled \$82,476; in August, \$129,450; and in September, \$128,315, making a total of \$1,120,835. Portland leads the state with a total of \$9,796,895, and amounts for other cities are: Eugene, \$616,567; La Grande, \$422,515; Salem, \$491,935; Marshfield, \$129,572. In none of the months did permits issued in other cities exceed the building in Klamath Falls.

The report was compiled and issued to the press by the chamber of commerce.

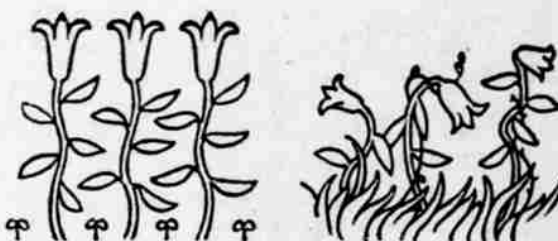
