

# DEMOCRATS IN LEGISLATURE TOTAL SEVEN

PORTLAND, Nov. 6. (AP)—Democrats increased their representation in the lower house of the Oregon legislature by five, giving the party a total of seven members out of 60. Senate representation of the party was reduced by one, leaving but one democratic solon in the upper house.

Returns from the general election show an upset in several places for the house. Charles Childs, veteran of the house, was defeated in Linn county by J. N. Weatherford, Jr., democrat. Victor Eckley, democrat, defeated H. H. Weatherpoon of Union county. David G. Glass, democrat, was elected over a republican in Wasco county, and A. R. McPhillips, democrat, staged a comeback after an absence from the house from Yamhill county. In Multnomah county John Manning, democrat, defeated K. K. Kuhl, republican and ex-speaker of the house.

Nine senators were re-elected for the 14 seats filled Tuesday. The one lone democrat in the senate is W. H. Strayer of Baker county.

Low, Deputy Sheriff Brown and Joe Kinsey found a car in which there was blood, meat and fat, as well as a hatchet and various knives. The officers then arrested Smith, a millwright by profession, and Mound, a blacksmith and tool dresser. The men deny having killed the steer and taking the meat.

Officers state that the men had been drinking, and the hired man on the Kerns ranch who identified the men, told how he had found them with a rifle, told them that the ranch was not open to hunters, and to move on. The men were impudent, and refused to move the man said. After he had gone out of sight he heard a shot.

Sheriff Low stated today that officers have the rifle belonging to Smith and Mound, and that the bullet which penetrated the head of the beef has been found. Both the gun and bullet will be sent to a ballistic expert in Portland to ascertain whether or not the bullet which killed the steer was fired from the rifle.

Officers stated that there was blood and hair on the men's clothes and shoes. Mound and Smith are being held in the county jail.

## Telephone Head Dead in Boston

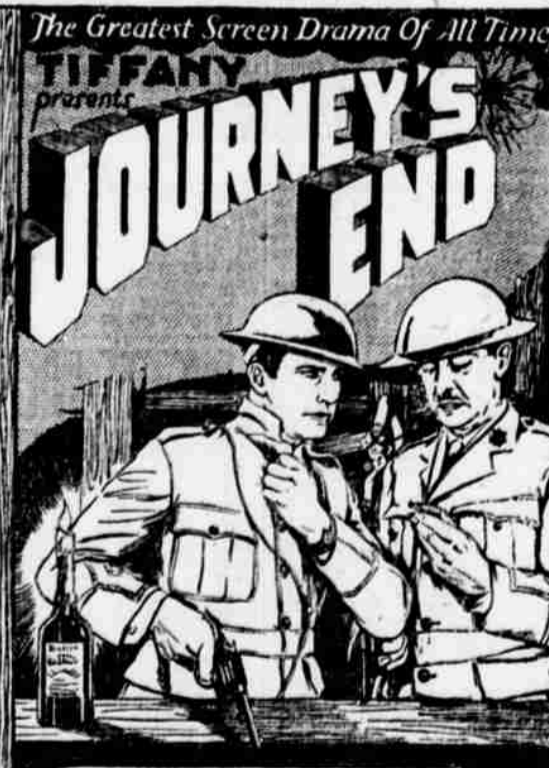

tion officials gave his democratic opponent, Claude C. Ball, a lead of 29 votes.

Three districts in Kentucky, the fourth, sixth and tenth, and the tenth in Minnesota were unsettled, making a total of six.

Under the revision the lineup shows the republicans have 215, democrats 213, farmer labor one, and six in the doubtful list.

In Minnesota, Senator Schall, republican, took the lead from his democratic opponent, Einar Holdale, as reports came from the outgoing districts. Holdale had led since the first returns.

In Kentucky, Senator Robeson was trailing far behind in his race against M. M. Logan for the long term and Ben Williamson, democratic candidate for the short term. A lead of 30,000 votes was held by the democrats.

Election of Senator Schall would assure the republicans 48 members in the senate. In event the democrats capture the Kentucky seat they will have 48. One farmer labor completes the list of 96.
