Health Officer Is Recorder.

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 1. (AP)—The newly elected health officer of the city of Ashland is required by law to serve also as registrar of vital statistics and has a right to take over the registration books and records from a Dr. Rosenberg who has been registrar for many years, says an opinion by Attorney General Van Winkle to Dr. Frederick D. Stricker, secretary of the state board of health. Stricker explained the situation at Ashland and wanted to know whether the state board had authority to appoint a registrar separate from the city health officer.
