Law Aids Klamath.
"Under the new administration the state traffic officers are helping the stockmen materially by stopping trucks and making an investigation to see that stolen cattle are not being shipped," said William Doby of Baker, who worked to have the legislature enact a law to curb the thievery on the range. The law provides that traffic officers shall watch for illegally transported meat, because most of the cattle rustling is done by motor truck. In Klamath county alone, in 1928, more than \$40,000 worth of cattle was stolen. One knows the total in the state, but it may be \$200,000 or more a year. The law is also aimed at thieves who rob farms of turkeys, hogs, chickens and other meat foods. The new law, says Mr. Doby, has been of immense benefit to stockmen everywhere in Oregon, and now that the traffic officers are functioning the operations of the thieves will be handicapped still more.—Oregonian.
