TEXAS GUINAN TAKES IN COPS

NEW YORK, Oct. 30. (AP)—Texas Guinan had another embarrassing moment today when she discovered she had been entertaining cops unwares again.

The blow-off came early this morning while about 200 guests were watching the floor show Miss Guinan directs at the Club Argonaut in West 54th street.

Two men in proper evening clothes, who had visited the place frequently enough recently to be classed as "regulars," approached the mistress of ceremonies and confided to her that they weren't patrons at all, but just two detectives bent on doing their duty.

"Boys, I thought you were here as guests," exclaimed Miss Guinan, more in sorrow than in anger, and added, "I hope you are not going to arrest me."

"Not you, but we're going to make some other arrests," the detectives told her.

Snitting the action to the word, they arrested Bernard Tann, assistant manager, and Bernard Altman, captain of waiters, charging them with maintaining a nuisance under a state law and with furnishing "set ups" for liquor, an offense under the federal prohibition law.

The detectives then gathered up partly filled bottles from several tables where guests were seated. Miss Guinan's last official contact with the police before today.

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NORBLAD GIVES PARDON TO TWO

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 30. (AP)—Conditional pardons for Charles A. Murray of Eugene, who has served two and a half years of an eight-year sentence for involuntary manslaughter, and S. Schibata, who has served 10 years of a life sentence for murder in Umatilla county, were announced by Governor Norblad yesterday. Both were recommended by the state pardon board.

A condition of Murray's pardon is that he must never again indulge in intoxicating liquor. His prison sentence was the result of his driving an automobile while drunk and running over and killing a man on a Eugene street. Letters and petitions received from Lane county showed an overwhelming sentiment for his pardon. He was received at the prison March 1, 1928. Murray's services as clerk for the prison farmer at the penitentiary annex near Turner are considered valuable and for that reason he will not be released until early in December.

Schibata also must forego the use of intoxicants the rest of his life. Prison records show that he was sentenced for killing another man while they were gambling, both in an intoxicated condition. His pardon was recommended by the trial judge, the members of the jury that found him guilty, by Mrs. A. B. Todd of Hillsboro and by Mrs. Martha Randall of Portland, former member of the state parole board. He was received at the prison May 2, 1921.

WILL BASE NEW RATE ON SPACE

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30. (AP)—Earl B. Wadsworth, superintendent of air mails, said today the new contract going into effect Nov. 1, basing rates on space-miles instead of poundage would give a decreased return to the National and Boeing Air Transport companies and increase the rate pay of Colonial Western Airways, Western Air Express and Continental Air Line.

The Boeing company, covering the Chicago-San Francisco route, will be the biggest loser—about \$75,000 a month—under the new contract.

The National Air Transport, operating from New York to Chicago, he said, would lose about \$6,000 a month, its contracts dropping from approximately \$122,000 to \$116,000 a month.

TAKE RADIO FOR STATE OFFICERS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30. (AP)—New York's republican candidate for governor was given enthusiastic support in a radio address last night by Secretary of State Stimson.

Speaking from his home here over a network of New York state broadcasting stations, Stimson assailed the democratic governor Roosevelt and, turning the republican Charles H. Tuttle, a "strong, brave, energetic public official," asserted there was no doubt as to which of the two candidates "will best serve the public interest in the coming two years."

The cabinet member termed Roosevelt unfit "to deal with the great crisis now confronting New York state." He discussed at length the recent judicial scandals of New York and criticized the governor for limiting investigations of the grand jury into that subject.

Stimson, reminding his audience he spoke as a citizen "of this state, my home and birthplace," also supported Representative Huth Baker Pratt, republican, who is campaigning for re-election in the secretary's home district. He urged the election of a republican congress to give full support to President Hoover for the remainder of his term.
