

RAILWAY MEN SOLICIT AID OF MERCHANTS

Railway workers in Klamath Falls, realizing the need for help to build business to insure no depression in their business that will mean a smaller payroll, have passed the following resolution, citing the importance of maintaining the railroads as a source of their livelihood:

"We, the members of Crater Lake Lodge No. 132, Order of Railway Conductors, are residents and taxpayers of Klamath Falls; our homes are here and our families are part of this community. Our remaining here depends on our being able to keep employed. The operation of freight truck lines is greatly reducing the number of railroad men employed in handling the traffic to and through Klamath Falls, and as a result many of our employees have been obliged to seek work elsewhere, thereby detracting from the population and payroll of the community in which we live, as very few of the truck companies' employees either live or spend their wages in Klamath Falls; and further, operate over highways built and kept in condition by taxpayers' money.

"Therefore, be it resolved, that Crater Lake Lodge No. 132, Order of Railway Conductors, in order to stop further unemployment among workers in railroad service on the Southern Pacific, Great Northern and Oregon, California & Eastern railroads, protest against merchants receiving or shipping freight via truck lines, and that every effort be made to divert freight to the railroads serving this community.

"Be it further resolved, that attention be called to the fact that railroad employees live in Klamath Falls and spend their money here, whereas only a very few of freight truck companies' employees either live in or spend their wages in the community.

"Be it further resolved, in this connection, that many of us have purchased homes here and desire to remain residents of Klamath Falls, our ability to do this and the part we can play in further up-building of the community being dependent upon our employment, and to this end we ask co-operation of the community to extent of shipping and receiving all goods by established rail transportation companies who in the past have been able to, and will in the future, render a satisfactory, dependable service 365 days of the year.

"Be it further resolved, that each member of this lodge will, as employees of the above named railroads, confer with the merchants of Klamath Falls and ask them to assist us and the community by shipping by rail instead of by truck."

Scenic Ride Through Woods Discontinued

An old landmark of the San Francisco bay district passed into oblivion recently with the announcement that service on the Mt. Tamalpais and Muir Woods railway is permanently discontinued.

In place of the picturesque ride up the slopes of Mt. Tamalpais, from which vantage point the entire San Francisco bay region may be viewed, tourists will now travel in De Luxe Grayline motor buses. The fare for the auto trip is \$6.50 a person, not including the luncheon served in a cafe at the tavern on the mountain summit.
