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KLAMATH MEN LEAVING FOR PORTLAND SOON

Problems bulking large on the business horizon of the eleven western and Pacific Coast states, Hawaii and Alaska, will be brought under review at the Eighth Western Divisional Meeting of the chamber of commerce of the United States, a call for which was issued today by Paul Shoup, vice president. The meeting will be held at Portland, December 8 and 9.

"What lies ahead of business in this important area will be the general theme of discussion," he said. "This will involve a comprehensive stock taking by business leaders and representatives of commercial and industrial organizations and the consideration of such immediate questions as maintenance of employment, industrial stabilization, certain phases of agriculture and transportation and the foreign and domestic trade outlook."

"This discussion will center around conditions in these great industries which constitute the backbone of western economic activity—oil, lumber and mining. These are confronted by common difficulties which present questions of national economic policy and in a measure they set the pace for all branches of trade and industry."

Herbert R. McMillan, president of the California Oil and Gas Association, Los Angeles, will lead the discussion of the oil industry. Col. W. B. Grooley, manager of the West Coast Lumberman's association, Seattle, will deliver the opening address on the lumber industry.

The mining situation will be presented by Robert N. Bell, former state inspector of mines, Boise, Idaho.

Wallace M. Alexander, chairman of the board, Alexander and Baldwin, Ltd., San Francisco and Hawaii, will lead off the discussion of foreign trade in the Pacific area. Another session devoted to inland waterway development will be opened by Marshall N. Dana, Portland, associate editor of the Oregon Journal and a member of the National Waterway committee.

Phases of the western agricultural situation will be presented by Donald D. Conn, managing director of the California Vineyardists association, San Francisco and representatives of the Columbia Basin Irrigation league. Paul T. Carroll, president, San Francisco convention and tourist bureau, will speak on transportation problems affecting tourist travel.

Proceeding the western divisional meeting, on December 5 and 6, a regional traffic and aviation conference will be held under the auspices of the National Chamber for the discussion, from a local and sectional viewpoint, of various phases of highway and air transportation.

E. M. Bueh, president of the Klamath County chamber of commerce, R. C. Groesbeck, former president and member of the board of directors, George A. Cunningham also a director, and Earl C. Reynolds, executive secretary are planning to attend the Eighth Western Divisional Meeting.

"It is probable that at least 20 members of the local chamber will sign up to attend the meeting before December 8," Mr. Reynolds stated today.

WAR TROPHIES ARE DISPLAYED

The casualties of election being cleared away bring to mind the nearness of Armistice Day which this year falls on next Tuesday. The show windows of the Swan Lake Moulding company on South Sixth street are rapidly taking on a wartime air as former soldiers unearth new plunder to fill in the windows. Many rare and curious souvenirs are shown.

From a foreground of the "field gray" blankets rises a war torn street with its laconic signs and evidences of shell fire.

Knife Has Fable
Corporal Ross H. Aubrey, of the 65th Central Artillery Corps, has a varied exhibit included in which is a wicked Seneca knife used in hand to hand fighting. The fierce African tribesman clipped off the ears of the slain with these knives feeling that thus they added the strength and bravery of the dead warrior to their own.

Action Pictures
Corporal Lawrence Birk, Company E, 107th Engineers, unearthed a rusted gas mask and some very fine pictures of the 52nd Division in action. A picture, "The Red Shirt," starts the crawling again after twelve years.

Sergeant Walter C. Sturges identification tag (dog tag), from Company B 150th Engineers, shows a familiar chord of many chest. A picture is shown of Lieut. William Fitzsimmons, the first medical officer of the American Expeditionary Force to fall and in whose honor the government has named the Fitzsimmons General hospital at Aurora, Illinois.

Frenchman's Idea
A French canteen with two spoons, one large, one very small, excites curiosity. A rumor has it that the French being an economical race designed the small spoon that the daily ration of "Pinard" (wine), would last longer.

In the other window a pair of those boots that Kipling marched "at" down turn up their battered toes in peaceful immobility. A pair of the 65th Landwehr serves as a grim reminder of the raiding parties whose orders were to bring back a live prisoner for the intelligence section if possible so that information could be gained of the fresh line trench and running to the opposing forces, if not possible bring back the shoulder strap and pay card.

In the center is an enlargement of a group of German infantry getting up out of the front line trench and running to surrender with their arms raised, crying "Kamerad."

Contrasting with the German Iron Crosses in the high point of interest, a Distinguished Service Cross awarded by the United States of America for service far surpassing the bounds of duty, a decoration that is awarded for service in action only.

The windows were arranged by Ralph Wiese and are lighted each night so that those who cannot inspect them while the Swan Lake Moulding company is open may do so at night.
