seat in congress when Major-General Charles H. Martin, a democrat, defeated Franklin F. Krell in the third district. Martin won a relatively easy victory. He had 18,915 votes to Krell's 14,252 in 265 out of 546 precincts.

Robert R. Butler of The Dalles was an easy winner over R. E. Bradford, democrat, and Charles L. McNary was returned a victor to the senate over Elton Watkins, democrat. McNary polled 83,311 votes, and Watkins 33,901 in 1217 in the 1906 precincts.

The cabinet form of government bill lost by a decided majority. With 1951 precincts counted the Power Bill had: "Yes 53,020; No 37,582."

The bill providing for repeal of state payment of irrigation and drainage district interest was approved, as was the income tax measure, the bill providing for additional circuit judges in Multnomah county, and, apparently, the amendment providing for filling vacancies in the legislature.

The amendment extending privilege of the Soldier's bonus law was defeated, as were the two motor license revision amendments; increased compensation for members of the legislature; the anti-cigarette bill; closing of the Rogue river to commercial fishing, and the Lieutenant-Governor form of government.

Nearly every member of "Journey's End" has seen the type of war service depicted, and this is an assurance of absolute perfection in detail. James Whale directed this all-taking picture, recorded by RCA Photophone, and showing tomorrow at the Vox Theatre. Whale is a war veteran and also directed the original London and New York stage productions of the play. Colin Clive, who created the original role of Stanhope in the first stage production, plays the same role in the screen version. He traveled from London to Hollywood to do it. His round trip involved twenty days of traveling for twenty-eight days of work before the camera. He had to be back in London on a definite date to resume the stage role.

George Pearson, supervisor of the entire filming, is one of the best known English directors and film producers. He has combined a lifetime of experience in both dramatic and film work in planning and making the talking picture of "Journey's End." The story is the oddest in stage history. Without a woman in it, it has a compelling dramatic quality that makes it grip audiences. It has a love interest manifested only conversationally in dialogue between male characters regarding a girl who is never seen.

Besides Colin Clive, the cast includes Ian Maclaren, David Manners, Anthony Bushell, Billy Bevan, Charles Gerrard, Thomas Whiteley, Jack Pitcairn and Warner Klinger.
