TRAGEDY COMES TO GAY PARTY

TACOMA, Wash., Nov. 1. (AP)—Halloween's gaiety turned to tragedy for five Tacoma boys and girls last night when the small coupe in which they were on their way to a party got out of control, ran wild down a steep hill, struck a pedestrian, and then plunged over a 15 foot embankment to be reduced to a pile of wreckage.

The victims are: June Pratt, 13, probable fatal injuries; cut and crushed. Mabel Calvert, 15, severe bruises and deep cuts. Edmund Hauser, 15, broken jaw and arm and other injuries. Morris Hendrickson, 16, broken arm and other injuries. Ed Lindstrom, 16, broken collar bone.

John Sheenhan, 61, the pedestrian, internal injuries, probably fatal.

A broken axle on the automobile is blamed by Hendrickson, driver of the car for the accident.

SHOOTS BOY

SEATTLE, Nov. 1. (AP)—W. J. Taylor, 24, painter, was held here last night for the shooting of Howard Anderson, 14, when he and others were about to roll a barrel on Taylor's porch in a Halloween prank.

Police said Taylor admitted the shooting after they found a pistol, with one shell discharged, in his home. Anderson was in a hospital in a serious condition.

Halloween Kills Two—ATLANTA, Ga., Nov. 1. (AP)—Attired in women's clothes, Ivey Allen, negro, joined in Halloween festivities.

His costume was so realistic that Willie Moseley and Horace Allen, also negroes, followed him home.

Frightened or angry, he grabbed a rifle and killed them. He surrendered to police.

DENVER, Colo., Nov. 1. (AP)—Three small children were fatherless today, the tragic aftermath of a gay Halloween party Thursday night.

Forrest Schaefer died at a hospital early today from what police said was a self-inflicted abdomen gunshot wound. Before turning the gun on himself he wounded his wife, authorities said. The bullet struck her leg.

The shooting followed a quarrel at a Halloween party the Schaefer family attended.
