

COUNTY COURT NAMES BUDGET COMMITTEE

Hans Nylander, prominent farmer; Richard H. Hovey, timber owner, and C. A. Dunn, contractor, were yesterday named by the county court to sit with them as the 1931 budget committee for the county.

Mr. Nylander was named by Judge Fred R. Goddard; Mr. Hovey by Charles R. Williams and Mr. Dunn by Elias Obenchain. The budget committee will probably not convene before the last of November, it was stated, but preparations for the meeting will be made.

To Prepare Plans

"Heads of the county departments will have some time to get their statements of expenditures for the past year completed and filed and estimates for the coming year prepared," Judge Goddard said.

The court at its session yesterday voted unanimously to aid the state highway commission in changing the location of The Dalles-California highway north of the city. The court sent a telegram to the state highway commission assuring that group that the county court will secure the right of way for the proposed change.

To Change Route

The state highway commission proposes to re-route the highway which now passes through Pelican City, moving it eastward and putting it on higher ground, eliminating some curves and railroad crossings which are considered dangerous.

The court pointed out that the work will also provide some employment in the county during the dull season.

Following the session of court yesterday the members left for Portland where they met this morning with members of the county courts of Yakima county, Washington, and Umatilla county, Oregon, to further consider the united effort to secure a federal refund of monies spent by counties on which Indian reservations are located.

FIRE IN AN ASYLUM

MORRIS PLAINS, N. J., Oct. 31. (AP)—Fire of undetermined origin today caused damage estimated at \$15,000 to the top floor of one of the buildings of the state hospital for the insane at Greystone Park. Most of the 300 male patients housed in the structure were at breakfast at the time. There was little disorder.

Roy Klein Not to Allow Active Work By State Employees

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 31. (AP)—Political activity by members of the state highway department is not permitted, says a letter addressed to all employees by Roy A. Klein, state highway engineer.

"The state highway commission is a non-political organization, and its members have never taken any part in state or local politics," says the letter. "To conform with its established policy the commission instructs me to advise you, that, as heretofore, political activity on the part of any employee of the department is not desired and will not be permitted. Therefore, you should refrain from doing anything which may lay the commission open to a charge of political activity in behalf of any candidate or any measure."

Service Charge to Patrons Is Barred

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 31. (AP)—An order of the Public Service Commission today requires a number of water utilities in Oregon to desist from making a service charge to patrons for installing pipes from mains to private property lines and for installing meters and meter boxes.

The companies to whom the order is directed are: Wagon Water Service, Cannon Beach; Troutdale Water Works, Troutdale; Sumpter Power and Water company, Sumpter; Lakeview Water company, Lakeview; Elk Creek Light and Water company, Cannon Beach; Russellville Water company, Portland; Tualatin Valley Water company, Beaverton; Gardiner Water Works, Gardiner; Kilpatrick-Collins Water company, Portland; Community Water company, Portland.

Line Up For Job Before Hearing

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 31. (AP)—Four applications were received today by Governor Norblad for appointment to the position of superintendent of the state training school should the investigation of that institution set for next Saturday result in a vacancy.

The governor declined to give the names of the applicants. Three former inmates of the institution have lodged charges of cruelty against Superintendent W. H. Baillie, and the state board of control will formally investigate a hearing Saturday morning. Baillie denied the charges, though he admits to making use of the "Oregon boot." In the principal case, that of Vernon Levey of Portland, Baillie says the boot was used at the request of the boy's father.

KILL OFFICER IN STREET CAR

CHICAGO, Oct. 31. (AP)—Three gunmen cruised past a Maywood street car and sent a volley of bullets crashing through its windows, seriously wounding a policeman who was to be a witness at the murder trial of "Three-Fingered" Jack White, notorious gunman and "public enemy."

The wounded officer was Sergeant James McBride of the Bellwood police. Five years ago he was wounded in a revolver fight with White and his gang when the police encountered them in a Mannheim road tavern. A companion officer, Ed Pfeilme, and James Johnston, one of White's confederates, were killed.

"Three-Fingered" Jack was captured weeks later and eventually sentenced to prison for life, but the supreme court reversed his conviction and the case was never brought to trial again. Two weeks ago White was arrested in the vagrancy campaign of the police, and Chief Justice John P. McGorray reinstated the old murder charge and ordered White held without bail.

McBride had returned only last night from a trip, supposedly to Wisconsin, to gather evidence against White for the new trial. McBride's mother was sure that White's friends were trying to "get" her son.

"They have threatened Jim before, and tried to shoot him once," she said.

McBride has been on the Bellwood force eight years.

JOINT ROAD BE CONSTRUCTED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31. (AP)—Final approval was given by the Interstate Commerce Commission today to a joint project of the Northern Pacific and Oregon-Washington Railroad and Navigation company for the construction of 59 miles of new railroad from Medford to Teholah River, in Washington state.

The original routing for the extension was changed last summer and the order today allows the route to proceed with the new location. In addition, the commission approved point use contracts by which the Oregon-Washington company will occupy Northern Pacific lines adjacent to the extension. Two abandonments of short lines contemplated by other

North Pacific carriers were favorably reported to the commission today by examiners.

The Sumpter Valley railroad in Oregon tentatively was authorized to abandon 20 miles of line from Bates to Prairie City. The Intermountain Railway company was given a like favorable report on its application to abandon 12 miles in Idaho between Steirman and Centerville. The commission will consider the abandonments further before acting.

Wool Buyers Pay On Former Basis

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 31. (AP)—Asserting that reduced quotations on Willamette Valley wool were unjustified, local buyers today were maintaining former quotations of 16 to 20 cents pounds. Turnover at these prices is limited, as buyers here hold that price reductions announced from Portland appear mainly for the purpose of further restricting offerings. Quotations on Oregon mohair from Portland sources at 22 cents pound for long staple, and 27 cents for kid, were unverified here, local dealers reporting that no business has been taken at these figures for several weeks. Current quotations here are 20 to 25 cents.
