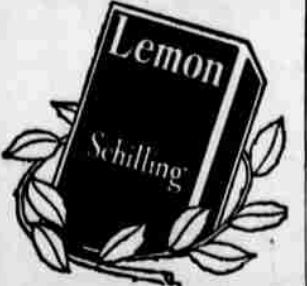

Local Sportsmen

Favor Rogue River

Fishing Measure

The Klamath County Sportsmen's association is boosting for the passage of the Rogue River Fishing bill, which will appear on the ballot November 4. This bill makes it unlawful to take fish from the Rogue River and its tributaries except with rod or line held in hand, and eliminates the commercial net fisherman, who has so depleted these waters.

W. W. Southwell, secretary of

the local association, says:

"The sportsmen favor this bill

because, first of all, the value of

the Rogue river from a fishing

standpoint is much greater to the sportsmen, tourists, recreational resorts, summer homes and camp grounds than to the small number of commercial fishermen. The past season has been most disastrous to the commercial fishermen of the Rogue, and at the same time sportsmen report a great scarcity of fish in this stream. The fleet of commercial fishing boats at the mouth of the river has shrunk from 120 to 30, and those operated without profit the past season. On the other hand, in 1929 over \$54,000 was paid to boatmen and farmers for their services as guides to tourists. The profit to recreational resorts and to individuals interested in the sport of catching the wonderful steelhead and salmon far surpasses any possible future profit to commercial fishermen."
