

"ON TO SALEM" BATTERY CRY

"On to Salem"
With the county of Klamath and the city of Klamath Falls showing their support of Klamath's Battery "D" by the passage of the two measures on the ballot calling for the expenditures of \$90,000 as the city and county's share in the building of a \$180,000 armory in Klamath Falls members of the county's battery of the 249th Coast Artillery have adopted "On to Salem" as their slogan. Under the untiring leadership of Captain Walter Abbey they are preparing to carry their second objective in the armory campaign by doing all possible for a speedy passage of the necessary \$90,000 state appropriation by the state legislature. Passage of the income tax measure on the ballot means a

welcome relief for property tax payers and will provide additional state funds. The building of a structure of such size at this time being in direct line with President Hoover's plans for relief of the unemployment situation, Captain Abbey believes that by a speedy action on the part of the legislature Klamath county will go far to take care of its idle labor. Faith of this community in the plan for an armory for this section of the state is being commended upon statewide as it is believed that this is the first time in the history of Oregon that such a measure has passed the first time it was placed upon the ballot.

In a telephone conversation with Captain Abbey from Salem yesterday, Lieut. Thos. E. Riles of the Adjutant General's office complimented and congratulated Captain Abbey, his officers and men on their campaign for the armory and its successful culmination. He stated that this type of public service on the part of the National guard units of the state is highly commendable and a part all organizations are

expected to take for the good of their communities. Captain Abbey issued a public statement last night, thanking the voters of Klamath county and Klamath Falls for their support of the armory measures and assuring them that his organization will continue in the future, as in the past, to bend every effort to be worthy of such a vote of confidence and support.

Chiloquin Elects New City Officers

Mayor Leland Casey and Councilmen W. C. Wells, George Flury and George Bell were elected without opposition as officials of the city of Chiloquin at the election Tuesday. Holdover councilmen are Harry Davis and E. E. Evans.

A special levy for \$4,500 over the legal six per cent increase was passed by the voters who also gave the armory a large majority both in East Chiloquin and West Chiloquin.

Armistice Dance to Be Charity Affair

Harry Smith's Music Box orchestra will be augmented to nine pieces for the occasion and the program of dance numbers is being carefully selected to fit the patriotic spirit of the evening.
