congressman-at-large from Illinois today. The plurality over Walter Nesbitt, democrat, reached 9,787, with all but of 89 of the state's 7,109 precincts reported. Sixty of the remaining precincts were in down state, where Yates has been running strong, while the other 29 were in Cook county, where a democratic landslide gave Nesbitt his earlier lead. Interest of the nation as well as the state was focused on the Yates-Nesbitt contest because of the possibility that it might determine which party would have control of the house. With 7,020 of the 7,109 precincts reported the count was: Yates, 962,232; Nesbitt, 952,445.
