"The Ship" Will Sail At The Pelican Thursday

"The Ship," into which St. John Ervine, the playwright has packed an amazingly complete cargo of post-war human reactions and conflicts, sails Thursday at the Pelican theater.

The cast is small, but the playwright has so handled the construction of the play that there is not a superfluous person on the stage at any time, and action and ideas are linked so accurately that the small cast and the small stage expands in the imagination of the audience. To a cosmos in which the whole tragedy of generation against generation looms through the words and actions of the simple, commonplace characters through whose lips the actors send the lines.

First there is Grandmother Thurlow (Janet Young) who has reached a perspective of years that enables her to view the conflict between son and grandson with an almost divine detachment and tenderness.

Then there is John Thurlow (Moroni Olsen) living to build ships and to build yet greater ships and to turn over to his son Jack the immense industry that the family has created through the years—so blind to everything but this ambition that he drives his son to death in order to win his point.

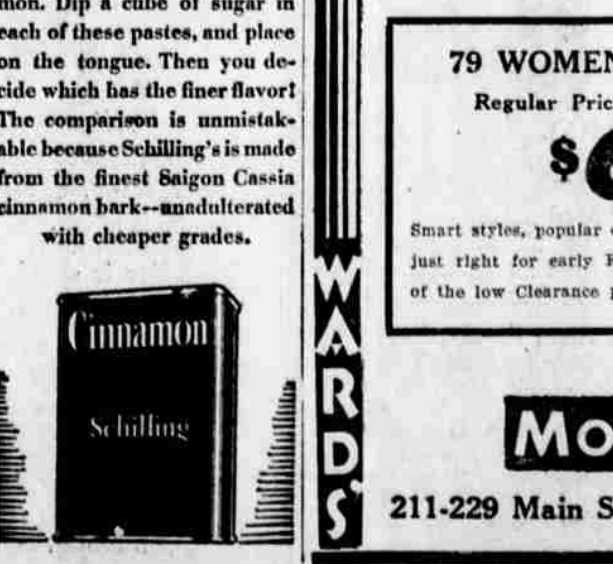
Enact Drama And there is Jack Thurlow (Robert Young) returned from the war hating machines and what they do to men and determined to return to the simple Tolstoyan philosophy of life—and Captain Cornelius (Gordon Nelson) a gentleman broken by war and drifting futile and half ashamed on such surfaces of life as present themselves. And George, the foreman (Joseph H. Williams) living to more truly John Thurlow's spiritual son than does Jack—and Heister, the daughter (Donna Earle) and Mrs. Thurlow (Leora Thatcher) who has learned to adapt herself to the unswerving tide of John Thurlow's decision and will. And in the home of the house in which they live, the drama is enacted, condensing and making
