BIG SEAPLANE OFF FOR HAGUE

AMSTERDAM, Holland, Nov. 7. (AP)—The Do-X, Germany's 12-motored seaplane, took off at 12:15 p. m. today on a brief exhibition flight to Rotterdam and The Hague. The ship will fly to Calshot, England, tomorrow, on the next lap of its trans-Atlantic flight to New York.

A rain storm loomed in the direction of Rotterdam, and doubts were expressed as to whether the full plans of the exhibition flight would be carried out.

The Do-X first circled over the Zuider-Zee in the direction of Haarlem, and then turned about and at 12:35 flew over Amsterdam with its twelve engines making a terrific racket, which brought crowds to the streets and roof tops.

LAWYER TAKES HIS OWN LIFE

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 7. (AP)—Hugh H. Brown, 55, attorney, who eight years ago was mentioned for the United States supreme court, was dead today by his own hand. He shot himself through the heart in his garage at Palo Alto.

A note addressed to his wife and children, attributed his suicide to ill health, from which he had been suffering for two years. Mrs. Brown discovered the body. Brown was prominent in the California bar association, and formerly the Nevada bar association. He came to San Francisco in 1927, after being graduated from Stanford University. He practiced law here and in Nevada.

Klamath Falls Directory Ready for Distribution

An era in the advancement of printing in Klamath Falls is marked by the publication of the 1930-1931 Klamath Falls directory, a book of 436 pages, and the first hard-backed book ever completely printed in the county. It was edited and compiled by Fred O. Small and printed by the Smith-Bates Printing company of this city.

Carrying complete information on Klamath Falls and a list of residents of the city and the county, the directory is the most complete ever published in this city. It will be ready for distribution on Saturday, it was stated last night.

1930-1931 Population

The population tabulation figures show that at the time the names for the book were being gathered there were 19,589 people living in Klamath Falls. "We believe that the total shows at least 97 per cent of the population of Klamath Falls at the time the directory was compiled," the book states.

The directory, which is conveniently arranged, shows: a complete list of all residents who are 15 years of age and over; number of children under 15 years of age; all business firms with street numbers and nature of business; buyers' guide; classified business section; street directory, with householder and property owner's guide; Klamath's alphabetical list; historical sketch of Klamath Falls; complete miscellaneous section, including churches, lodges, labor organizations, schools and officials.

Accurate Information
The book is the result of a thorough house-to-house canvass, call-back and double checking system, insuring a complete and accurate list of the inhabitants and of business firms as it is possible to obtain under the rapidly changing conditions in this growing city.

An "Addenda" brings the directory down to the present date, as nearly as possible.

Historical Sketch
The historical sketch of the Klamath country from the time of the visit of the first white men to the present date is interesting and reveals names and facts of historical interest to the people of the state. Credit is given Judge A. L. Leavitt and Captain O. C. Applegate for aiding in compiling the

short history of the Klamath country. The book is printed on a durable white paper, with the advertising section on a heavier yellow paper. The cover is a gray, cloth-covered board.

Well Arranged
The advertising throughout the book is so arranged that it is easily readable and adds, rather than detracts, from the general appearance of the directory. The advertising does not interfere with the speed with which any desired information may be found.

The entire book is well arranged and indexed so that it is easily understood. The editor and the publishers deserve the highest praise for the material and the workmanship displayed in this book.

WELLS LEAVING WITH CONVICTS

United States Marshal Cal Wells arrived in Klamath Falls Friday to take two prisoners into custody.
