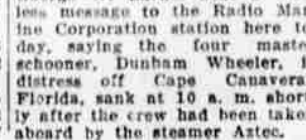

Talking pictures may end many of the weird facial disguises of Lon Chaney.

In fact, "the man of a thousand faces" estimates that he'll have to lose half of them at last, though he'll substitute strange voices in his characterizations. He starts this idea in "The Unholy Three," his first talking picture, which will open Sunday at the Pelican Theatre, for he is using and moving as such a person this one picture.

The production was elaborately staged. A complete side show, with actual side show performers, was set up at the studios for the opening sequences, and a pet store, containing almost every bird and animal collected in such places, was also installed, the actual bird and parrot voices being recorded along with Chaney's imitations of them. In some cases special microphones were used. In one case a certain bird, in parrot, with voice high to be properly recorded, was trained to lower the tones in a rather remarkable feat of animal education.

A notable cast appears in the new picture, which Jack Conway directed. Lila Lee plays the heroine, as Bonnie, the side show girl, and Elliott Nugent plays the leading male juvenile role opposite her.

Harry Earles, a little over two feet high, appears as the midget, as he did in the original silent production of some years ago, and Ivan Linow is seen in the role of the giant. Others in the cast include John Miljan, Crawford Kent and Clarence Burton.

To those who think that the heyday of the circus has passed, the new musical picture, "Swing High," will particularly appeal. For this spectacular talkie deals with life under the Big Top as it existed in 1875—the most picturesque period in circus history.

In those days the circus had no machinery to put up and take down its tents, no mechanical contrivances for loading its paraphernalia on railway flat cars, no tractors to pull the heavy loads to and from shipping points.

Instead, its Big Top was erected and torn down by hardy, singing roustabouts who piled their sledge hammers with amazing skill. It moved from town to town by means of its own wagon train, had weathered often mounting mired wagons and a delay in the performance in the next town. When it was necessary to handle unusually heavy loads, elephants were employed.

The glamour and romance of the circus at its picturesque best is contained in "Swing High," which will be seen at the Pine Tree Theatre on Sunday. A complete circus troupe was engaged for its filming, with all the clowns, acrobats, bare-back riders, trapeze performers, wild animals, spanglers and glitter that go to make up "the greatest show on earth" playing a part.

OKLAHOMA JAIL BREAK RESULTS IN ONE DEATH

CHANDLER, Okla., Nov. 8. (AP)—A jail break by four prisoners from the Lincoln county jail ended today in the fatal shooting of Jim Haggood, alleged holdup man, by sheriff Ted Meers and the capture of two other fleeing prisoners.

Fred Moore, sentenced to a two year reformatory sentence for burglary, escaped. The other, a conspirator, Herman Cheever, charged with bank robbery and Bill Daniels, under sentence with Moore, were recaptured shortly after the break.

Haggood was slain at the edge of town in a gun fight with Sheriff Meers, who had pursued the fleeing prisoner in his motor car. Haggood, on foot, was armed with a revolver. The sheriff was not wounded.

Moore stopped a motorist and at the point of a gun presumably taken from the sheriff's office, commanded the motor car. The four escaped by slugging Bill Bosler, assistant jailer, when he brought their breakfast.

Woman Killed Near Pendleton

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Nov. 8. (AP)—Mrs. Thelma Durst was killed today in a fatal automobile accident near Pendleton. Mrs. Durst, 35, was driving a 1935 Buick when it crashed into a pole on the Pendleton highway, 15 miles south of here. Hospital attendants said Mrs. Durst had only a slight chance of recovery.

Passing motorists found the wreck with Mrs. Durst pinned under the car but weasel thrown clear. Mrs. Durst had been visiting her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Salting, at Pendleton, Oregon. Weisel was bringing her to Walla Walla.

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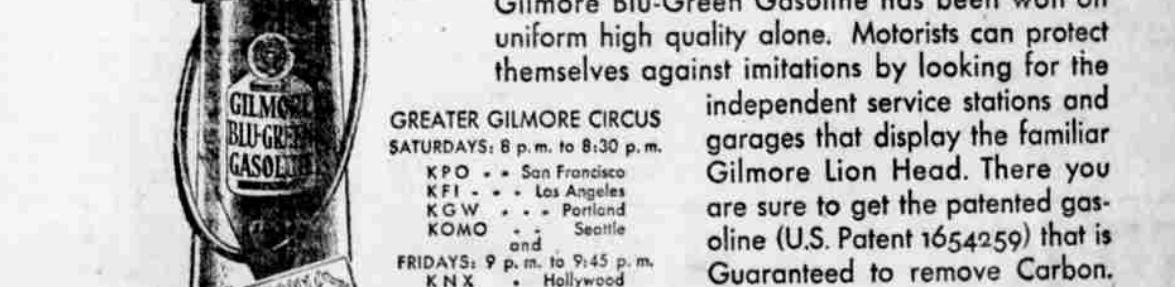
