ASHLAND WILL PLAY K. U. H. S.

MEDFORD, Nov. 5 (Special)—While Ashland is invading the fair of the Pelican on the high plateau of Klamath basin to do battle with the Klamath Falls grid team Medford's Armistice day crowds will be watching the Tigers clash for the first time in history with the Bend Lava Bears. Most of Ashland's sports fans will probably make the trip east with their team, but a few are expected to attend the game at Medford.

Lead by the flashy Elmer Brown at half, Bend made a strong bid for state championship honors last year, losing a post-season to the Portland high school champions. Brown is playing fresh ball for Washington this year, having got a better offer from the Huskies than from the Oregon schools.

Coach Clarence Hines, University of Mississippi athlete, will bring a light squad of men south to meet Medford. Neither team has had any spectacular success this season, having met defeat at the hands of stronger eleven, but are rated about on a par and should furnish plenty of action on the field. Bend lost a 13-9 argument with the strong Eugene team last Saturday while Medford tied Salem 12-12.

In the Salem game Medford showed a strong passing attack, completing several lobbs for gains in tiding Walker's 49-yard heave to Clay for a touchdown. Don Sural, wedge-shaped Japanese halfback, carried the brunt of the Vikings' attack and was chief ground gainer.

ELINOR HOIDALE GETS MAJORITY

ST. PAUL, Minn., Nov. 5, (A.P.)—A mounting tide of ballots today swept Elinor Hoidale, a Norwegian-born Democrat toward victory over Thomas D. Schall, blind republican, for the United States senatorship. Election of Floyd H. Olson, farmer-laborite, as governor, was conceded early today by his republican opponent, Ray P. Chase. Hoidale and Olson profited separately from what appears to have been an unprecedented defection from republican ranks.

Success for Hoidale would be the first for a democrat by election since Minnesota began statehood. When 818 of the most populous of the 3765 precincts had reported Hoidale had 56,290 votes; Schall 41,397; Ernest Lundeen, farmer-labor, 35,484, and Charles Lund, independent, 4,029.

For governor 810 precincts gave Olson 107,496; Chase 74,461 and Edward Andreus, democrat, who made the campaign 4,274.

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 5, (A.P.)—A constitutional question has arisen here as to who would sit if Governor Norblad were to call a special session of the legislature, as he has intimated he may. It has generally been understood that the members who sat in the 1929 session would act, but it is now discovered that section 4, article 4, of the State Constitution, representatives hold office "from the day next after their general election." This leads to the belief that the members elected in yesterday's voting would serve.
